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PREFACE

Rammohan College, Kolkata, had made its tentative beginning in the field of female education way back in 1881 in the form of a Women's Department in City College, one of the oldest, premier Institutions of Kolkata founded by notable Brahmo missionaries and educators Ananda Mohan Bose and Sivnath Sastri. After a long and illustrious journey, in 1961, the City College Women's Department became a separate, independent entity when it was affiliated to the Calcutta University, renamed Rammohan College and administered by the Brahmo Samaj Education Society.

The College has been aptly named after Raja Rammohan Roy, the chief architect of the 19th century Bengal Renaissance. Raja Rammohan, considered the "first modern man of India" was well versed in the Vedas, Vedanta & Upanishads and questioned the social and religious anomalies of the Hindu society of Bengal in the 19th century. His protests against social evils like the 'Sati' and the miserable condition of the women of Bengal, rather India, as well as against Hindu religious polytheism, idolatry, ostentatious rituals and orthodoxy gave rise to the monotheistic and egalitarian Brahmo religious movement and the establishment of the Brahmo Samaj. An advocate of Western education, which the Raja believed was a stepping stone to modernization, Rammohan championed women's issues, especially their lack of social equality and education. In fact, through his protest movement against 'Sati' and its abolition, Rammohan had pioneered the earliest movement for female emancipation in India. He had also opposed polygamy and child marriage, which were mainly responsible for the wretched condition of Indian women. In his 'Brief Remarks Regarding Modern Encroachments on the Ancient Rights of Females' (1822), he had stoutly defended the legal rights of women and advocated their right to education and enlightenment. The Rammohan College, with its modest beginning and gradual advancement, has tried over the years to incorporate these ideals of the Raja and translate his vision to reality by promoting the cause of education in its highest and widest sense which would help train the mind, heart, body and soul of the student and make it conducive to the 'good of man and the glory of God.'

Keeping the Raja's objectives in mind, the Rammohan College has opened its doors to all female students irrespective of race, creed, caste and status. Administered by the Brahmo Samaj Education Society, a registered constituent of the Sadharan Brahmo Samaj, Kolkata, this College has a rich tradition of rearing disciplined, truly educated, socially aware individuals who have made a mark in almost every walk of life. With honours in a varie3ty of subjects in the Science, Humanities and Commerce streams coupled with the sincere efforts of the staff, teaching and non- teaching, and a well equipped library, this College has shaped up into an excellent centre for serious academics.

Rammohan College, originally located at 102/1, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata – 9, has acquired the Heritage Building at 85A, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata, which was the residence of the Raja and his descendants. It contains the Rammohan Roy memorial Museum, where memorabilia and photographs of the Raja are exhibited and also a library. On the Rajs's Birthday, on 22nd May every year, a seminar on his ideals and their relevance in contemporary world, is organized. Other value based seminars on Human Rights organised by the Memorial Museum and the Teachings of Vivekananda on Youth Day organised by NSS have also been held. The Museum has plans of introducing a study centre about Raja Rammohan. Funds have already been sanctioned by the State Archives, Government of West Bengal, and work for the establishment of a Centre for Archival studies, has already commenced. Aparajita, a vocational centre, teaching soft toy making, batik and Manipuri handloom weaving, for the empowerment of women has started functioning, as an extension activity of Rammohan College, under the management of the Museum Committee.

The construction of a New Science Building for Rammohan College, near the heritage Building, within the same compound has been completed in 2003. A number of Biological Science (Honours) classes both theoretical and practical have been shifted from the original premises to this new building where these are conducted with minimum disturbance and maximum ease. Some second and third year Arts (Hons.)and Commerce (IT) classes are also being held there. The problem of space and time shortage in the original building during full academic sessions have now been solved somewhat. But we need more space for expanding number of students and so have acquired more space from the Metropolitan Library The M.Sc (Physiology) course, sanctioned by Calcutta University has been introduced in the New Science Building in the 2006 - 07 session. In 2014 M.A. in Bengali has also been introduced.

To enable students from outside Kolkata to pursue higher education the need for a college hostel was keenly felt. Accordingly, in a small rented house on Vivekananda Road, the hostel had begun in the 1950s. When Rammohan College became a separate entity in the 1960s, a bigger hostel to accommodate the increasing number of students, was planned. With the help of funds from the U.G.C., the Government of West Bengal, the College and private donations, a four storied building, the Sadhana Sarkar Memorial Hostel of Rammohan College was inaugurated on 30.11.1981 at 35, Avedananda Road, Kolkata – 700006.

Rammohan College, from its humble beginning in the late 19th as merely a Women's Department in City College and its emergence as a distinctive Woman's institution at present, has traversed a long and hazardous path. It completed glorious 50 years in June, 2011. Steeped in the Brahmo tradition of knowledge and service the college has tried to instil a strong sence of values in its students, which contain a judicious mixture of tradition and modernity. At the same time an effort has been made to impart a standard of education which would ensure the 'greatest good of the greatest number', a Benthamite Utilitarian principle, deeply cherished by Rammohan Roy.

It gives me immense pleasure to submit the SELF STUDY REPORT, 2015 (SSR) of Rammohan College, Kolkata for Second Cycle Reaccreditation by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore.

The SSR has been prepared in accordance with the guidelines of NAAC by a Steering Committee comprising the faculty members of the College. In this regard the cooperation and assistance from all stake holders _ Teaching & Non-teaching Staff and Students is gratefully acknowledged. This report reflects the academic, co curricular and administrative functions of the College over the last four years. This Self- Study Report is an honest endeavour made by a prestigious institution as a truthful exercise on self- introspective assessment and criticism.

Executive Summary

Rammohan College owes its origin to City College, Calcutta, which is one of the oldest Colleges in West Bengal. It was founded in 1881 by a band of patriotic and self-less Brahmo leaders like Ananda Mohan Bose, Pandit Sivnath Sastri and Umesh Chandra Dutta. Rastraguru Surendranath Banerjee later joined the College as a teacher. City College had a Women's Department in the morning which was separately affiliated to the Calcutta University in 1961, and was named after Raja Rammohan Roy, the chief architect of 19th Century Bengal Renaissance.

Starting its journey in 1961, Rammohan College completed 50 years in June, 2011. We celebrated the Golden Jubilee of the college which has established itself as one of the first grade colleges in West Bengal.

The following is a brief summary of the criterion wise inputs:-

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The motto of Rammohan College is and always has been 'Sraddhaban Labhate Jnanam' or 'Wisdom belongeth to Reverence'. The founding fathers of this institution had a clear aim before them – to promote the cause of education at its highest and widest sense in a holistic manner that would provide comprehensive training of the body and mind of the woman student. While the pursuit of academic excellence and character building is important, the College has always tried to balance between western ideas and technology with our own rich cultural traditions.

The College is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and follows the Under-Graduate curricula and examination schedule designed by it. However, the two Post-Graduate departments – Physiology and Bengali, enjoy limited freedom in determining the syllabi and the examination programme semester-wise. The master routine of the College allocates classes as a whole while the Departmental Heads, in consultation with her / his faculty distributes the departmental routine as well as the module-wise division of the syllabi. A learner-centric academic approach makes class room teaching more interesting and interactive. Study tours, field trips, excursions, surveys and projects enrich the learning experience. Class tests, tutorials, mid-term and selection tests are the evaluative measures taken to gauge the students' progress.

Regular Orientation and Refresher Courses, Seminars and Workshops help to keep the faculty updated. Some teachers, members of the Board of Studies, Calcutta University, help indirectly to modify the syllabi and examination pattern periodically.

The students are sensitised on environmental and gender related issues through talks, projects and NSS activities. Regular parent-teacher meetings, after the mid-term tests, keep the parents informed about the progress of their wards. The outgoing students fill up the Exit Questionnaire to give a regular feedback to the College about the quality of

teaching, infrastructure and office work and institutional strength and weakness. The analyses of this feedback help in rectification and improvisation.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

To provide quality education and student empowerment, the College website www.rammohancollege.org and the prospectus give all relevant information about admission, institutional facilities, rules and regulations, Calcutta University examination schedule, subject choices and fees to make the process of admission transparent. Admission is based purely on merit. On the basis of the cut off marks in the Class XII examination, students are admitted as per Calcutta University norms. Reservation for S.C, S.T, OBC and differently abled students as per Calcutta University and Govt. of West Bengal guidelines is followed strictly.

The Academic Calendar and the departmental routine of individual departments inform the students about their classes. The teachers follow the general routine but also have their own teaching plan in which a time frame is given to complete the allocated portion of the syllabus. Learner-centric, interactive approach, talk and chalk method coupled with the use of computers, LED projectors and other gadgets make learning an enriching experience. Projects, field work, surveys, educational tours – all make learning a pleasure.

The academic support in the form of financial assistance from the College, scholarships under the *Kanyasree Scheme* of the W.B. Govt., book grants, help from the Student Aid Fund and from the contingency fund of some departments – all help in educating our students who mostly come from the economically backward section of society and are often first generation learners. They are also helped through special classes, tutorials and Remedial classes.

The evaluation process is stage-wise – class tests, mid-term tests, selection tests and finally the University examination (Part – I, II & III). There are measures taken both by the College (through the Grievance Redressal Cell) and the University (through scrutiny & review) to tackle problems of evaluation. Within the College, regular parent-teacher meetings keep the parents involved and informed. The feedback forms filled up by the outgoing students are valuable for the College to change and improvise.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Being primarily an undergraduate college, there are some practical problems to extend research and collaborative activities within the institution. The authority of Rammohan College definitely opines that research, extension and collaboration with different institutes are the part and parcel of higher education and so continuously encourages the faculty for carrying out research projects in different subjects along with inter-disciplinary

research. Outcome of this is reflected by the involvement of about 10 faculty members in active research of which 6 faculty members are guiding several students for their Ph.D. programme under University of Calcutta.

Moreover, several faculty members of Physical Science, Biological Sciences and Social Sciences actively participate in both international and national seminars/conferences/workshops on a regular basis. A good number of faculty have original research articles published in various peer-reviewed and indexed journals.

The faculty also encourages postgraduate students to be involve in research work and the result of which is, at present 11 students are continuing their research for the degree of Ph.D. under University of Calcutta. Collaborative research is also going on with other reputed research institutes.

Through the activities of NSS and by the way of Socio-physiological research, the students and the faculty members conduct extension programmes with the local community and local institutes (lab to land programme). The NSS unit of this institute regularly organizes social campaigning programmes related to health/contemporary events. Through the activities of "*Aparajita*" (the extension wing of Raja Rammohan Ray Memorial Museum), several schemes like pre-primary teachers' training course for under privileged women of the society, vocational training, yoga, etc are regularly organized as a part of social extension and development programme.

Due to the infrastructural and statutory binding, the college till date could not develop research relationship with any industry. In near future, we look forward to establishing institute-industry interface to generate industry based research output to be utilized by the society.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Rammohan College shares the main building at 102/1, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata 700009 with City College and Ananda Mohan College. Being a shared property, classes are held here till 10.50 a.m. though the office and administration with separate rooms, continue to work till 12.00 noon. This problem has largely been solved by the construction of the New Science Building at 85A, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata – 700009 in 2003, where along with Science, some Arts & Commerce classes and all P.G. classes are held. Two new stories are to be added to the existing building and the plans have already been approved by Kolkata Municipal Corporation. The Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum a heritage building is also housed there. Plans are under way for the construction of a Social Science Building in the premises. A garden containing medicinal and ornamental plants and a small reservoir containing fish are maintained by Botany and Zoology Departments for their practical classes. The Department of Botany also maintains a small tank to grow some aquatic plants that are used in the practical classes.

The class rooms in the Old and New Buildings are well ventilated. In the New Building there are Computers, Laptops and LED projectors to make teaching more interactive. There is a sophisticated computer room for the IT course of the Mathematics and Commerce Departments.

The laboratories of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Physiology are upgraded periodically. There is also a seminar room in New Science Building with public address system, Digital Camera, LED projector, TV & Home Theatre system.

The rich Central Library, a valuable learning resource, is housed in the main building. All departments have individual seminar libraries too. Almost every year new books are added with U.G.C funding. Subscriptions to journals are renewed. Unfortunately, the library is yet to be fully computerised. The Students' hostel at 35, Avedananda Road, Kolkata – 700006 allows girls from afar to study in this institution. Strict discipline is maintained there. An Anti-Ragging Cell has been formed, in accordance with U.G.C regulations to look into the menace of ragging. Till date no instance of ragging has been reported.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The College provides ample support to its students through financial aid through the Student Aid Fund, concession in fees, scholarships under the *Kanyasree Scheme* of the Govt. of West Bengal, book grants and so on. Special financial assistance is provided to SC, ST and OBC students by the Concerned Cell of the Govt. of West Bengal. Academic help to poor learners is provided through special coaching and Remedial classes. Unfortunately, the Entry-in-Service programme and the coaching for NET – SET & SSC have been discontinued. Students are also helped through personal and psychological counselling by teachers as well as career counselling by different companies which had visited the College in the last four years. The Grievance Redressal Cell and the Antiragging Cell (specially for the girls' hostel) give special attention to the complaints of the students. However no incident of ragging has been reported so far.

Our students, often first generation learners from economically backward sections have to be counselled firmly yet affectionately so that they complete their education and earn a degree. Under these circumstances the average pass percentage (%) for Hons. students in the last four years is commendable – B.Sc.(89%), B.A (90%) & B.Com (84%). Apart from studies the students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular extension activities like Sports, NCC and NSS, Yoga classes (conducted by Aparajita, Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum). Recently a gym has been constructed for their benefit. A no. of students have excelled in Inter College, National and International Competitions.

The students union of the College is an active body and acts as a bridge between the authority and students. The General Secretary is included in Governing Body and IQAC as invitee member.

A fair percentage of students have progressed from Under Graduate Course in College to P.G programmes in Universities. Some have taken up jobs in different sectors. At present an informal Alumni Association called 'PURBATANI' is functioning. Attempts are being made to form a registered Alumni Association.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The Governing Body of the College is the highest decision making body with the Principal as its Secretary. She plays a key role in the governance and management of the institution, maintaining core values while ensuring transparency in the functioning of the College. She is ably assisted in this by the various Sub-Committees like Academic, Finance, Building, Purchase, Sports, Library and Cultural by the Secretary of the Teachers' Council and the Secretary of the Non-teaching council. The General Secretary of the Students' Union informs the Principal about the demands and problems of the students so that she may take necessary action. Though the academic and administrative structure is fairly decentralized, all matters must be placed before the Governing Body for approval and then implemented. The recently reconstituted IQAC will play a significant role in coordinating the activities of the authority, teachers, learners and office.

As per the need of the College, the available financial resources are allocated against different heads of expenditure for development projects of the institution. Grants from U.G.C are utilised for the specific purpose for which received. Regular audit is carried out by the Govt. of West Bengal-nominated Chartered Accountant firm. The external audit has been completed upto the financial years 2013-14 and that for 2014-15 is in progress. No significant objections were raised by auditors.

The Principal deals with all financial matters in consultation with the Accounts Section and Finance Committee of the College. All decisions taken have to be ratified by the Governing Body.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

In the last four years, a number of innovations have been made in different sectors of the College. These are -

- 1. Energy conservation is practiced through the use of CFL lamps.
- 2. Solar heater was introduced in the College hostel to conserve electrical energy and earn carbon credit.
- 3. Conservation of old trees in the New Campus and plantation of new trees & cultivation of medicinal plants.

- 4. The campus has been declared a 'No Smoking' and 'No Plastic Zone'.
- 5. For e-waste management, the authorities handover the waste to authorised recyclers for proper disposal with minimum environmental pollution. All other waste are collected by Kolkata Municipal Corporation.
- 6. Animal House has been constructed in 2013 for animal research as per the guidelines of CPCSEA, New Delhi. A Human Ethics Committee has been formed as per guidelines of ICMR to monitor research on human subjects.
- 7. New Softwares like COSA was introduced for payment of salaries, Smart College for Accounts and Book Worm for Library.

College adopted a number of Best Practices over the last four years:-

- The Scholarship to needy students under Kanyasree Scheme of Govt. of West Bengal
- ii) N.S.S.(National Service Scheme).

The College has achieved considerable success in its endeavour but still has a long way to go.

SWOC Analysis

Strengths

- 1. Rammohan College has a democratic working atmosphere: Teaching, Non-teaching staff, Principal, and Vice-Principal are always available to students. All decisions taken in the Teachers' Council and Non-teaching Employees Union (City College Employees Union) are given proper weightage in the Governing Body.
- 2. Adoption of learner centric teaching approach.
- 3. The College has dedicated and qualified teaching staff. Fifteen new highly qualified teachers joined the College in 2014-2015 in Sanskrit, English, Chemistry, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Botany, Physiology and Zoology. This would further enhance the quality of teaching. Teachers participate actively in seminars at both national and international level.
- 4. Excellent research initiatives have been taken up by the teachers. There is a commendable number of major, minor research projects and publications.
- 5. The old building (102/1 Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata-700009) is shared with City College and Anandamohan College but the New Science Building (85A Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata-700009) along with Heritage Museum in Raja Rammohan Roy's original residence is exclusive to Rammohan College. Renovation and development of IT lab of the Department of Commerce was made..
- 6. There is a Seminar Hall in New Science Building with the public addressed system equipped with LCD projector, LED TV and home theatre system.
- 7. Effective and extensive activities through National Service Scheme (NSS) are conducted.
- 8. There is a rich Central library. There are also Seminar libraries in old and New Science Buildings.
- 9. Remedial classes in different subjects taken for slow learners.
- 10. Students from all sections of the society are admitted through a transparent process following University of Calcutta guidelines. Needy students are given help through the Kanyashree Project of the Government of West Bengal. Rammohan College enrolled the maximum number of students under Kanyashree Project and secured first position in the state in 2013-'14.
- 11. We maintain a small garden of medicinal and ornamental plants in the New Science Building.
- 12. We have developed two small tanks for aquatic animals and plants to induct environmental awareness among students.
- 13. Aparajita— a centre for Arts, Crafts and Yoga for girl and under privileged women is functioning in the Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum.
- 14. The Sadhana Sarkar Memorial Hostel of Rammohan College at 35, Avedananda Road encourages students from afar to study in this College. An Anti Ragging Cell has been formed. No incident of ragging has been reported so far. At present there are nearly 200 students staying there.
- 15. In addition to Post Graduate Course in Physiology, MA course in Bengali has been introduced under University of Calcutta in 2014.

- 16. One Animal House has been constructed and maintained properly for continuation of animal research according to the CPCSEA (Committee for the Purpose of Control and Supervision of Experiments on Animals) guidelines. For this purpose IAEC (Institutional Animal Ethics Committee) has been formed. We have received animal house registration number from CPCSEA, Ministry of Environment and Forest, New Delhi.
- 17. Different laboratories have been upgraded with the procurement of sophisticated instruments from the Development and Merge Scheme Grant of UGC.
- 18. In 2015 seven permanent Non-teaching Staff has been appointed according to the new staff pattern of the Govt of West Bengal under pay packet scheme.
- 19. Annual prize distribution and Sports are organized regularly.
- 20. There is an active Students' Union, Anti-Ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell and a Gymnasium.

Weaknesses

- 1. There is lack of space because the main building is shared by Rammohan, City and Anandamohan College.
- 2. New Science Building accommodates science classes but is not equipped adequately to include all B.A and B.Com classes. However as there is enough space talks are on and plans have already been submitted to Kolkata Municipal Corporation to construct additional floors and a new Social Science building in the new campus.
- 3. Despite the appointment of new teaching and non-teaching staff some Departments like Education, Philosophy and Commerce continue to suffer due to lack of adequate permanent teachers.
- 4. The Central Library is not yet fully computerised. The College does not have smart class rooms yet.
- 5. The College does not have an auditorium though talks are underway to construct it in the new building. The plan has already been submitted to Kolkata Municipal Corporation for its approval for construction of new Arts and Commerce building.
- 6. The social, economic and cultural backgrounds of many of the students (some of them are first and second generation learners) admitted in the college, is responsible for poor language competence (both in mother tongue and English), comprehension and communication. Within the existing structure the college finds it difficult to cater to the various needs of students coming from diverse backgrounds.
- 7. Though the IQAC was formed in 2009 it could not function due to unavoidable reasons. As a result AQAR could not be submitted till now. However IQAC has been reconstituted in 2015 and it would upload the AQAR of the last four years before the submission of the SSR.
- 8. No canteen and students' common room has been constructed in New Science Building yet.

Opportunities

1. Rammohan College encourages its teachers to be involved in active research. Several minor and major research projects of UGC are under way or already completed.

- 2. Students participate in institutional and social responsibilities and extension activities through the NSS.
- 3. The Students' Union maintains close contact between students and teachers. It organizes Freshers' Welcome and College Social every year to initiate the new comers in the college.
- 4. Students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular activities. Our students have participated and won prizes in University, State, National and International level.
- 5. The College has received a number of grants from UGC for development and upgradation of library.

Challenges

- 1. Proper utilization of available space for teaching, research, administrative works and creation of more space is a major challenge which we are trying to meet satisfactorily.
- 2. Though the College has played a proactive role and fifteen new highly qualified teachers have joined recently, more teachers are needed to fill up vacant posts. This is a very difficult task as the reservation policy of the Government and absence of suitable candidates belonging to reserved categories are obstructing the process. Seven vacancies of administrative posts have recently been filled up but many vacancies remain. However requisition for twenty five permanent teaching staff and one librarian has been submitted to the College Service Commission.
- 3. The College Hostel, accommodating nearly two hundred students, needs to be upgraded. Talks are on with the UGC for funds.
- 4. Improvement of student attendance and better results in B.A, B. Sc. and B.Com. level remain major challenges.
- 5. There is a need for more skill oriented courses like Diploma and Certificate courses in Communicative English, Graphic Design and Tailoring.
- 6. The restructuring of Career Counselling Cell and Psychological Counselling Cell is also a necessity.

1.1 CURRICULUM PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Rammohan College owes its origin to City College, Calcutta which is one of the oldest first grade Colleges in West Bengal. It was founded in 1881 by the Brahmo Samaj and had existed as Women's Department of City College upto 1961. Finally the college gained a separate identity after its affiliation to the Calcutta Universityin 1961 and renamed Rammohan College.

The college enables the women students to pursue higher education that finally helps to enlighten the society. College also upholds the ideals of its founders with the following vision, mission and objectives:

Vision:The Institution wants to achieve excellence in higher education, empowerment through knowledge, inclusive and inductive growth for socio-economic change and sustainable development among the women students.

Mission: The mission of the institution is:

- To equip and empower students with relevant knowledge and soft skills to enhance competence and creativity against ever changing global scenario.
- To achieve innovations in teaching-learning, research and extension activities and to realize national goals, including the adoption and promotion of knowledge output for human resource development.
- To promote women's education as embedded in its proclaimed dictum "Wisdom Belongeth to Reverence".
- To facilitate optimum use of human and limited infrastructural facilities available for quality, sustenance and improvement of our society.
- To promote participation of all the stakeholders in the development of the College.
- To create awareness about civic responsibilities of human rights, value system, culture, heritage, scientific temper and environment.

These are communicated through the official website of the College at http://www.rammohancollege.org, the College **prospectus** published and distributed every year at the time of admission, and through various meetings with the students, staff and other stakeholders (Teachers' Unit, Non-Teaching Staff Association, Students' Union, Parents, Alumni).

Teachers are encouraged to make their classes more interactive and dynamic as well as motivate students towards value based education. Students are also motivated towards personality development by career counselling conducted by teachers. They are also inspired to participate in the seminars, cultural programmes, creative writing in college magazine and National Service Scheme since all of them are required to build a person capable of facing the challenges of society. Moreover Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum arranges popular lectures on social responsibility and progressive views of the Raja on his birth and death anniversarys in the college to spread awareness about core values among the students.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

Though the college has no scope for direct contribution in curriculum design of the undergraduate courses of the University, most of the teachers take part in the workshops for discussion of the respective syllabi where they reflect the need of students and faculty for academic change.

The institution follows the curriculum designed by the University of Calcutta. At the beginning of every academic year, all the departments chalk out an academic calendar which includes lecture hours, topics to be taught and other co-curricular activities to be conducted during the year. The heads of the departments distribute the syllabi among the faculty members of their departments. The faculty members are also given academic diaries, in which they chalk out their teaching plans for the term in order to complete the syllabi within stipulated time. If, for any reason, a faculty fails to finish his/her syllabi within the stipulated time, he/she arranges extra classes for his/her students. Students are also advised to interact with the teachers for discussions outside the class about the already taught subjects/ and associated portions which are not covered due to their absence. Departmental seminars are also organized that possibly helps the students to understand their subject in a value added way.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

- The College prepares an Academic Calendar that specifies the curriculum to be taught by departmental teachers, duration of the session, the date of commencement of internal and external examination and the like. The institution receives regular circulars, letters and emails from the university, regarding the changes or modifications in the curricula. The Principal informs the concerned departments about the changes and gives them a copy of the same. In this way faculty members receive all sorts of support from the university and institution to deploy the curriculum within the time schedule properly.
- When the University implements new patterns of the syllabi, it organizes workshops for
 effective implementation of the curriculum within a session for the teachers. The College
 always encourages its faculty to participate and considers their participation in such
 workshops as responsible duties.
- Moreover, the faculty members of the institution are instructed to place orders or purchase books, reference books, journals of their subject as per their requirement for the betterment of their teaching skills. Facilities such as computer, internet, photocopying machine, printing and scanning are available to the faculty members for the preparation of their teaching materials that may help to present the lessons in an interesting way before the students.

- 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.
 - The Academic Calendar has the detailed programme of the lesson plans for every subject (Honours, General and Compulsory), including distribution of the syllabi among the teachers, enabling the teachers to prepare themselves for the lectures and conduction of examinations.
 - The progress is regularly monitored by the Head of each Department to facilitate effective curriculum delivery and transaction of the Curriculum provided by the University of Calcutta.
 - Computer facility is also provided to all Departments so that faculty members can keep themselves updated and be able to include more and more new information in their lesson plan of respective subject.
 - Courses in all the subjects offered by the College have been updated and made relevant parallel to University curriculum (both theoretical and practical components) which ensure development of practical skills based on theoretical knowledge. Problem solving exercises, field studies/visits, case studies, surveys and excursions including industrial visits, hands-on experience, and project works ensure skill development in relevant subject-areas of study.
 - The College encourages the quest of students for excellence by conducting Departmental seminars.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The institution constantly keeps in touch with its affiliated University of Calcutta. Regular formal and informal meetings are conducted throughout the academic sessions to keep abreast of the latest trends in different fields of study. Academic officials of the institute continuously visit University for thorough update about the modulation/change in curriculum of the subjects/courses related to the undergraduate programme. Professors from the University and research bodies are invited for seminars, discussions, workshops and for professional interactions with the faculty members in the institute. Moreover, most of our faculty members participate in workshops, seminars and conferences at State, National and International levels in curriculum oriented academic and research arena, thereby inculcating the ability for curriculum development and its effective operationalisation. The College collaborates with NGOs, other Institutions and the University in organizing seminars and workshops which address the curriculum of respective subjects directly or indirectly to students. Each and every department conducts examinations, parent teacher meetings and career counselling under the guidance of professionals like The Institute of Company Secretaries of India for the betterment of students.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Boards of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.)

The College cannot design the curriculum, being affiliated to the University of Calcutta. The curricula are framed by the UG Boards of Studies of different subjects and approved by the Academic Council of the University. The institution has to abide by and follow the curricula designed by the University. The university organizes workshops, refresher courses and seminars with all faculty members in different capacities from different colleges affiliated to the University, where information and feedback (student/teacher/stakeholder) for appropriate inclusion is also discussed. In addition the college conducts workshops for discussion of respective syllabi on a regular basis. The faculty of different disciplines take part in various programmes as a member of Board of studies in Calcutta University in different time span; Currently Prof. Suranta Gangopadhyay, Department of Economics, Prof. Subha Roychoudhury, Department of Geography and Prof. Sukanti Datta, Guest Lecturer in English represent the college as members of Board of Studies, University of Calcutta. They try to incorporate the suggestions and rectifications of their colleagues for the betterment of students thereby indirectly contributing to the curricula designing process.

 - A vocational training course for college students and local ladies on Art and Craft is run in theRammohan Roy Memorial Museum under the name "Aparajita". It runs a handicraft section for Batik, Embroidery, Fabric and Glass Painting.
 - A Pre-primary training programme has been started in September 2012by Aparajita. Certificates have been issued to successful students for the last three years.

 - The main mission of the institution is to impart higher education to all sections of the society irrespective of caste and creed and status. The College provides ample opportunities particularly to the weaker and economically backward classes. The College has tried to provide relevant courses which can develop soft skills or practical knowledge in youth for their sustenance in the ever changing world. Some of the students have achieved glorious results in their examinations as well as in the extra-curricular activities. Some of the faculty members of our college take active part in the Boards of Studies and contribute towards modulating and revising the new syllabi. The teachers of this college

- impart necessary value-based education to the students to inculcate moral values among them through classroom-teaching and personal interaction.
- The feed-back is taken from outgoing students and concerned persons like parents of the students,. Based on this feedback, valuable suggestions are made to the teaching faculty for the improvement of their presentations of lessons but the Academic sub committee. The academic-result-graph over the years (academic sessions) also gives a clear picture of the achievements of students..
- The College constantly endeavours to develop the overall personality of the students through various extracurricular activities such as sports, cultural programmes, healthawareness projects and organization of NSS camps. The College fulfils its social obligations by conducting some community-oriented programmes and collecting relief funds in time of social needs.
- College has always considered true education to consist of more than helping students to earn a degree. Happily we observe that our educated and enthusiastic students light the lamp of progress not only in her own family but in the social milieu around her. Year after year we have the pleasure of watching our students fully develop their social and cultural values along with other responsibilities before taking their rightful place in society.

The College has Humanities, Science and Commerce faculties with a total number of 17 departments. The college offers UG Courses — B.A. (Hons. & General), B. Sc. — (Hons. & General), B. Com. — (Hons. & General) & Honours Courses in all subjects except Hindi. The College has started offering a post-graduate course in Physiology (M. Sc. in Human Physiology) from 2006-07 session and Bengali (M. A.) from 2014.

RULES & REGULATIONS

B.Sc. / B.A. / B.Com (Honours and General Course)

- 1. English, and Bengali/Hindi are to be taken as compulsory subjects.

- 4. Excursions: Educational excursions are compulsory curriculam in the Degree course syllabus of Botany, Zoology, Geography and Physiology (General and Honours). It is obligatory for students studying these subjects to join the excursion.

- i) Required at least 75 percent attendance for each part of the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. (Hons./Gen.) Degree Course.
- ii) Candidates with attendance less than 75 percent but not below 60 percent shall be declared "Non-Collegiate" and may be allowed to appear at the concerned examination on payment of requisite Non-Collegiate Fee.
- iii) Candidates with attendance less than 60 percent shall be declared "Discollegiate" and shall be DEBARRED from appearing at the examination.

• Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options:

The Choice-based Credit system in not permissible by the University of Calcutta. Range of Subject options have already been given.

- Courses offered in modular form: All the subjects in UG and PG courses under Calcutta University are offered in modular forms.
- Credit transfer and accumulation facility: No credit transfer and accumulative facility exists.

• Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses:

A student admitted to a particular course is permitted to change the subject/course within a stipulated time on payment of fees as fixed by the affiliated University. **UG programme/course in annual system of 3 years duration has to be completed within 05 years & General Course within 07 years of admission by a student.** The College offers Undergraduate Programmes in Arts, Commerce and Science. The Undergraduate Council of Calcutta University devises the programmes and guidelines. The University allows the students who fail to qualify in any year (General courses only) to sit for the next year or part and at the same time reappear and qualify in the subjects which they had failed to qualify in the previous examination. **But the university follows Semester system in case of post graduate classes in Physiology and Bengali.**

• Enrichment courses: The curricula are designed/framed by the Board of Studies of the Calcutta University. There is not much scope for the College for course enrichment as such. The College facilitates innovative teaching-learning process through seminars/workshops based on the curriculum, audio-visual mode of teaching, study tour/excursion/field-work, project-work, survey-work, up-gradation of ICT based learning resources, use of library and modernization and up gradation of laboratories. Students are encouraged to participate in the seminars, cultural programmes, creative writing in college magazines and wall magazines and games and sports.

The college authority encourages/ grants study leaves to teachers in terms of training for career advancement (towards Orientation, Refresher courses, Seminars and also Post Doctoral Research).

The college monitors the overall performance of the students through various tests (namely class tests ,mid- term tests, election test examinations etc.). To sustain the institutional quality regular academic interactive sessions with the students are held to know about their needs and problems. Parent-teacher meetings are organized to involve the guardians in the academic process.

Teachers take special or tutorial classes for slow learners. In addition, free studentships and scholarships are granted to needy students by the institution and through the Kanyasree Scheme of the West Bengal Government, The selection is done on the basis of class attendance, result and familial condition. The college also offers awards or prizes to the bright students on the basis of their performance, in the Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Yes. The college has self-financed Post Graduate courses on 'Human Physiology' from the session 2006-2007 and on Bengali from the session2014-2015 under the University of Calcutta.

1.2.5 Does the College provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Information Communication Technology is widely and extensively used by the students of Commerce, Physics and Mathematics which is included in the curriculum of Calcutta University. Besides, students of Geography, Zoology and Physiology (Postgraduate) are taught different software applications relevant to regional and global employment markets and research fields. For example, in Mathematics (General) a curriculum of 50 marks on Elements of Computer Science and Programming Language (Basic and FORTRAN 77) is taught with the help of computers. In Mathematics (Hons) a curriculium of 30 marks on Fundamentals of Computer Science and Computer Programming (programming with FORTRAN 77, Introduction to ANSIC) is taught with the help of the computers.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

No. Under the provisions of the Calcutta University to which the college is affiliated there is limited scope of combining the conventional and distance mode of education (vocational subjects). But the college encourages its students to take up vocational training courses in computers etc. besides their regular curriculum. The college offers a certificate course on pre-primary education through 'APARAJITA'- an initiative for the

training and empowerment of less privileged women run by the Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum Committee. Regular yoga classes are also held there. Plans of many such future courses are in the offing.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

Since the curricula for different courses are framed by the Board of Studies with the approval of the Academic Council of the University of Calcutta this affiliated college has to abide by and adopt these curricula.

The Institution has no scope for direct contribution in curriculum design of the undergraduate courses of the University, but most of the teachers took part in the workshops for discussion of respective syllabi in various programmes. In addition, the College conducted a few workshops for discussion of the syllabi of the respective Departments, and by sending model questions to the University.

However, the academic programmes are in line with the institution's goals and objectives. The College aims to impart such knowledge as may be necessary for the all-round development of the students thereby making them capable of being better employed and at par with the highly competitive job markets. The curricula adopted, and developed address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional / national and global trends and developmental needs in the following ways:

- All the UG courses in Humanities have the components related to gender studies, gender sensitization and participation. Thrust has also been given to the national expectations, development studies, unity and integrity of the nation, value-based education and so on.
- Provisions for NSS, NCC, act as forum for community development and extension activities.
- Inculcation of the practice of dignity of labour, sustainable development, Value orientation through NSS camps, special lectures, workshops enrich the learning experience.

- Curriculum-Based field-work and Study tours organized by the departments of Botany,
 Geography, Physiology & Zoology for enrichment of the curriculum and experiential teaching.
- Departments of Botany & Zoology conduct extensive field studies so that the students can get a glimpse of the enormous wealth of Biodiversity in our country. In this respect it is to point out that India is one of the Mega-diversity Centres of the world.
- Department of Botany conducts plant explorations to various phyto-geographical regions of India to study plant community structure.
- In the educational tours, students of Physiology (Hons.) working on human subjects of different socio-economic status record the following parameters: heart rate, blood pressure and anthropometric measurements-physical fitness index (PFI) etc. In addition, diet surveys are done and based on the survey report, the subjects are informed for the betterment of their health.
- Department of Geography studies physical and socio-cultural features of landscape during their excursions. Students carry out plot to plot land survey, market survey and house-hold survey. Micro-relief and drainage features are also identified during the excursions.
- Project works conducted by Commerce departments give emphasis on the various industries and their functioning. Project works on Environmental studies are aimed to study different aspects of the environmental components & functioning.
- There is a well-designed modern Computing Laboratory in the IT section of the Department of Commerce.
- Innovative Teaching-Learning Procedure for most subjects with teaching aids like audiovisual mode of teaching (Flow Charts, Overhead Projector, LCD Projector, and Laptop) which is a part of today's teaching learning process.
- Faculty Exchange Programmes/Extension Lectures are organized in the institution. They stimulate the minds of the learners and thus help them in uplifting their intellectual

standard. The College provides ample opportunities for students' career advancement by arranging career oriented lectures and counselling sessions.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

Self Development:

- Deputation of the faculty members to orientation/refresher courses, workshops on curriculum development, examination reforms, quality initiatives, and management issues.
- Deputation of teachers for faculty upgradation programme and capacity building programmes.
- Short-term training programmes to non-teaching staff on computerization.
- Organizing seminars, project-works and Counselling on curriculum and employability options for students.

Employment, Global and National demands:

- B.A. in Social Science subjects have relevant topics like gender studies & sensitization,
 politics & political philosophy which are suited to global trends and have relevant thrust
 towards communication skills. The acquaintance with the use of computers is a must to
 face global challenges.
- All courses ensure both knowledge and skill development leading to global competence.

Introduction of ICT:

There is provision for computers in teaching—learning and evaluation. However the
 College has not introduced smart classrooms yet.

- 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum.
 - The Grievance Redressal Cell of the College takes care of the rights of ladies—both students and staff.
 - Environmental Studies is a compulsory subject of 100 marks for inculcating environmental awareness.
 - Besides, the NSS Unit offers a platform for awareness regarding Climate Change and Environmental Education through talks, skits and other such programmes.
 - The Grievance Redressal Cell caters to the issues regarding Human Rights violations. Seats are reserved for SC, ST, OBC & physically challenged candidates according to norms laid down by the Government of West Bengal and the University. This serves the cause of social justice, ensures equality and increases access to higher education.
 - An exhibition is to be held on global warming in January 2016 through the joint initiative of Rammohan College and Brahmo Girls' School.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

Moral and ethical values: The value-orientated curricula of Humanities subjects give the students opportunities of self development that inculcates in them core values like self-respect, , sincerity, honesty and hard-work. The NSS organises talks on value education on World Youth Day (12th January) every year.

Better career options: Career oriented Vocational Courses, which can be pursued simultaneously with the regular undergraduate programmes to encourage skill development among students has been introduced by "Aparajita", a unit of The Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum to face the global requirements successfully. A Pre-primary Training Programme has been started by it from 2012. All courses ensure both knowledge and skill development for enhancing competence to face the global scenario.

Community orientation: For serving the community and the nation our college NSS volunteers participate in various social-welfare activities. Extension lectures are also organized for community orientation.

- 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.
 - **Students'-Feedback** on Curriculum is obtained by the College from each student after the completion of the course, in a definite format every year.
 - Alumni: The informal Alumni Association of the College "Purbatani" gives feedback on curriculua.
 - Parents: The College obtains feedback on the implementation of curriculum from the Parents at the time of the parents-teachers meetings organized by each department regularly.
 - Employers/Industries: NA
 - Academic peers: The College obtains feedback on curriculum from those who visit the
 College from time to time during seminars.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The Principal, with the help of various sub-committees takes care of the institutional enrichment programmes. The conveners of all enrichment programmes conducted during the academic year present the report annually to the Principal. The institution thus, makes sure that the programmes offered and other extra-curricular and co-curricular activities bear the relevance to some important regional, global, national issue and thus, inculcate moral and ethical values among learners. Moreover feedback from the stakeholders helps in monitoring and evaluating the quality of the enrichment programmes.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The College cannot design the curriculum, as it is an affiliated college under the University of Calcutta. The curricula are framed by the UG Board of Studies of different subjects and approved by the Academic Council of the University. As an affiliated college, the institution has to abide by and follow the curriculum designed by the University. However, assessment and development of information database is possible with participation of the faculty members from the affiliated colleges. Some teachers of the College, being members of the Board of Studies, take active part in framing, modifying and implementing the University syllabi of the degree courses.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Yes there is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum. The feedback thus obtained by the College is analyzed and the suggestions that are obtained after analyses are communicated to the affiliating University for appropriate inclusion and continuous improvements.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?

New programme/courses introduced:

- The Department of Bengali introduced PG course in Bengali from the academic session 2014-15 during which period 28 students took admission in Rammohan College.
- Vocational course on Art & Craft and Pre-primary Training has been initiated by "Aparajita".

• Remedial Courses for poor learners belonging to the non-creamy layer of the society.

Rationale for introducing new programme/courses:

- During their visit, the NAAC peer team being impressed with the rich academic performance of the good number of faculty, advised the Department of Bengali to introduce the PG course as early as possible. In addition to this there is a strong demand from students of our and neighbouring colleges to study MA in Bengali to fulfil their dream for higher education since there are limited PG seats in the University of Calcutta.
- The college introduced a vocational training course for college students and local ladies on Art and Crafts in the Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum under the name "Aparajita". It runs a handicraft section for Batik, Embroidery, Fabric and Glass Painting.
- Aparajita also conducts a Pre-primary Training Programme for students.
- The college introduced the "Yoga Centre" for college students and neighbouring ladies in the Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum. It is intended to improve their health and mental well being.
- The College recently started a Gymnasium in the old building for the students.

Any other relevant information regarding curricular aspects which the College would like to include.

The college intends to include the following aspects as early as possible

- Smart classrooms with all modern facilities.
- Wi-Fi in the New Science Building.
- Professional skill development programme for staff.
- Civil Service training programme.

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

There is 100% transparency in the admission process which is online followed by counselling for honours students. General student are admitted offline.

The College ensures publicity in admission in the following ways:-

- (a) **Notices:** The College displays the dates and information regarding online admission to B.A./ B.Sc. (Only Honours) & B.Com (Hons. & General) Course in the notice board.
- (b) Website: The College has developed its own website http://www.rammohancollege.org in which the online admission takes place. College ensures publicity in the admission process by notification hosted on College website to provide ready and relevant information to stakeholders regarding admission. (Eligibility criteria, intake capacity, rules and regulations, fee structure, courses offered all admission related information, list of candidates selected for admission according to merit, and regular announcements of merit lists as the counselling proceeds in the college and students get admitted).
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) Merit (ii) Common Admission Test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) Combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.
- (i) Students who have the required marks in the +2 level are admitted both in Honours and General courses.
- (ii) No CAT is conducted by state and national agencies.
- (iii) Admission takes place on the basis of merit.
- (iv) The financially backward students are provided with concessions by the institution. They can also apply to the *Kanyashree Scheme* (Govt. of W.B) which gives funds for the education of the girl child. Besides that teachers also often help poor students by providing them with admission fees and books. Book grants of Rs. 500/- given by the College to needy students.
- 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

The B.A./B.Sc./B.Com Honours programme requires minimum 45% of marks in aggregate and 50% of marks in the subject opted for Honours for admission as per the guidelines of the University of Calcutta.

The B.A./B.Sc./B.Com General programme requires minimum pass percentage of marks for admission as per the University of Calcutta rules.

2.1.4. Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

YES. The admission committee reviews the admission process of the previous years and student profile annually and accordingly takes necessary steps for qualitative improvement of the admission process. Sometimes, even de-reservation of seats is done to fill seats if they go vacant. Accordingly, this year also the admission committee took certain measures to give quality service to students and ensure a smooth and transparent admission process in this current academic session 2015-16.

As the time of admission in the B.A./B.Sc./B.Com Honours and General Courses on specific dates allotted, teachers meet the respective candidates according to merit list, verify their details of marks provided and approve their admission on fulfilment of all criteria, post which they pay the fees in the office and get admitted. The prospectus of the college is given to students who are ready to get admitted.

The admission policy of the institution is to follow strictly the Government guidelines as given below:-

Differently abled – 3%

Women: This is a college for women only. Women from all segments of society are given access irrespective of caste, creed and status.

Differently-abled: There is 3% reservation. No Special institutional measures are taken for differently-abled students but individual care of such students are taken by teachers.



The reasons for the increase in student intake is the quality of education provided by our college and the fact that this is a morning college which enables students to study and do jobs at the same time without any clash of interests and time.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1. How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The Institution strictly follows all Government rules and regulations regarding admission of the differently-abled students. As per University rule there are 3% reservations for differently-abled students. They are given special guidance and counselling by the teachers of the respective departments.

However, the college does not have additional facilities to cater to the needs of differently-abled students.

2.2.2. Does the institution access the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, before the commencement of a new programme, a deliberation by the Principal followed by the teachers of the departments is organised for the students. After commencement of the class the basic knowledge of the student is judged by the teachers and in the initial classes they recapitulate the previous subject matters to bridge up the gap if any.

The performance of the students in the class XII examination is the basis of assessing the student's knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programmes. They are admitted as per University of Calcutta norms. In the PG course of Physiology and Bengali the criteria for admission is set by respective departments and students are admitted accordingly.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge / Remedial / Add-on / Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

To bridge the knowledge gap of the students the following strategies are taken by the institution: Slow learners among the students are identified and given special attention. Remedial classes are organized for such slow learners. Special theoretical, tutorial and practical classes are arranged by each Laboratory based Department. Personalised interaction with the teachers helps the students to eliminate their weak points. The teachers guide them to prepare model answers by providing books, reading materials and advice. Students also interact regularly with teachers outside the classroom, either individually or in groups to address their course related or other general problems.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The College has a Grievance Redressal Cell. If there is any incident of female harassment or gender based discrimination, the complaint is lodged in this Cell first. Then the Cell reports the matter through the departmental head to the Principal. Thereafter, the highest authority of the college investigates the matter and takes necessary actions in consultation with the Cell.

Various activities are organised by the NSS unit of the College throughout the year which are as follows:

- Celebration of World Youth day on 12th January (Vivekananda's Birthday) with students processions and lectures.
- Celebration of World Environment Day on 5th June with various awareness programmes.
- Regular blood tests for blood grouping and Thalassemia are also held.

The college campus has been declared a No-smoking and a No polythene zone.

2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational / learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution identifies the special learning and educational needs of advanced learners by interacting with them directly on the basis of the feedback of the teachers concerned. Special reference books are recommended to them as well as special classes are organized. They are motivated to refer to advanced texts and journals which are available in College library. They are also encouraged to apply for different scholarships. Different departments organize special seminars on selected reference topics. The college encourages students to participate in inter college debate, quiz etc where they can excel themselves in the fields of their interest.

2.2.6. How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. Who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

All relevant information of admitted students is preserved in the College office. Results of College and University examinations are preserved in the College office as well. Students results in mid- term tests are maintained by their departments. Special care is taken for slow learners and students from the non creamy layer of society so that they can gradually cope with the University curricula and Examination. The Academic Sub-Committee of the college collects data of the academic performances of the students by assessing them in tutorial, mid-term and selection test examinations. A number of ways are adopted for their support both financially and socially keeping in mind that education for women is very important in this age.

These data are used to improve the academic performances of the college in the following ways:

- Concessions of tuitions fees are provided
- Personal counselling by the teachers is done.
- Bilingual explanations and discussions in classes are encouraged.
- Kanyashree Scholarships offered by the State Government to the deserving girl students have been introduced.
- The College extends financial assistance for books and study materials to the economically weaker students from its Students" Aid Fund created by the College itself.
- Some departments maintain a contingency fund to give financial aid to the needy students of the concerned department.
- Apart from this, expenditure incurred for field study to needy students is also provided.

 The College also encourages its students through various prizes.
- (Please refer to Criterion V for details about financial assistance).

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1. How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The college follows the academic schedule of the University of Calcutta to which it is affiliated. The Academic Calendar is printed in the College prospectus which is given to each student during admission. Before the commencement of the session the heads of all departments meet respective faculty and distribute the work load on the basis of the University curriculum. Each teacher makes his/her own teaching plan so that he / she can complete the allotted portion of the syllabus in time. Students are evaluated as per the University guidelines.

Students of different UG/PG Departments have access to the internet while preparing projects. Teachers of various departments, particularly the Post Graduate departments, regularly follow computer assisted learning methods to make the classes more interesting and comprehensive.

The following is an annual in-house calendar which the college follows in structuring its activities in accordance with the University schedule:

- 7. Annual Prize distribution and Sports (January- February)
- 8. Annual picnic of the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college.
- 9. Summer recess

As per directions from the University the college hosts B.A, B.Sc, B.Com Part-I or II or III examination every year. Teachers assigned invigilation duties have to be present throughout the examination period.

2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The IQAC coordinator was selected on 1.9.2009 in our college but due to unavoidable circumstances the IQAC could not function. However, the IQAC was reconstituted in October, 2015. On 13.10.2015 the IQAC coordinator and members were selected in the Teachers council meeting and it was approved by the Governing Body on 16.10.2015. Please note that the AQAR for the last four years will be submitted by the newly formed IQAC before the submission of the LOI and SSR.

The College IQAC team hopes to take several measures to improve the teaching-learning process in accordance with the guidelines of NAAC. The team will annually receive feedback from the third year collegiate students. Till date this process was monitored by the Academic Sub-Committee. Now the IQAC would play an active role in the process. The outgoing students would anonymously rate the College, the department in which the student was enrolled, the teachers and infrastructure of the College in terms of Libraries, Laboratories and other facilities. These reports would be analysed for strategic development.

The IQAC team is working to improve teaching learning process by-

- Planning to introduce more modern teaching aid to improve the teaching learning process.
- Also planning to introduce inter-disciplinary programmes and short term add on courses like Communicative English and Personality development courses for students.
- Enhancement of infrastructural facilities in terms of space, equipments, laboratories and libraries.

- Organization of intra institutional seminars, workshops and conferences to spread academic and social awareness.
- Arrangement for feedback response from students, parents and alumni on the institution and the academic standard.
- Preparation of Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) as per guidelines and parameters of NAAC, to be submitted to NAAC every year.

2.3.3. How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

One of the clear emphases in the academic vision of the college is the need to respect the talent and independence of the student. The students are guided, inspired and motivated in best possible manners. The college offers Remedial courses, financial aid, awards, special classes and tutorials to groom the students. The college has a rich Central library and seminar libraries. Besides regular chalk and talk methods, use of models and charts, LCD projector, internet access, and laboratories with modern equipments are the approaches to make the education more learner centric. Beside these, frequents seminars, debates and lectures are organized. This is accompanied by experimental teaching, field work, surveys, experiments and practical classes.

Post Graduate students of Physiology department complete a dissertation as part of their academic curriculum. Students are also encouraged to join research projects of esteemed institutions. They also visit various research institutes to be familiarised with the research works and laboratories of the Institutes. Post graduate students of Bengali also submit a dissertation as a part of their curriculum.

2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Rammohan College provides open access to educational and life-long learning opportunities to the students. It helps them to develop discipline, leadership, entrepreneurship.

The Institution takes several steps to nurture critical thought, creativity and scientific approach among the students.

- Organizing special lectures based on the curricula
- Similarly, students' seminars are frequently conducted to inculcate independent critical thinking as well as collaborative learning among the students.

- Excursions and field work help to correlate the theoretical and practical classes.
- The Remedial coaching classes, the Grievance Redressal Cell and the Anti-Ragging Cell benefit the students.
- The participation of the students in various cultural and sports activities helps in their personality development.

The fact that the Alumni of the college have excelled themselves in diverse fields of service and responsibility is proof enough that our approach is valid and wholesome. (*Please refer to 5.1.14 of criterion no. V – Students Support and Progression for details*). At present and informal Alumni Association called "*Purbatani*" is functioning. Attempts are being made to form a registered Alumni Association.

2.3.5. What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning-resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

- The different Humanities departments of the college like Bengali, English and History teachers through lecture method, debate and discussion method, and socio economic surveys based on the syllabus.
- Physics, Mathematics, and Commerce departments teach through the lecture method, project based method and computer assisted learning.
- Other Science departments like Chemistry and Bio-sciences follow different experimental learning methods, excursions and field work.
- Despite the use of modern technology and tools of teaching the age proof chalk and talk method continues to be effective. There are plans to introduce smart class rooms and ICT in the near future.

2.3.6. How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- Students are assigned to write articles for wall magazines and college magazine.
- The faculty upgrades itself through research work and publications.

- The teachers attend various national and international conferences regularly and present papers there. They also publish papers in peer reviewed journals.
- Many teachers of this college are invited as guest lecturers to various institutions and Universities.
- Various departments organize seminars and update their knowledge about latest development in their fields
- Student-teacher interactions outside the classrooms mainly focus on topics and themes beyond the syllabi.

2.3.7. Detail (process and the number 4 of students/ benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling / mentoring/ academic advise) provided to students?

Statistical and other information is provided in Criterion V –Student support and progression. The senior teaches of the college counsel the students when required so that they can cope up with the demand and pressure of increasing competition.

2.3.8. Provide details of innovative teaching approaches / methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the effort made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

- ➤ The college is committed to the pursuit of excellence and continues to follow the conventional teaching methodology and lecture mode. However, the efficient tutorial systems in the college facilitate the individual teachers to adopt and adapt new modes and methods which they implement without affecting the curricular structure designed by the University.
- ➤ Innovative teaching methods are adopted by the faculty through both conventional and technological advantages. (Please refer to the answer to question 2.3.5 for available technological facilities)
- ➤ The institute also encourages the faculty to participate in teaching oriented programmes / seminars.

2.3.9. How are library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The rich Central Library and Seminar Libraries provide books to students for reference work. The students use this additional information to augment the study material provided by the teachers. Journals preserved in the library are also the source of knowledge and information. (For details please refer to 4.2 of Criterion IV – Infrastructure and Learning Resources).

2.3.10. Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, sometimes the institution faces certain challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar due to loss of working days and classes caused by prolonged University examination schedules. Then the teachers come forward to take extra classes during vacations to complete the syllabi. The students are also encouraged to contact teachers and ask for special tutorials and doubt clearing sessions.

2.3.11. How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The college tries to improve its academic functioning, based on the report of the academic results, students' attendance and the feedback obtained from the outgoing students by the Academic Sub-Committee. The performance of the students in University Examinations indicates the standard of teaching learning system of the institute. On the basic of this the College continues its efforts to improve the teaching-learning process. The reports of the Departmental meetings are submitted to the Principal on a regular basis, who takes necessary action in consultation with the Academic Sub-Committee.

The college follows a systematic and well organized procedure in selecting the faculty as accepted by the government of west Bengal. The empanelled candidates from the West Bengal College Service Commission are selected through interview by the members of the governing body of the college, representative from the university, subject experts and head of the concerned department. Recently many of the full time post have been filled up with well qualified and competent teachers. The college has also recruited part time and guest lecturers to meet the requirements of the curriculum and students.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

After annual survey by the academic sub-committee a detailed plan is drawn up about the needs of each department accordingly advertisement are given on website and newspaper for guest lecturers in different subjects. All recruitments are made as per government rule. The college, after sorting out the application, conducts interviews and then recruits eligible candidates according to the needs of the departments. Post graduate departments like physiology and Bengali are self financed. The faculty includes in house teachers, guest lecturers and retired teachers. However the college does not have subjects like IT, Biotechnology, Bioinformatics yet but hopes to developed infra structure for these in future.

Each department conducts regular meetings to allot classes and discuss curriculum. Modules are allotted to teachers who are well-versed or have specialized knowledge in the area. The library is continuously upgraded with books according to the new curriculum. Some of the departments have laptops and desk top computers to assist in teaching. The pure Science and Bio-Science departments use audio visual tools and often teach through power point presentation. All these help the students in better understanding their subjects. However the College does not have smart classrooms with ICT yet but hopes to introduce these in the near future.


Yes, the college has introduced annual evaluation of the teachers by the out going students through exit questionnaires. These forms are duly filled up by the students who give their opinions about the quality of teaching, infrastructure and facilities available. Strict anonymity is maintained while filling up the forms. These are then presented to the Academic sub-committee. On the basis of the feedback changes are incorporated into the system on feasible matters. This is done by the Academic sub-committee in consultation with the Heads of departments, Principal and Vice-Principal.


























2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1. How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The major stake holders of any institution especially the students and the faculty are made aware about the evaluation processes of the College and the University through the Prospectus and the Academic Calendar at the time of admission. The teachers also inform the students about different examinations in each calendar year and the question patterns.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The University of Calcutta has initiated major evaluation reforms since 2007-2008. Under the new 1+1+1 system(2009), the University examination is held at the end of each academic year. The syllabi and question pattern have been reformed and mobilised from 2010. The pattern of question papers is modular. As per the directions of the University Mid-term examinations are held in late November or early December to assess the students at College level since 2008-2009. Before appearing for the University examinations, students have to pass in the selection tests. From 2013 practical examinations of Science subjects are held at home centres.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

It is the duty of the Institution to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University as well as initiate some changes on its own. For the former regular contact is maintained with the Controller of Examinations and the Registrar, (C.U.) Three teachers of the college are members of the Board of Studies and attend regular meetings to exchange information. They also inform the College about various reforms introduced by other colleges (within the confines of the University guidelines) for the betterment of the institution, which the College then implements through the Academic Sub-Committee. The College also has its own internal examination system (Class tests and Mid-term tests) and this helps round the year assessment of students.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to maeasure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative assessment: Every year, each honours student has to appear for the Mid-term Test held in November – December. The students are shown their corrected answer scripts and their strengths and weaknesses are discussed. After the results are out, each department organizes Parent – Teacher meetings which are attended by the guardians of all honours students. The students and their guardians interact with the faculty of different departments. Guardians are informed about the attendance & performance of their wards. The guardians also give valuable feedback to the departments which is later discussed in meetings and incorporated whenever feasible.

This effective feedback to guardians and faculty alike help in the qualitative improvement of the teaching-learning-evaluation process. Selection tests of Part – III, Part – II and Part – I examinations are held

in January, February and March respectively. On assessing these results, special classes are arranged for slow learners. Students are also evaluated through home assignments and tutorials. Third year Under Graduate students (Honours & Pass) and Post Graduate students of Bengali & Physiology under take project work.

Summative assessment:

The University of Calcutta has a set examination pattern for each academic session.

Part – I:

- a) 2 Honours papers of 100 marks each.
- b) 1 General papers of 100 marks
- c) 2 Compulsory language papers of 50 marks each

Part - II:

- a) 2 Honours papers of 100 marks each.
- b) 2 General papers of 100 marks (One Practical paper of 100 marks for Science Stream)

Part - III:

- a) 4 Honours papers of 100 marks each.
- b) ENVS paper of 100 marks including compulsory project work.

Examples of positive impact:

Rammohan College mainly caters to students belonging to the financially weaker section of society. A large number of them are also first generation learners. Despite these limitations a number of students have fared very well at the final examination of the University (U.G Level). As an example the final results of B.A, B.Sc, B.Com Part – III honours examination (2014-2015) of Rammohan College is given to show the positive impact.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc).

Internal assessment of students is a rigorous, continuous and transparent process. The Question pattern prescribed by Calcutta University is followed. The record of marks of all internal examinations is maintained centrally though each Department also keeps the records of the marks of Mid-term examinations. The answer scripts of the students are shown and analyzed. Students are encouraged to participate in debates and discussions, seminars, projects and various co-curricular activities for their all round development. Weightages are assigned for their overall performances internally though no such weightages are assigned for by the University.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The University of Calcutta has, through its reform of syllabi and question pattern at the U.G Level, tried to ensure that the students gain an in-depth knowledge of their respective subjects. The College also tries to make sure the students become self reliant, skilful in communication and presentation and imbibe values which help them to serve society. The College does so by not only imparting knowledge in different subjects to the students but also encouraging them to participate actively in extracurricular activities like sports and debates and social service like the NSS.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

At the College Level grievances regarding evaluation are addressed in the following ways:

- a) Answer scripts are shown to the students and their mistakes are explained.
- b) If the student is still dissatisfied then she may approach the Head of the department about her results
- c) Finally she may take the matter up with the Grievance Redressal Cell and the members of the Cell and the Principal would deal with the issue.

At the University Level, if the student is dissatisfied with the evaluation, she may

- a) Apply for scrutiny or re-examination(or both) of her answer script in the prescribed format which would be forwarded to Calcutta University by the Principal.
- b) She may even demand for a photocopy of her answer script.
- c) Finally she may seek the intervention of the Controller of Examination or the Vice-Chancellor, University of Calcutta to settle the issue.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes the College has always stressed the motto 'Knowledge is power". The College believes in outlining the goal of progress in its proper perspective, defining career orientation together with a natural flair for developing other talents in the vocational field. The Rammohan Ray Memorial Museum provides the students with the not-too distant history of Rammohan Ray and his times. It is augmented by frequent visits to the Indian Museum for acquaintance with art, architecture and culture of ancient India.

2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

The progress and performances of every student is monitored by individual departments. After every test—mid- term and selections—results are displayed in the college notice boards. Students are shown their corrected answer scripts and their performance discussed. Regular parent teacher meetings keep the guardians informed about the progress of their wards. Students from economically challenged section of society are given special attention through extra classes, handing simplified books and personalised care. Under Graduate classes are addressed in both English and the vernacular... The quality of students across the departments is varied because the admission process also varies. Though all departments follow the University norms for admission, the quality of students vary from department to department because some departments manage to admit students with much better marks than the other departments, without violating University criteria. But though the ethos of the College rests on the fulfilment of the individual, it is not at the cost of weeding out the marginal. It is for this reason an analysis would point out a diverse pattern in the performance of students in University examinations as illustrated in the following tables:

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievements of the intended learning outcomes are as follows:

- 1. Well ventilated classrooms.
- 2. Class tests, written assignments, tutorials & Unit tests, mid-term tests, group discussions and oral questions asked in class. An interactive learner centric approach is practiced.
- 3. Students are encouraged to attend Seminars & Workshops.
- 4. Well equipped Library, (Central & Seminar).
- 5. Well equipped Laboratories for Science Stream. Medicinal Plants are used by the Botany Department & the Animal House is used by the Zoology & Physiology Departments for Practical Classes & Research work.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The College gives scope to the students to develop their skills in writing and sketching in the College and Wall Magazines. The Aparajita Centre in Rammohan Ray Memorial Museum conducts Certificate courses on the Pre Primary Teachers' Training & Yoga. In October, 2010 the Rammohan College students participating in the Inter College debate Competition organised by Griha Adhikar Mancha secured the 1st & 2nd positions. 45 students have won the Udayan Shalini Fellowship to join Vocational Courses in Jadavpur University in 2011-12.Of these, however, only one could complete the course successfully. A day long Seminar organised jointly by Rammohan College and Indian Science Congress Association on the topic Science for shaping The Future of India on October 6, 2012 gave a boost to scientific learning of the Institution. A State Bank of India project encouraged 29 students of the different department to participate in Summer Workshop between 13th May to 22nd July 2013 (please refer to 5.1.8 of Criterion V-Student Support And Progression for details).

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The Institution collects data from the Departments about students learning out comes. The departments assimilate data primarily on the basis of results in the College & University Examinations and analyse this in consultation with the Academic Sub-Committee. Response to questions asked in class and attendance are also considered. The slow learners are given special coaching by departmental teachers. Remedial classes are also organised.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The College authority along with the Academic Sub Committee checks the attendance of students before Selection tests. Scripts of Class Mid-term and Selection tests are shown to the students and discussed. Regular parent teacher meetings are held to interact with the guardians. Results of University examinations are discussed in the Academic Sub-Committee where each Head of the Department gives feedback. Accordingly extra classes and special classes are taken by some departments to help the students.

Yes, the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance and achievement of learning objectives and planning. Students are given special

attention in the 3rd Year as they graduate at that time and might appear from competitive examinations or pursue higher studies. Teachers are readily available with advise, suggestions and help.

3.1 PROMOTION OF RESEARCH

3.1.1. Does the Institution have recognized research centre/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

No. The College does not have any recognized research centre. Several faculty members of Zoology, Physiology, Botany departments are actively involved in research work and acting as Principal Investigators of Research scholars under the University of Calcutta.

3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

Yes. There is a Special Research Committee in the College comprising the following members-

- ➤ Chairperson, Governing Body
- Principal
- Vice-Principal
- Bursar
- ➤ Convener-UGC Committee
- ➤ Head(s) of the concerned Department(s)

The Research Sub-Committee facilitates and monitors research activities in different departments. The committee holds meetings in order to discuss various plans to promote research and motivate the faculties to be involved in more research activities.

Few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact:

- Development of Animal House facility for animal research.
- To develop herbal garden with some medicinal and ornamental plants.
- To develop the central instrumentation facility.
- Research space in all the departments.
- The committee provides necessary help to the interested faculty members to apply for research grants from different sponsoring agencies (such as UGC) and also guide them, wherever required, to carry out research projects.
- The committee also recommended that the research scholars should be given infrastructural

facilities by the College authority as required, according to the space available and the priority of the requirements.

Impact of the recommendations

Creating Minimum Infrastructure to carry out research initiatives

- Central animal house facility has been developed and approved by Institutional Animal Ethics Committee. The Animal House has already been registered by the CPCSEA, Govt. of India (Reg. No. 1795/PO/Ere/S14CPCSEA).
- The college has also formed one "Institutional Ethics Committee for Biomedical Research involving human subjects", as per norms of Indian Council for Medical Research (ICMR) to monitor research plans and activities on human subjects.
- Garden with medicinal plants has been already developed and maintained properly.
- Provision of 'Central Instrumentation Room' and research space is under process.
- Some MRP has already been approved and some are under process.
- Provided computer facilities for all the Science departments along with Commerce. Purchased books according to the need of the faculties.

3.1.3. What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

- Autonomy to the Principal Investigator: Yes. Full autonomy is given to the Principal Investigator by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects.
- Timely availability or release of resources: Yes. The Institution makes all necessary arrangements for timely availability or release of resources for smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects.
- Adequate infrastructure and human resources: Yes. Adequate infrastructure and human resources are provided by the institution as far as practicable.
- Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers: Due to the shortage of manpower and guidance of the University statute, it is not possible to time-off or reduce the teaching load of the teachers engaged in research. Though the provision of special duty leave is there for participation in National and International seminar. Moreover, the teachers engaged in research work have the full liberty to utilize the laboratories and common facilities for their

research work during daytime after class hours.

- Support in terms of technology and information needs: Yes. The institution encourages and extends all help possible to promote research activities in the institution.
- Facilitate timely auditing and submission of Utilization Certificate to the funding authorities: The institution monitors and facilitates timely auditing and submission of Utilization Certificate to the funding authorities.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and Research culture and aptitude among students?

Several departments of the college regularly organize seminars, symposiums etc. to motivate the students to involve in research work in future.

From 2009 onwards, ten students are carrying out their research in Physiology and Zoology department after successful completion of their post-graduation course. One student of ours already completed his Ph.D. degree and now actively engaged in postdoctoral research at IMCB, Singapore.

3.1.8 Enumerate the efforts of the institution in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students?

The Institution regularly organizes conferences, seminars and workshops in order to encourage researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students. Recently Prof. G.G. Roy (IIT Bombay), Prof. Kasturi Sen Roy (SNDT Women's University), Prof. Animesh Dhar and Prof. Sushanta K. Banerjee both from University of Kansas Medical Center, USA visited our college and delivered scientific lectures for the research scholars and PG students.

There is no specific provision in the statute of University of Calcutta for sabbatical leave but teachers enjoy the FDP programme of UGC for doing their Ph.D. thesis. Special study leave has also been sanctioned to faculty members for carrying out research in the institute abroad.

3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)

Some specific research projects were under taken by the teachers of several departments, which includes:-

- Recommendation made for female labours engaged in aqua-culture for improvement of their health and working conditions by forming co-operative fishing farm and integrated fishing farm.
- Recommendation made to alleviate prevalence of hypertension among Kolkata based policemen.
- Research study was conducted on waiters of different singing bars of Kolkata by performing audiometry and noise level measurement during their work period to recommend measures to be taken to reduce the extent of occupational health hazards.
- Anthropometric and physiological studies have made on local rickshaw pullers and recommendations were made for improvement of their health.

The various departments and faculties of the institute interact with each other in undertaking interdisciplinary research. Faculties of the departments of Economics and Mathematics also interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research. Faculties of departments of Zoology and Geography collaborated and submitted a project on the geographical and geochemical effect on birds of different tea gardens of North Bengal.

Teachers engaged in research work along with their research scholars utilize various sophisticated instruments purchased not only from their research grant but also purchased from the additional grant received from UGC in all the departments.

The institution undertakes NSS programme since 2006. Each year one hundred students enroll and fifty students participate annually in ten days camp organized by NSS. Besides most of the faculty members assist and actively participate in different programmes of NSS.

Survey/research activities conducted by the Department of Physiology of this institution.

- Anthropometric and physiological studies have made on local rickshaw pullers along with their diet survey. Relevant recommendations were communicated to them to improve their health and hygiene in the month of February 2013.
- Audiometry and noise level measurement of waiters of different singing bars were done in the month of February-April 2013, and necessary suggestions to the authorities have been communicated to alleviate occupational health hazards of the waiters, due to heavy noise exposure during their work time.
- NSS has been started from 2006. The students under NSS carry on different social programmes. They carry on plantation programme on 5th June (World Environment Day) every year and also join various programmes conducted by University of Calcutta. During special camp, the students participate in various campaign programmes including campaign against malaria, dengue, thalassemia and also for literacy among the slum dwellers.

Counselling is also done by the teachers individually/personally as per requirements of the students. Emphasis is given on psychological counselling for betterment of their emotional health. A psychological counselling programme was organised by N.S.S, Rammohan College in the year 2012. The progarmme was guided by Dr. Chayanika Ghosh, a clinical psychologist on mentally challenged people, women & Child development & Social Development. The college has taken different measures to provide career counselling /career advancement for the students, such as:

- i) The College offers UGC sponsored free coaching for students on NET (till 2012) course and Entry in service course (till 2014). As mentioned earlier both have been temporarily discontinued.
- ii) The college received grants from UGC for career counselling. In the year 2013 about 29 students of 3rd year have joined a eight weeks' 'summer internship' at 'State Bank of India'.
- iii) Eminent Academicians and NGO came to interact with students.
- iv) 'National Stock Exchange' came to conduct a workshop in September 2012.
- v) A few number of students joined the programme of B.P.O Training organised by T.C.S. in the year 2011.Two of them secured jobs.

Placement unit –There is no such placement unit within the campus.

Health Centre - There is no health centre in the college. But there is a First Aid Box to provide First Aid Treatment for students and staff. Sometimes N.S.S unit organizes health camps for physical check up, which includes pressure, height, weight and general check up and blood group test of all students.

Canteen - Students' Canteen - 01 Staff Canteen - 01

Recreational spaces for staff and students -

There is a spacious staff room for all teachers in the old building and there are four separate staff rooms for the teachers of the Psychology, Zoology, Botany and Bengali departments in the new science building. Students have a common room for recreation in the old building.

Safe drinking water facility - Safe drinking water facility is provided for all staff and students. Aqua Guard with purifier is installed in different places of the college (old & new building).

<u>Auditorium</u> - Yes, there is a small auditorium in the college for cultural and academic activities. There are plans to set up a large auditorium with modern audio-visual systems.

Out of 16 Departments (Hindi is only as a compulsory subject), 10 Departments have their own desktop computers. In addition to these 3 Departments have Laptops. All the computers are with internet connection. Students & teachers have access to the computers of the Library during the College hours.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

The IT infrastructure in the College is regularly updated. Almost all the departments along with the Library & Office use computers with internet connection. In addition there is also an IT application Laboratory of the Department of Commerce in the New Science Building with a good number of computers. In future the target of the College is to develop the New Science Building as a free Wi Fi zone.

4.3.4. Provide details on the provision made in the annual budget for procurement, up gradation, deployment and maintenance of the computers and their accessories in the institution (year wise for last four years)

There is no fixed budget. However, accounts of the last four years show that on an average Rs. 1,20,000/- has been spent annually to buy computers and accessories mostly with the help of the UGC grant. All computers are under AMC and maintained regularly. There is no IT wastage.

4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided reaching/learning materials by its staff and students?

Rammohan College is a part of <u>triple share institution</u> where three individual colleges are run by respective authorities in the same building. As a result, it has very little scope to enhance computer-aided teaching/learning method in all class-rooms. Fortunately, the college owns a second campus where most of the classrooms are enabled with requisite arrangements so that teachers and students are capable of using POWER-POINT devices and related technologies. There are plans to develop smart classrooms with ICT facilities in future.

4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching-learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.

There is no doubt about the fact that traditionally, Rammohan College is student-centric. Teachers are quite friendly and enthusiastic to improve the technology-based skill of the students. Whenever a new machine or apparatus is provided, even if a desktop or laptop, teachers encourage students to learn about it. For example, in Economics department, 3rd year honours students have been taught how to use a laptop. Among the students, the more technology-friendly ones, in turn, teach their fellow classmates how to use new technology. As a result, the teacher becomes the FACILITATOR where as the student is placed at the receiving end of the teaching-learning process.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipments of the college?

The equipments and instruments purchased are kept in different departmental laboratories. The college maintains departmental asset register for the laboratory based subjects where equipments and instruments purchased and used are recorded. A general asset register is also maintained that record common usage equipments such as photocopy machines, printers and computers.

Most of the equipments and instruments in use are maintained and serviced as and when necessary by competent work personnel after approval of the department and the college authority. The cost is either borne by the departmental contingency fund or by the college fund. The Building sub – committee looks after all these matters in consultation with the Principal and the Governing Body.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision for the equipment/instruments?

Annual maintenance and repair of the equipments and instruments is taken care of by the college in a systematic need based manner. The laboratory equipments are cleaned and maintained daily by the laboratory staff of the college, working in different departments under the strict supervision of Teachers of the concerned departments. In the old building laboratories are partially shared by Rammohan, City and Ananda Mohan College. In the new science building the college has the following staff, in addition to laboratory staff:-

- 1. Supervisor
- 2. 24 x 7 security staff (appointed through agency).
- 3. Sweeper
- 4. Computer and Server Maintenance System Analyst(called when required)

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipments (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

A number of steps have been taken by the college. Voltage stabiliser are used to protect sensitive instruments from power fluctuations. Tables, chairs almirahs, cabinets and other laboratory

necessities such as water lines and electrical lines are installed and maintained with money from college funds as and when requisitioned.

Water supply in both the college buildings is from the Kolkata Municipal Corporation. The supplied water is stored in over head tanks. The tanks are cleaned regularly to ensure supply of potable water. The college has also installed water purifiers in both the buildings to provide safe drinking water to all students and staff. Most laboratory – based departments have their own distillation plants to meet their needs of distilled water requirements.

Water bodies have been built in the new Science Building funded by the college for the Departments of Botany and Zoology. They are maintained by the respective departments for growing/ culturing plants/ fish necessary for academic studies. The water bodies are also a source of information for the students of Environmental Science who prepare projects as per the guide lines of the University of Calcutta. The department of Botany also takes care of a medicinal plant garden. The college also has a garden with several ornamentals plants including both gymnosperms and angiosperms.

A solar panel (partly funded by the U.G.C) has been installed in the girls' hostel to supply hot water to the hostel kitchen and bathrooms.

The old Building is maintained jointly by Rammohan, City and Ananda Mohan College who share the same premises. The new science building is maintained exclusively by Rammohan College. Renovation and repair works are done periodically

Any other relevant information regarding infrastructure and learning Resources which the college would like to include.

The college, running with graduate and post graduate courses, is faced with shortage of space since it shares the premises with two other colleges in the old building. Most of the laboratory based departments are faced with acute shortage of space and proper laboratory facilities to accommodate their students (Honours and General) in the same building. Both students and staff have to ply between the two college buildings (Old and New) during college hours through busy congested public roads to attend classes.

The electrical wiring of both buildings needs to be modernised. A lift is a necessity with plans for two additional floors being constructed in the new building in the near future. The library requires total computerization. The present room allocated as a Zonal centre for the distribution and collection centre of B.A , B.Sc and B.Com (general) answer scripts needs immediate up gradation. A provision for a canteen and common room is a necessity in the new building. A photocopy facility for students and CCTV installation is needed in the new building. With proper funding the vacant land in the new campus could be developed. Talks are on for the construction of a Social Science building in the new campus. The college has plans to open more post graduate courses as well as professional courses in the future.

Various kinds of counselling are given to the students –

Academic Counselling: - The teachers provide academic counselling to the students during admission regarding choice of stream and subjects.

Personal Counselling: - Personal counselling is given by the teachers to the students who need to be boosted. The teachers during free hours listen to the problems of the students.

Career Counselling: - Career counselling is made available to outgoing 3rd year students –

- a) **Nalanda Today Pvt. Ltd.:** One day interaction workshop How to increase employability of the students (2012).
- **b)** National Stock Exchange: Session on practical aspects pertaining to price distribution, order matching, trading system, etc. (2012), specially for the B.Com students
- c) 3rd year Science students had attended a chapter of **All India Science Congress** (in 2012).
- d) In 2013, a one day workshop by Synergy: To groom the students about their employability.
- e) 29 students from various streams had joined internship programme of State Bank of India from May, 2013 July, 2013. Students had worked in both rural & urban areas (Emoluments received by them for Rural areas, Rs. 16,000.00/- and for Urban areas Rs. 30,000.00/-). After completion of field study, the students appeared for an evaluative examination and all of them scored very high marks. They were given certificates at the end of the project.
- f) Udayanshalini: an NGO where 49students had applied for vocational training. 45 students had been selected and one completed training successfully. The students received a stipend of Rs. 1800.00 p.a.

Psycho- Social counselling – Students having any psychological problem, be it fear psychosis for examination, or any personality problem, is initially addressed by the teachers themselves, or if need be, they are sent to professionals to help them to come out of their problems, e.g., in 2013 at NSS camp, Dr. Chayanika Ghosh Clinical Psychologist, Department of Welfare, Govt. of West Bengal.was brought for counselling the students.

No, the college does not have any structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of students as such, but it is carried out through personal counselling and interaction with professionals from different fields. Apart from these a Pre-primary Training Programme (Montessori Method) has been started in September, 2012 by "Aparajita" and certificates have been issued to successful students for the last three years. Out of approximately 20 students every year, at least 4 – 5 students are employed in government and private Montessori schools. A vocational training course for the college students (started in 2007) under "Aparajita", running an art and handicraft section teaches them Batik, Embroidery, Glass painting, etc.

5.1.10. Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If 'yes', list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

The institution does have a Grievance Redressal Cell headed by the Principal. The students are advised to submit their complains through the drop box method. The complaints are carefully examined by the members and appropriate actions are taken.

Some of the grievances redressed:

- a) Re-examination of college mid-term scripts.
- b) Renovation of the Gymnasium.
- c) Requirement of more books (syllabus oriented) for the Central Library.
- d) Improvement of canteen facilities.
- e) Improvement of drinking water facilities.
- f) Improvement of washrooms facilities.
- g) Cleaning of classrooms.

5.1.11. What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

Students are advised to drop their complaints regarding issues pertaining to sexual harassment through the Drop Box system. The Governing Body empowers the Principal to take necessary action, through the Grievance Redressal Cell. However, ours being a Girls' college with working hours from 6.30 a.m. – 12 noon there has been, till date, no complaints regarding sexual harassment. We hope to form an Internal Complaints Committee as per the Vishakha Guideline, soon.

Seminars regarding Womens' Rights & Human Rights have been arranged by the NSS wing of the College to make the students aware of social and financial empowerment.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Ragging is banned in the college. The UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009 has been adopted by the college. Consequently an Antiragging Cell has been constituted comprising the senior staff and students of the college.

There is an anti-ragging cell, according to UGC norms in our girls' hostel. However, no instance of ragging has been reported till date. Good will & mutual understanding amongst the stakeholders, contribute to the pleasant ambience of the college.

The college has a Students' Union comprising 15 seats. 12 candidates are elected from B.A / B.Sc. and 3 candidates are elected from B.Com. Nomination papers are provided by the college and candidates are chosen through Students' Election every year. The President and Deputy President are selected from the teachers. There are different elected representatives assigned different work for example e.g., Cultural Secretary, Sports Secretary, Treasurer.

Throughout the year the Students' Union is involved in the following activities:-

- b) Teachers' Day
- c) Freshers' Welcome
- d) Saraswati Puja
- e) Annual Social
- f) Involved in College Sports
- g) Outside events management
- h) They maintain order & discipline during the admission process (General Stream)

Every year students from Rammohan College are invited by Bhawanipur Education Society College to participate in their annual cultural programme "Umang". The Students' Union is funded by the contribution of the students.

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institution's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc?

The vision of the college is to achieve excellence in Higher education including empowerment through knowledge. The mission of the college is 'Sradhaban Lavate Jnanam' or 'Wisdom Belongeth to Reverence'. The College has been following this mission throughout and will continue to do so. The college aims to impart education as a comprehensive training of the mind, body and soul to girl students of all strata of society. It also aims to adopt and promote the knowledge output for human development and to create awareness on human rights, value system, culture and heritage.

To achieve these specific goals the institution has the following strategies/ mechanisms:

- The college provides inclusive education to girl students irrespective of caste, creed and status.
- Strategies have been adopted to satisfy the needs of the students from diverse backgrounds complying with all norms of the Government.
- Use of modern teaching learning aids to make the curriculum interesting and interactive is one of the primary strategies.
- Encouraging research culture and research publications by faculty members.
- Participation of students in various cultural activities and sports activities for personality development.
- Remedial coaching classes for students belonging to non creamy layer of society.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The Principal is the secretary of the Governing Body and the ex-officio member of each academic and administrative committee of the College, college hostel and the Museum. The names of the committee members are proposed by the Teachers Council of the College and ratified by the Governing Body. Admission, academic matters, conduction of examinations, promotion of research, development of infrastructure facilities, appointment of staff, cultural activities are all coordinated by the respective committees. The Governing Body takes all administrative decisions and the Principal communicates the decision to the respective person/committee.

 The policy statements and action plans for fulfilment of the stated mission

- Each of the faculty is given instructions regarding the new programmes and projects adhering to the quality policy of the institution.
- With the help of the Governing Body and the other sub-committees the Principal plays the leading role in the governance and management of the institution. She ensures transparency in the functioning of the college and maintains core values. She also monitors the stepwise implementation of the institutional plans.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

While formulating action plans, the institution takes care of all its academic demands.
 Sports and cultural activities are planned and executed as per rules and regulations of college. The institution is always ready to conduct innovative programmes through the NSS.

Interaction with stakeholders

- The stakeholders are the teachers, non-teaching staff, students, guardians and the University the college is affiliated to. They all participate in institutional plans within the stipulated norms and conditions. There exists an active Students' Union to communicate student demands to the Management. Parents can participate during parent teacher meetings and offer valuable suggestions.
- Coordination between administrative staff and the teaching staff is well maintained.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

• Head of the departments of all subjects convey the report of progress of teaching learning process to the Principal of the college. The College has established an efficient monitoring mechanism through coordination between the Teaching and Non-teaching staff under the leadership of the Principal.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence

• The institution reinforces the culture of excellence through workshops, awareness programmes, research oriented seminars, research projects, plans for advanced learning, skill development of staff and so on.

Champion organisational change

• To provide modern teaching learning aids and application of ICT resources in the near future to make the learning process much more interesting.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The institution frames all its plans and policies in consultation with the Teachers' Council, Principal and the Governing **Body**. During execution of policies all the staff members teaching and non teaching are involved. With time outcomes are studied and changes are made as per requirement.

- Open discussions are held with the head of the institution.
- The head and faculty of different departments are empowered to organise and participate in seminars.
- Head of the institution instructs the departmental heads to purchase books according to the needs of the concerned department with UGC funds.

• The Principal of the college involves all the stakeholders in the smooth functioning of the college. Partial decentralisation promotes cooperation, knowledge sharing and innovations.

The college delegates and provides operational autonomy to the departments. The head and faculty of the different departments work in close association with the Principal.

Yes. The college promotes a culture of participative management. The faculty, non-teaching staff and students participate in the teaching learning process. The Governing Body is the highest decision making authority. There are several Sub committees to help the administration create a robust academic environment..

STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT

6.2.1. Does the institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the policy of the institution as mentioned in its mission is to empower the students with holistic education which would make them not only complete women but complete human beings, so that they would be able to serve society in different capacities. This policy is developed successfully by the collective efforts of all the stake holders - students, teachers, non-teaching staff and guardians. Till date it was reviewed annually by the College authorities through exit questionnaires. Hence forth it would be reviewed by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and measures for quality enhancement and sustenance would be taken.

6.2.2. Does the institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.


Yes. The development plan of the college, both academic and non-academic is formulated through the cumulative effort of the Principal, Governing Body, the concerned sub-committee teachers and office staff. Grants received from the U.G.C are used for development purposes. Recently, the Kolkata Municipal Corporation had sanctioned plans to construct two more stories to the existing New Science Building and work would begin shortly.

For academic development, fifteen vacant posts of Assistant Professor in different departments have been filled up in 2014-15. M.A. in Bengali was introduced in 2014 as a self-financed course. The College also plans to introduce add on courses like Travel and Tourism, Communicative English and Personality Development in the near future.

6.2.3. Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making process.

The Principal is the head of the Institution, who takes all the major decisions in consultation with the Vice-Principal, Bursar, two Superintendents and the Secretary of the Teachers' Council, who represents the teachers-- permanent, part-time and guest. The Teachers' Council discusses and regulates various academic issues and helps in the college administration through different subcommittees like – Academic, Admission, Leave, Building, U.G.C, Sports, Magazine, Purchase, Finance & so on. The members of these committees perform their respective duties for the smooth running of the college. Academic decisions concerning the departments are taken by the Heads of respective departments jointly with the faculty members of the department . All academic decisions are implemented after the approval of the Governing Body.

The non-teaching staff of the college discusses issues concerning the office, accounts and administration in the City College Employees Union meetings and place their demands before the Principal who sends these to the Governing Body for approval. The demands and decision of the Studends' Union are also conveyed to the Governing Body in a similar manner for discussion, rectification and necessary action.



6.2.4. Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following.

Teaching & Learning:

At the beginning of every academic session the Routine Committee prepares a master routine for all the Departments of the College, in which Honours and General classes are scheduled as per U.G.C norms. Individual depar

tments follow the master routine and prepare departmental routines and submit it to the Routine Committee for the Principal's approval. All departments have to follow the approved routine schedule.

At the departmental level, each Head of the Department consults his / her teachers to plan the distribution of syllabi, modules & laboratory classes. Departmental meetings are held regularly to organize mid-term and selection tests and analyse and discuss the performance of students in the University examinations. Weaker students are identified and Remedial classes are organized. The teachers also take extra classes for both slow and advanced learners. Moreover, each departmental Head keeps a record of the syllabus covered and submits progress reports to the Principal as and when asked. To discuss the results of the Annual and Selection Test the Principal convenes a meeting of all teachers every year. The students are allowed to see their evaluated answer scripts and their strengths and weakness are discussed. In this way transparency in the examination and the evaluation system is maintained. If a student is dissatisfied with her result she may appeal to her Head of the Department for re-evaluation or lodge a complaint with the Grievance Redressal Cell.

Talks and seminars are organized to enrich the teaching learning experience.

Research & Development:

Research activities are encouraged in the College both among the teachers and students. Teachers actively participate in seminars, workshops and conferences, both National and International. Seminars and workshops in the College encourage student participation. Some teachers of the Physiology, Bengali and Zoology departments act as research guides. (Please refer to 3.1.5 of criterion no. III for details.)

Community engagement:

The College has a very active NSS wing in which students of different departments participate (Please refer to Best Practice two. of Criterion no. VII for details).

Human Resource management:

The Teaching faculty, apart from working in various sub-committees act as paper setters, moderators, examiners and head examiners. They also engage in active research and publications. The College encourages all these activities. The Non-teaching Staff perform their duties like fees collection, distribution of the marksheets of University examination results etc efficiently for the smooth running of the college.

The students of the College are encouraged to participate in community service through the NSS, in Annual College Sports & Cultural Programmes and Prize distribution Ceremony. They also took active part in the Golden Jubilee Celebration of the College in 2012.

Industry Interaction

Career counselling initiatives in the recent past by the State Bank of India and the India Stock Exchange etc had helped the final year students to get some idea about their career choices. Attempts are being made to collaborate with the Institute of Company Secretaries to counsel students every year about Company Secretaryship as a career option.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the Institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders to review the activities of the intuition?

The Head of the Institution collects information in the following ways:-

- Feedback from the 3rd year students of each department.
- Reports submitted by various sub-committees.
- Feedback from the Head of the Departments
- Feedback from departments on Parent-Teacher meetings.
- Feedback from Teachers' Council meetings and from Post Graduate Committee Meetings.

6.2.6. How does the Management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

The College authority ensures that all the members of the staff are well represented and involved in the institutional processes. The Governing Body of the College has teaching, non-teaching and student representatives. So, all of them play important roles in the decision making process. The various sub-committees along with the Teachers' Council actively participate in the functioning of the college through regular meetings and discussions. The newly reconstituted IQAC hopes to play an equally significant role in the near future. The active involvement of the non-teaching staff in office work and accounts ensures smooth functioning of the College. Apart from the regular meeting of teachers and non-teachers, the institutional processes are reviewed annually to judge their efficiency and take remedial measures where necessary.

6.2.7. Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

Resolutions made by the Governing Body in the last year: -

- 1. The Governing Body approved the appointment of 13 new full time permanent teachers in it's meeting dtd. 30.03.15 and 13.04.15. Previously, in September, 2014 and December, 2014 two new full timers had been appointed in Sanskrit and Chemistry respectively.
- 2. In the Governing Body meeting dtd. 01.07.2015, it approved the appointment of Dr. Saswati Sanyal as Principal and Mr. Subrata Gupta as Head Clerk.
- 3. In the Governing Body meeting dtd. 29.08.2015, appointment of new Heads of Departments was approved.

- 4. In the Governing Body meeting dtd. 16.10.2015, a number of resolutions were taken and implemented.
 - ❖ Appointment of eight permanent Non- teaching Staff under the pay packet scheme of the Govt. of West Bengal.
 - ❖ The formation of different sub-committees, the NAAC Steering Committee under the Coordinatorship of Prof. Samarendra Nath Banerjee and the IQAC under the Directorship of Prof. Santanu Das was approved.
 - ❖ The Audit Report of 2012-13 and 2013-14 was placed before the Governing Body for approval.
 - ❖ The unanimous decision by the Teaching and Non-teaching Staff of Rammohan College to join the Trust called the City College Commerce Department Provident Fund, under the Board of Trustees, Brahmo Samaj Education Society and keep its P.F. in that fund, was approved.
- 5. In the Governing Body meeting dtd. 17.12.2015 the decision for submitting the AQAR, LOI and SSR to NAAC was approved.
- 6.2.8. Does the affiliating University make a provision for according the status of authority to an affiliated institution? It 'yes' what are efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes. However, no efforts have been made by the institution to obtain autonomy.

- 6.2.9. How does the Institution ensure that Grievances / Complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyse the nature of grievances for prompting better stakeholder relationship?
 - 1. The College has a Grievances Redressal Cell where students can record their grievances. The 3rd year students also give their feedback in the exit questionnaires provided by each department every year.
 - 2. After the mid-term examinations every year, each department organizes a Parent Teacher meeting where not only the performances of students are discussed, the opinions of the Parents regarding the department and College are also sought. With the help of the feedback from guardians efforts are made to address the issues by the College authority. The students and their parents may also meet the Principal to seek redressal of their grievances.
 - 3. Teachers of the concerned department may directly approach the Teachers' Council Secretary or the Principal for advice and help when required.

The stalemate in the College continued till 02.07.15 when Prof. Saswati Sanyal joined as Principal. Till date, the teachers and non-teachers are working hard to revive the academic and administrative ambience that so exemplified Rammohan College.

Prof. Biswas is a lady teacher and possesses Ph.D degree.

6.2.11. Does the Institution have a mechanism for analysing student feedback on internal performance? If 'yes' what was the outcome and response of the institution such an effort?

Yes. Till date final year under-graduate students are given feedback forms (exit questionnaires) by the Head of Departments in which they evaluate the teachers of respective departments and the infrastructural facilities of the college. Strict anonymity is maintained. The filled up forms are analysed by the Academic Sub-Committee and the data collected is placed before the Principal for perusal and necessary action, in consultation with the Governing Body. It has now been decided in the recently reconstituted IQAC, that this Cell would hence forth deal with this issue.

6.3. FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1. What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

a) The institution encourages the faculty to adopt a Learner Centric academic approach through academic planning and improved use of modern teaching-learning aids to make the curriculum more interesting and effective for the students and the teaching-learning experience more interactive.

- b) For quality enhancement of the faculty, the college prompts research activities and publications by creating the necessary infrastructure. Funds are released to carry on project work. Necessary permission is given to participate in Faculty Development Programmes.
- c) Faculty are encouraged to participate in Orientation and Refresher Courses.
- d) Inter disciplinary lectures are organized to promote sharing of knowledge and ideas.
- e) Promoting the participation of students, faculty and staff in extracurricular and community development programmes like the Annual Sports, Prize distribution and NSS activities.

6.3.2. What are the strategies adopted by the Institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

- a) Provide infrastructure and space so that the faculty may utilize those effectively.
- b) Permission is given readily to the teaching staff to participate in Orientation and Refresher Courses for professional upgradation.
- c) Seminars, conferences and workshops are sponsored.
- d) The administrative structure of the college is fairly decentralized. So planning, decision making and implementation work hand in hand in an atmosphere of knowledge, innovation and empowerment.

6.3.3. Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

- a) A self appraisal report is submitted by each teacher for every academic session to the respective Head of the Department.
- b) Teachers fill up self- assessment forms while placement is done at a higher scale. Accordingly, the Expert Committee for placement and promotion interviews the teacher candidate and recommends for placement / promotion. Necessary improvements in wanting areas are advised by the members of the Expert Committee.

6.3.4. What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stake holders?

The performance appraisal reports are studied and assessed by the Principal in consultation with the departmental Heads.. Then the teachers are apprised about the outcome. Necessary steps are taken to improve the overall academic quality of the institution.

6.3.5. What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

- Quick Provident Fund loan facility.
- Funds are also collected to help any individual member of the staff during his / her crisis.

Percentage of staff who have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years: 100%

- > Staff who have applied for P.F. loan benefitted.
- Those who have retired in the last four years got their P.F. Cheque on the day of retirement.

6.3.6. What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

- Functional office, infrastructure and space are provided to eminent faculty to carry out their work effectively.
- ➤ Budget allocation for staff development, sponsoring of advanced study, research, subscriptions to reputed journals, participation in workshops, seminars and conferences, membership in local, national and international professional associations are encouraged.
- ➤ Decentralization of the administrative system for promoting cooperation, sharing of knowledge, innovations and empowerment of faculty is also practiced.

6.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

As per the need of the college, the available financial resources are allocated against different heads of expenditure for development projects of the institution. Grants from the UGC are utilised for the specific purpose for which it is received. Both the revenue and capital expenditures of the college are monitored and controlled by the Finance Committee of the college which is finally approved by the Governing Body. The Budget and Audit Reports are considered by the Finance Committee and Governing Body for proper financial management.

- Proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Quotations/Tenders are called for and prices are compared by Purchase committee or Building Committee of the college.
- 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The College has a mechanism for internal audit of the UGC development fund, MRP grant and Provident Fund which are checked and audited internally.

The external audit is carried out by External Auditor (Chartered Accountant Firm) appointed by Govt of West Bengal.. The Governing Body contacts the authorized Chartered Accountant of the Government who along with his team conducts external audit regularly.

The external audit has been completed upto the financial year 2013-14 and that for 2014-15 is awaited.

No significant objections were raised by the auditors.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

Fees received from the students, such as, Tuition fee, Admission fee, Examination fee, Establishment fee, Science fee etc. are the major sources of institutional receipts / funding. The college also earns a considerable amount as Bank interest from its deposits / investments. The various grants under the UGC schemes are other sources of receipts.

The deficit of a particular year, if any, is managed out of Reserve Fund. Appropriate steps are being taken by the Finance Committee and Governing Body to reduce the revenue expenditures as far as practicable. In recent past 15 permanent teaching and 8 Non-teaching staff have been appointed under govt. pay packet. It will reduce the expenditure in connection with payment of salary to guest lecturers and casual non-teaching staff which will help to manage the deficit.

6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any). :

The institution was able to manage additional fund from M.P LAD in 2008-2009(Rs 9 lakhs approximately) which was utilised for the development of the New Science Building. Moreover, Raja Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum receives grants from the Govt. of West Bengal which is utilised for development of the museum.

6.5. INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM (IQAS)

6.5.1. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a) Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

After the first cycle of accreditation and assessment where in the College was accredited with B+ grade (institutional score -76.3%) an attempt was made to set up Internal Quality Assurance Cell on 01.09.2009. However, due to unavoidable circumstances, it could not function. The IQAC was reconstituted in the Teachers Council on 13.10.15 and approved by the Governing Body on 16.10.15. In it first meeting dtd. 21.11.2015

- i. It pledged to work closely with all the functioning sub-committees Academic, Leave, Library, Building, Museum, Hostel, Provident Fund, Staff Selection (Teaching & Nonteaching), Admission, Routine, Sports & Games, Prize, Magazine, Extra-Curricular, NSS, NAAC (Steering Committee) and UGC for the smooth running of the College.
- ii. It also committed to work in coordination with all stake holders Teachers, Students, Guardians and Administration.

- iii. It suggested the implementation of both academic and administrative audit under the supervision of the Principal and the Director, IQAC.
- iv. It also pointed out the continuous need to plan and implement quality initiatives by following the Academic Calendar, encouraging research and extension activities, (including the development of a research laboratory in the Physiology department), monitoring teaching learning and evaluation, documenting data regularly in the College Office, collecting data through exit questionnaire from outgoing students on a regular basis and so on.
- v. But at present the IQACs primary concern is the preparation of the Annual Quality Assurance Report of the last four years, and its submissions to NAAC before the submission of the LOI and SSR.

b) How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

As the IQAC has been reconstituted recently in Rammohan College, it is initially busy preparing the AQAR. It is expected to become fully operational and active shortly.

c) Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes, three external members have been included – (i) Mrs. Sadhana Bose, Local Councillor, (ii) Mr. Debapriya Sen, Deputy General Manager, Environment Management Division, Steel Authority of India Limited. (iii) Dr. Dipasri Roy Chowdhury, an alumnus of and Ex-Teacher-in-Charge of Rammohan College.

The IQAC hopes to be enriched by their valuable advice and guidance.

d) How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

It was decided in the meeting of the IQAC dtd. 21.11.2015 that students being active learners would make suggestions regarding improvement in teaching –learning process, examination system, day-to-day facilities like library, office and canteen services. The IQAC would inform them about its policies made for their welfare through notices & announcements. The General Secretary of the Students' Union is a member of IQAC. Dr. Dipasri Roy Chowdhury, Alumnus and Ex-Teacher-in-Charge, Rammohan College is a member of IQAC. Special efforts would be made to involve the alumni in college activities.

e) How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

As mentioned earlier, the IQAC has begun its work recently but hopes to involve all stake holders in planning, formulating and implementing policies and programmes in the near future.

6.5.2. Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes' give details on its operationlisation.

Yes, strategies have been framed for adoption and implementation in the IQAC meeting on 21.11.2015 to satisfy the needs of the students from diverse socio-economic backgrounds and backward communities as per Govt. norms. It was also decided to adopt a more learner centric education approach, use of advanced technology to enrich both teaching and learning, to better equip and modernise the office, accounts section and library, introduce skill oriented diploma and certificate courses, prompt research activities, encourage students to participate in extension activities like the NSS and activate the psychological counselling and career counselling cell and show on.

6.5.3. Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Not yet. But the IQAC members hope to participate in IQAC related workshops in the future.

6.5.4. Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes, till date the academic audit was performed by individual departments under the guidance of the Heads of the departments through regular departmental meetings and the analysis of feedback forms from the outgoing students. This data is submitted to the Academic Subcommittee which discusses the matter in its meetings and take necessary steps in consultation with the College Authority. Hence forth the IQAC would play an active role in this process.

6.5.5. How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies / regulatory authorities?

The college follows all university rules, UGC guidelines and DPI instructions and maintains prescribed standards in teaching-learning process, conduct of examination & evaluation. It conducts academic and co-academic programmes as per the calendar of the University.

6.5.6. What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The Academic Calendar of the college displays the important events in the Academic Session. The College and University examination schedule are given in details in the prospectus distributed among the students at the time of admission.

The Teaching Plan formulated by each Head of the Department in consultation with the respective teachers divide the lesson modules and chapters among the teachers. They are

given the time frame in which to finish the syllabi. The academic progress made is monitored regularly through class tests, tutorials and mid-term examinations. Regular departmental meetings keep the teachers updated.

Learner centric academic approach, audio visual mode of teaching specially for Science subjects, lectures by internal and external experts, project based learning, field work and surveys enrich the students.

The Principal regularly takes feedbacks on the teaching learning progress of every department from the Heads.

This entire scheme of teaching-learning evaluation is possible through systematic planning, organisation and implementation within the broad framework of the University schedule and the master routine of the college.

6.5.7. How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

Any other relevant information regarding Governance Leadership and Management which the college would like to include.

The institution communicates its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders through:-

- Regular notifications
- The progress of the students is communicated to the students and their parents through parent teacher meetings.
- Detailed information are given in the Prospectus.
- Through the institutional website www.rammohancollege.org
- Policies and plans regarding the quality assurance are communicated to the faculty members, especially the newly appointed ones, in the beginning of the session through meetings with the Principal.
- Policies and plans regarding the quality assurance are also communicated in meeting of the different sub-committees and in the meetings with the Teacher's Council, Non-teaching Staff and students.

- Students are also made aware of such policies through orientation programmes conducted by the administration and by the heads of departments.
- Policies and plans regarding the quality assurance are also communicated to the alumni.. At present an informal alumni association called 'PURBATANI' is functioning. Attempts are being made to form a registered Alumni Association.
- Policies and plans regarding the quality assurance are communicated to the University and the State Government through the All India Survey Of Higher Secondary Education(AISHE). Hence forth it would also be communicated to NAAC through the AQAR by the IQAC.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1: ENVIRONMENT CONCIOUSNESS:

7.1.1. Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Though there is no provision for Green Audit of the college, steps are taken to ensure a clean and green environment in the campus. The college authority has taken various measures like cleanliness, covered bins for garbage disposal, maintenance of a garden with medicinal and flowering plants, etc. to maintain the environmental balance within the campus. UG students conduct environmental project work as part of their curriculum which helps to enhance their environmental consciousness.

7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy conservation: Being aware of the fact that energy conservation leads to less harmful emission in the environment and make the campus eco-friendly, a practice of unplugging electrical and electronic appliances, when not in use is prompted in the campus. The necessity of energy conservation is circulated periodically among both the staff and students of the college. Modern energy saving CFL lamps and tubes are used in the college campus. Large windows and doors are kept open to let in the sunlight to minimise the use of electricity.

Solar water heating system is used in the college hostel as a measure to conserve electrical energy and earn carbon credit.

Use of renewable energy: To use the solar energy by converting the sun's radiation-solar water heating system has been installed in our Girl's hostel-Sadhana Sarkar Memorial Hostel. Approximate capacity of the plant is to heat 2000 litres of cold water and costing Rs. 3,39,988/- and Rs. 2,05,420/- is funded by UGC.

Water Harvesting: No such project exists in the college campus at present.

Check Dam Construction: It does not apply to our college as it is situated in a populated town.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality: Following measures have been taken in this regard:

- Judicious use of electricity in the college campus.
- Air conditioners are used at a fixed higher mode order to reduce emission of 'green house gases'.
- Regular plantation of trees and plants.
- Preservation of old trees.
- Dead leaves, waste papers and other waste materials are disposed off as municipal corporation waste instead of burning.
- Care is taken to restrict vehicle entry into the college campus.
- Declaration of the campus as 'No Smoking Zone' and 'No Plastic Zone' etc.

Plantation: Plantation programme is organised annually by the college NSS unit. Medicinal plant garden is maintained by the Botany Department. Old trees are also being preserved carefully. A beautiful garden is maintained in front of the New Science building of the college.

Hazardous Waste Management: The main source of hazardous waste is the laboratories of the departments of Chemistry and Biological Sciences.

- Care is taken to minimise the amount of such waste.
- To ensure non-mixing of such waste with general waste of the college.
- Surplus chemicals are shared between the laboratories of Chemistry and Biological Sciences department.
- Purchase of mercury free instruments.
- The scale of laboratory experiments is reduced to minimise the volume of wastes as and when possible.
- Waste materials like dismantled building materials, canteen waste, deep plants, etc. are collected in the vat for clearance by the local municipal corporation.

e-waste Management: Electrical, electronic wastes are kept in a separate, isolated, unexposed area to prevent accidental breakage. The college authority hands over these e-wastes to authorised recyclers for proper disposal to ensure minimum environment pollution.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1. Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- 1. Students are encouraged both in academic and extra-curricular activities through many awards and prizes on the basis of their performances. Students are given financial aid from the Students-Aid Fund. A separate Student-Aid Fund is run exclusively by some teachers.
- 2. Tutorial classes are taken by various departments for improvement of the slow learners.
- 3. Water plants are maintained by the Botany Department, which are also used as their laboratory materials.
- 3A. Zoology Department keeps the specimen fish in an artificial pond within the college campus. The department monitors the temperature of water and other environmental conditions for suitable for fish with the students. Estimation of O_2 , CO_2 and pH of water is done for regular laboratory work. Moreover, students of 3^{rd} year carry on project work on Environmental Sciences on this pond.
- 4. PG courses in Physiology and Bengali Departments have started from 2006 and 2014 respectively. Number of seats for Bengali is 50 and that of Physiology is 20.
- 5. Animal House has been constructed in 2013, for animal research, according to the guidelines of CPCSEA, New Delhi. It has already been registered by CPCSEA vide Reg. No. F795/PO/ERc/s14CPCSEA. Animal house facility is utilised by both the departments of Zoology and Physiology.
- 6. For continuation of research on animals, One Institutional Ethics Committee has been formed by the college according to the guidelines of CPCSEA in 2011. In addition, one HUMAN ETHICS Committee has been formed by the college according to the Indian Council For Medical Research (ICMR) guide lines to monitor research activities on human subjects.

- 7. NCC was started in 2006. Every year, all 1st year students were eligible to apply for enrolment as NCC cadets. There were about 40 students enrolled every year. About half of them passed out after 3 years with C-certificate. They attended camps in various places and Republic Day Parades. Some got awards and recognition on behalf of the 2nd Bengal Battalion. Since 2013, this has been discontinued due to various operational reasons including non-availability of an officer below the age of 40 years. However, with the appointment of fifteen teachers, many below 40 years of age, attempts are be made to restart NCC training in the college.
- 8. *Kanyashree Prakalpa* was introduced in December 2013. In February 2014, 139 students of our college received Rs. 25000/- each, at a time and was selected as the 'Role Model College' among all the colleges of West Bengal. Our college has been awarded 1st Prize (a certificate and Trophy) by the Chief Minister of West Bengal, on 14th August 2014. This is an ongoing project which is continuing successfully.
- 9. In 2013 State Bank of India selected 29 students of 3rd year of different departments to carry on project work on behalf of SBI. They carried on the project work from 13th May 2013 to 13th July 2013. They were given certificates and remuneration upto Rs. 30000/- on completion project work within three months.
- 10. NSS has been started from 2006. The students under NSS carry on different social programmes. They carry on plantation programme on 5th June every year and also join various programmes conducted by University of Calcutta. It has been received the following awards from University of Calcutta:

2011: Best Volunteers

2012: Best Special Camp College and Best Co-ordinator

2013: Best Volunteers

- 11. Online admission process of B.A, B.Sc Honours and B.Com Honours and General Courses has started from 2011, step by step. We are yet to start B.A and B.Sc General Course admission online. Admission is conducted strictly on the basis of merit and as per Government Regulations.
- 12. Introduction of the following software programmes has created noticeable impact on the functioning of the college.

- 13. The Heritage Building of Raja Rammohan Roy at 85A, Raja Rammohan Sarani has been converted into Raja Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum. Different social activities like pre-primary teachers' training course for weak female section of the society, vocational training, yoga, etc. are run by 'Aparajita', a unit of the said Museum.
- 14. Vertical extension of the New Science Building was objected to by the Kolkata Corporation as it is situated with the heritage building of Museum within the same campus, 85A, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata-700009. After proper clarification this objection has been nullified and a proper structural plan for the 3rd and 4th floor of the building has been submitted in 2014. It is under process.
- 15. Three plots of land (85B, 85C and 85D, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata-700009) of the college were handed over to the colleges together with Kolkata Metropolitan Library. After much effort and

deliberations the name of Kolkata Metropolitan Library has been withdrawn. Mutation of the land can be done.

16. The college has received a special Grant of Rs. 33 Lakh from the UGC as a girls' college. With this grant, various equipments and appliances have been purchased for different science departments. Some of the equipments are highly sophisticated which can be used for higher study and research work.

17. A solar water heating system has been installed in our Girls' Hostel-Sadhana Sarkar Memorial Hostel. It can heat 2000 litres cold water. It is funded mostly by UGC.

7.3 BEST PRACTICE 1

THEME – UPLIFTMENT AND EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN

GOAL

Ever since 1961 this college has sought to spread the light of education among women. It is our goal to ensure that our students grow up into responsible human beings and be able to play an equally important role as men, in building the future of India. It is our attempt to nurture self belief and confidence among the girls and guide them forward towards realizing their dreams. The founding fathers of the college had the mission to promote the cause of education to all women irrespective of caste and creed. The purpose was always to provide a holistic approach to education by not only training of the mind but also of the heart and the body.

THE CONTEXT

Education plays a crucial role in socio-economic development of a country. So education must be provided to every section in our society especially the deprived classes. After completion of elementary and secondary education, the scope for the next stage should be broadened. The enrolment of women in higher education is lower than that of men. Even today there are parts of India where women face severe gender discrimination and lack of opportunities. So it is our sincere effort to erase this huge gender gap and empower women to realize their goals.

THE PRACTICE

- Kanyashree Prakalpa is an initiative by the state government to promote education and welfare of the girl child. However many of the students miss out on applying to the scheme because of lack of knowledge about it. We inform the students in time about the project so that the needy among them can get the required monetary support and continue their education.
- In 2013 State Bank of India selected 29 students from our college to carry out project work under them. These projects were on various topics such as the 'Future of Rural Agriculture'. This gave our girls an opportunity to go out of the class rooms and

- implement their knowledge in real world situations. Such an experience would benefit them in the future when they apply for various jobs.
- We have organized Thalassemia Awareness **p**rogramme as well as blood group detection camp. One of the major reasons of high incidence of thalessemia in India is the lack of awareness amongst women. The awareness programme was an attempt to educate them about the need of getting tested.
- During the Golden Jubilee celebration of our college in 2012 a panel discussion was organized on the topic "Nari Swadhinata Amader Samaje Aajo Ek Aleek Swapna" –" The freedom of Indian women in our society is still a distant dream". This discussion was an attempt to make our students conscious of gender discrimination in our society. Every year we celebrate Rammohan Roy's birth anniversary on 22nd May. The discussions on that occassion are based on his humanitarian work and his mission for women welfare.
- The family residence of Raja Rammohan Roy has been recognized as a heritage building and maintained as a museum from the year 2009. In this museum under the name "Aparajita" a vocational training course for college students and local ladies on art and craft is being held. Yoga is also being taught alongside. A certificate course on preprimary education has been conducted since 2012. The financially challenged students were encouraged to apply for the Udayan Shalini Fellowship in 2011 so that they can pursue their education smoothly (please refer to Criterion 5 for details).

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

- Rammohan College was selected as the role model college among all other colleges in West Bengal under Kanyashree Prakalpa. In February, 2014, 139 students of our college each received an amount of Rs. 25000 to carry on their studies. Our college has been awarded first prize by the Chief Minister of West Bengal in 2014. This is an ongoing process which is continuing successfully.
- Every participant of the SBI project were given certificates and remuneration of upto Rs. 30000 on completion of the project within 3 months.
- Exhibitions are held in the museum campus by the Aparajita unit to showcase the talent of the girls.
- 'Udayan Care' had offered a fellowship of Rs.9000/- to the first year students..(Please refer to Criterion-5—Student support and progression). An inter-college debate competition was held in 2010 at Calcutta University Institute Hall on the topic 'Impact of Jawaharlal Nehru National Urban Renewal Mission on Kolkata' by Griha Adhikar Mancha. Our students secured the first and second positions.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

A full equipped auditorium with audio visual aids accompanied by trained personnel for handling these equipments with the allocation of more funds is necessary to carry out our goals in a better manner.

BEST PRACTICE 2

THEME – NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

GOAL

We do not keep our students confined to their studies only. The present situation and environment are pushing them to be self centred. Leave aside their neighbours, they do not even take care of their close relations at the time of distress. We feel that the youths have gone out of track because of fierce competition in their studies and careers.

Under these circumstances, we desired to put an effort so that the girls become responsible citizens besides their regular studies. We have, thus, utilised the scope through NSS. We have guided them to keep the surroundings clean and to serve the poor slum dwellers in different ways. In 2006, this College started the programme of NSS and is still continuing with great enthusiasm.

THE CONTEXT

The college is named after the great social reformer, Raja Rammohan Roy. He was the first moderniser in India who recognised the need for an individual identity for women in society. That is why it is our goal to motivate our students to excel not only in their studies and careers but also to take up social responsibilities in the larger context.

THE PRACTICE

The memorable and historic days (National and International) are observed in the college with the weightage on road-shows or conducting seminars and lectures indicating awareness for the same. The list of such important days observed by the NSS are :

a) National Youth Day
 b) International Language Day
 c) 12th January
 d) 21st February

c) International Women's Day : 8th March (Seminar)

d) World Environment Day : 5th June
 e) Independence Day : 15th August
 f) Sadbhavna Day : 20th August
 g) International Literacy Day : 8th September
 h) NSS Day : 24th September

i) National Integration Day : 19th November
 j) World Aids Day : 1st December
 k) World Human Rights Day : 10th December

In social camps organized by the NSS, the students stage dramas on environment, mostly self composed. Swami Vivekananda's Mission for social service are highlighted through essay writing or debate competition. World Environment day is observed enthusiastically by planting saplings and road-shows. International Literacy Day in observed by distributing educational kit to the poor slum children. The students participate in University programmes also.

The local people including the students who come from the poor families get the facilities of Blood group testing and thalassemia checks. Awareness programmes on nutrition and planned diet are also held. Clothes are distributed among disadvantaged local people. Slum children are invited to NSS camps to participate in sit-n- draw and singing competitions.

In this college, the NSS unit is functioning with true spirit of social service and also committed to the same in future.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

NSS is one of the much liked units of the college. In each academic year around 100 students are enrolled. A large section of students, who cannot enrol, participate voluntarily. We have been awarded Best Volunteer Trophy in 2011, in 2012 Best Special Camp College Trophy and Best Coordinator Trophy. Best Volunteer Trophy was awarded again in 2013.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

Due to space problem, we are unable to establish more units, which turns out to be a hindrance in widening the periphery of NSS activities.

The long duration of the examination schedule of the University of Calcutta does not leave much scope for undertaking too many programmes of the NSS.

The fund provided for this purpose is inadequate. The teaching staff often voluntarily contribute to the expenses for conducting social camps.

Strength:

- Teaching and helping to successfully graduate from the university first generation students from economically weaker sections of the society so that they can engage themselves in gainful.
- A good Seminar library from where students can borrow expensive text and reference books which would not have been affordable otherwise.
- Every year all the teachers of the department correct 2 sets of Hons. papers and 3 sets of General papers. They also participate in the University examination process as paper setters, co-ordinators and moderators. For the past three years our department has served as the Zonal Centre for B.A (General) papers.

Weakness:

A fair percentage of the students coming from economically weaker backgrounds, are first generation learners and victims of gender discrimination at home. Many of our students have to work on the side of supplement their family income and at times this affects their attendance in class and at times some students drop out. This tells upon their final result though we try our best to help them pass the graduation exams.

Opportunities:

Partial financial assistance from the college also from the department as well as from the Govt. to motivate and enable the students to continue with their curriculum, pass the university examinations and seek gainful employment and thus improve their position in life.

Challenges:

Admitting students at the lowest level of cut-off marks as set by the university and then holding their hands through the course period to enable them to graduate and their academic qualification to seek employment. Continuous and informal counselling to motivate students to complete the course to make an independent living and not succumb to societal pressures for getting married.

Future plans:

- To make the course more interesting and exciting we request the UGC to make educational tours/excursions compulsory and to allocate fund for the purpose. We hope to make such tours the basis for projects by students on art and architecture which they have to study in their syllabus.
- We also hope to get exclusive computer for the department with internet facility so that both teachers and students can make full use of it for educational purposes.
- In future we hope to organise student seminars in class and between departments to make academic exchanges more enjoyable.

35. SWOC analysis of the Department and Future Plans

Strengths – From September 2012 onwards we had started Entry-in-SSC classes which were UGC funded. The students have a healthy interactive relationship with teachers of the Dept. They have the opportunity to avail themselves of books from the seminar library and discuss important issues with teachers. Our students hail from a multicultural background and meet at a common platform. We have taken initiative to personally identify economically-weak students and provide them support. Informal counselling is also done especially to encourage students from conservative communities not to drop out of their courses.

Weaknesses- A sizable chunk of the student population hails from financially unstable families so they face the pressure to start earning rather than studying with seriousness.

Also, many students suffer from inadequate grasp of basic English so that they are severely impeded in their Honours or Elective Studies

Opportunities- Successfully completing a degree in English opens up several opportunities such as joining BPOs, journalism, teaching, translation work, advertising.

We conduct student seminars to give them exposure to public speaking and presentations.

Challenges- The challenge is to make English studies a more inclusive proposition by actively encouraging all sections of society, not only the few privileged English-educated girls, to take up literature and pursue it to postgraduate and research levels.

We do this by inculcating the habit of reading in young minds. Also we give them projects doing which they are exposed to the joys of research into particular aspects of literary studies with a cross-cultural and interdisciplinary focus.

Our ultimate aim is to build rounded individuals with keen, analytic minds and vibrant personalities who can contribute to the growth of the country.

Future Plans- We plan to conduct a national conference on English in the digital era in association with the City College of Commerce under the UGC-scheme.

We would like to add to the number of books in the library so that students benefit more. When we are given laptops/ computer connectivity, then we would introduce more net-based teaching-learning activities.

Strength;

Rammohan College is the oldest girls' College with Commerce department in North Kolkata. Students of this department are very sincere and disciplined. They also show skill and excellence in other fields of activities like debate, recitation, sports & games, etc. The students from different provinces of India are admitted to the department. Interest of the students and the guardians in our department is increasing significantly year by year. The teacher-students relationship is healthy. The teachers are always available to the students. They take special and extra classes in addition to their scheduled classes. They take personal care of the students, meet the guardians of the students at regular intervals. The teachers always help the students in their academic affairs. Prizes are awarded to the students who secure highest marks in every subject and the first three positions in the Annual and Test examinations of the college. Ex-students of the department are holding important portfolio in different organizations. The performance of our students in University examinations is quite satisfactory and the success rate is higher than the University result percentage which may be observed from our last four years result.

The library of the department is upgraded every year. Home issue facility is provided to the students and they can also study in the library. In addition to the books the library maintains journals and magazines to enrich the students and the teachers on current affairs. The department maintains a seminar library also. We have a separate Computer laboratory for teaching the application part of Information Technology and its Application in Business.

Weakness;

A large number of students are eager to get admission in the Commerce Department of our College being attracted by its good results and healthy atmosphere. But they cannot be accommodated due to our limited space and classrooms. The department is running short of whole – time teachers. There are only two whole-time teachers at this moment. So, department is highly dependent on part-time and guest lecturers. Requisition for whole-time teachers was submitted to Govt. but no approval had yet been received.

The library space is not sufficient to accommodate more books and to provide better reading facilities to the students.

Opportunities and future plans:

Our College is located in a very convenient position and it is one of the leading Girls' Colleges of North Kolkata with hostel facility. There is a scope for admitting more students and opening of PG Course in Accounting & Finance and Honours Course in new subjects like Marketing and Taxation. We are also trying to initiate industrial enterprises to recruit our students through campus interviews. The Process of construction of new building is going on. If the accommodation problem is solved then we can materialise our plan.

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Part - E

POST-ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The honourable peer team members of National assessment and accreditation Council, Bangalore, India visited and assessed our College on 24th and 25th February, 2007. Within the next few years, the college has tried to rectify some of the errors—and give constructive shape to some of the futuristic plans and ideas as mentioned by honourable peer team members.

Keeping the recommendations in mind of the NAAC Peer Team, the college has taken the following initiatives for quality sustenance and enhancement in the last eight years (Post NAAC Period 2008-2015):

- A glorious chapter was added to the history of Rammohan College when Dr. Saswati Sanyal joined as the Principal (July 2015) to the post which was lying vacant for the last 35 years.
 - In August 2015, Computerization of Salary Account (COSA) system has been introduced in our College through which salary of whole time teaching and non-teaching staff under the pay packet scheme, Government of West Bengal is credited directly to personal bank accounts.
- 2. The College has introduced evaluation of the teachers by the students. The feedback from the students is obtained teacher-wise and course-wise.
- 3. The College website (www.rammohancollege.org) has been developed and upgraded recently.
- 4. Innovative teaching-Learning Procedure has been introduced for some subjects with some teaching aids like audio-visual mode of teaching i.e. using overhead projector, power

point presentations by LCD Projectors etc. in addition to Chalk and talk system. Research Laboratories with modern and advanced equipments has been introduced in the department of Physics, Chemistry, Geography, Botany, Physiology and Zoology. Computers with Internet facilities in the New Science building of Rammohan College has also been introduced. There is a well-designed modern Information technology laboratory in the Commerce department in New Science building of College.

- 5. Curriculum based educational excursions, field works and study tours are organised for enrichment of learning and experiential teaching in different departments. Teachers take active part in framing, modifying and the implementing the university syllabi of the degree courses.
- 6. One IQAC cell has been formed on 01-09-2009. But due to unavoidable reasons it was non functional. At the initiative of the newly appointed Principal the IQAC was reconstituted on 13-10-2015 and approved by the governing body on 16-10-2015. This cell hopes to work for Total Quality management like Curricula development, Teaching-Learning and evaluation, Research, Consultancy and Extension activities.
- 7. The college made 15 appointments under the pay packet scheme, Government of W.B. as Assistant Professors in Sanskrit, English, Geography, Botany, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physiology and Zoology departments to provide competent faculty to the students as per the vacancy of respective departments in the year 2014-2015.

 Moreover, in College office and Accounts section, five newly appointed staff joined under the pay packet scheme, Government of W.B. in October 2015. Two existing office staff
- 8. The teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the college are structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes through:

- Class tests, written assignments, unit tests, group discussions & interactive sessions, tutorials
- Mid-term and Test Examinations
- 9. The college NSS & NCC Units regularly organize programmes to enhance the social relevance of the courses.
 - The NCC Unit of Rammohan College has stopped functioning from 2013-14 because no Programme Officer below the age of 40 is available. However, 15 young full-time teachers have joined the institution recently and the college hopes to revive the NCC Unit soon.
- 10. College encourages research activities to all faculty members and the impact of the research atmosphere among the faculty members are reflected as:
 - The college authority has provided space in few departments to carry out research activities for the faculty and provided computer with internet facilities for some departments. The NSS is a popular and active wing of the college with a range of activities like plantation programme, winter camps, health check-ups, distribution of clothes and educational kits to slum children and so on.
 - Purchased books and journals according to the needs of the faculty.
 - Large numbers of faculty members received minor as well as major research projects in the post accredition period (Detail is listed under Criterion No- 3)
 - One faculty member has presented paper in the international conferences abroad as invited delegate (Manchester University, U.K. in 2011 and Kasetsart University, Bangkok, Thailand in 2015) and received the UGC Travel Grant Award to attend these conferences.

- More than 5 faculty members have presented papers in national and international conferences and seminars in India.
- Faculty members have published and presented a large number of research papers in their individual capacity.
- Four faculty members (Dr. Gouri Prasad Dutta, Dr. Kabita Dey, Dr. Sahana Majumdar, and Dr. Samarendra Nath Banerjee) have received recognition as Ph.D.
 Supervisor from the University of Calcutta. Ten research scholars are already being supervised by them.
- 11. One Animal House has been constructed in 2013 and maintained properly for continuation of animal research according to the CPCSEA (Committee for the Purpose of Control and Supervision of Experiments on Animals) guidelines. For this purpose IAEC (Institutional Animal Ethics Committee) has been formed. We have received animal house registration number (1795/ PO/ Ere/ S14CPCSEA) from CPCSEA, Ministry of Environment and Forest, New Delhi.

In addition, one human ethics committee has been formed by the College according to the guidelines of Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) to monitor research activities on human subjects.

- 12. The Rector's room has been renovated recently to conduct administrative activities and meetings.
- 13. One gymnasium for the students has been constructed.
- 14. One seminar room has been renovated in the new Science building of the college to conduct different academic activities and seminars. The Seminar room is well equipped with LCD projector, LED TV and Home theatre system.
- 15. A small garden of medicinal and ornamental plants in New Science Building has been developed.

- 16. Two small tanks for aquatic animals and plants are maintained by the department of Zoology and Botany to induct environmental awareness among students and also for practical classes.
- 17. The University of Calcutta has granted affiliation to the MA course in Bengali from the session 2014-2015 on self finance basis.
- 18. Purchased photocopiers, scanners and printers after 2007 to facilitate learning and administrative jobs.
- 19. A solar water heating system has been installed in the hostel of our college in the year 2013-14 for constant supply of hot water. The staff rest-room and the ground floor especially the kitchen of the hostel have been renovated.
 - The Career and Counselling Cell was constituted in the year 2009 after receiving XI plan merged scheme UGC fund. Detail The Career and Counselling Cell is set up in order to help the students so that they can cope better with the demands and pressures of increasingly competitive surroundings and prepare them for their future career. So this cell organizes seminars time to time in the college (Detail is listed under Criterion No- 5 and 7).
- 20. Coaching for economically and academically backward students through remedial classes in different departments of college are conducted.
- 21. Coaching for Entry Level examinations of School Service Commission. But due to some problems now this coaching classes are discontinued.
- 22. Heath Camps are organized for health checkups for students in college. For example, in Sadhana Sarkar Memorial Hostel a health camp was organized recently. 150 students took part in health checkups programme. Doctors and nurses examined their weight, pulse, blood group, blood pressure and blood glucose level. The NSS unit of the College also organizes health camps.

23. Massive renovation and restoration work had been done in the Rammohan Ray Memorial Museum. The entire campus is being cleanedup and beautified. The New Science building, within this campus is being extended. New office chambers for the Principal, Vice-Principal, and Bursar have been earmarked in the new science building.

- Development of smart class rooms and Wi-Fi connections in the New Science building campus

REPORT OF THE PEER TEAM ON THE INSTITUTIONAL ASSESSMENT AND ACCREDITATION OF RAMMOHAN COLLEGE, KOLKATA, WEST BENGAL

SECTION - 1: INTRODUCTION

Rammohan College had a very humble beginning in 1943 as a Women's Department in City College, one of the oldest premier institutions of Kolkata. It became a separate college for women in 1961. The college was named after Raja Rammohan Roy, the chief architect of the 19th century Bengal Renaissance. Women's empowerment through higher education being the goal, the college has come a long way since its inception to incorporate the ideals of Raja Rammohan Roy and translate his vision into reality by promoting the cause of female education. The college is located in the urban environs of Kolkata in West Bengal. The college caters to the higher education needs of the large section of economically and educationally backward students of the region. The college is recognised by UGC under 2(f) since 1961 and is affiliated to the University of Calcutta.

The college has Humanities, Science and Commerce faculties with a total number of 17 departments. It has 8 departments (Bengali, English, Hindi, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Education and Philosophy) in humanities faculty, 8 departments (Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics, Physiology, Geography and Economics) in Science faculty and the Department of Commerce. The college offers 6 UG courses – B.A. (Honours and General), B.Sc. (Honours and General), B.Com. (Honours and General). The College offers Honours courses in all the subjects except Hindi. The college has started offering a post-graduate course in Physiology (M.Sc. in Human Physiology) from 2006-07 session.

The college offers 17 subject combination options at the graduation level. The faculty consists of 62 permanent teachers and 40 part-time teachers of which 38 have Ph.D., 16 have M.Phil. and 1 has D.Phil. degrees. There are 45 administrative and 2 technical staff members in the college. The college has had an enrolment of 1976 students during 2005-06. The dropout rate was 16 per cent during 2005-06. The pass percentage was 95 in 2005-06.

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The college buildings and facilities are spread over two campuses (old and new) with an area of 6010 square meters and a separate hostel building. The 4 storied building in the old campus houses the administrative offices, classrooms, library, laboratories, staff room, common room, canteen, etc. The new campus i.e., the heritage building of Raja Rammohan Roy was acquired by the college in 1979. A new science building has been constructed in the new campus and the college has also acquired land adjacent to the heritage building in 2005. Honours and practical classes of some departments are held in the new campus. The college has also hostel provision for about 180 students.

The college has a Central Library, Canteens and some indoor games facilities. The college works under annual system as per the affiliating university's academic plans and curricula. The unit cost of education per student is Rs. 1420/- excluding the salary component and Rs. 11,976/- including the salary component.

The college has a Governing Body, which functions as per the statutes of University of Calcutta, UGC guidelines and the orders of the Government of West Bengal. The Principal/Teacher-in-Charge of the College is the ex-officio Secretary of the Governing Body who manages the college with the help of Deputy Teacher-in-charge, Bursar and various committees like Finance Committee, Purchase Committee, Examination Committee, Hostel Committee, Academic Committee, Library Committee, etc.

Rammohan College volunteered to be assessed and accreditated by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore and submitted its Self Study Report in January 2007. The NAAC constituted a Peer Team consisting of Prof. P.C. Deka, former Vice-Chancellor, Tezpur University, Assam as Chairman, Dr. Reny George, Principal, St. Thomas College, Bhillai as Member and Prof. Sunil Kanta Behera, Department of Mass Communication, Berhampur University, Berhampur, Orissa as Member Coordinator. Dr. M.S. Shyamasundar, Deputy Adviser, NAAC, Bangalore was the Coordinating Officer.

The Peer Team after carefully studying and analysing the Self Study Report visited the college on 24th and 25th February 2007. The Peer Team visited all the



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laboratory for the students and teachers which will facilitate the process of teaching. learning and research.

The collaboration with Technable Solutions Pvt. Ltd. for BPO training to the students is laudable. The college has to take initiatives to offer more job-oriented courses like information technology, computer applications, journalism and mass communication, biotechnology, advertising, public relations, videography, etc. Though the college conducts seminars occasionally, it must initiate steps to conduct seminars, workshops regularly thus bringing in academic peers to review the existing curriculum. The college through the College Development Council of University of Calcutta can always get funds from UGC and other organisations for conducting Regional and National Seminars and Workshops.

Criterion - II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

The college follows a transparent admission policy and the students are admitted on the basis of their academic records, counselling and as per the rules and regulations laid down by the University of Calcutta. Reservation rules of the government are followed in admissions. The college has some provisions for financial aids to the poor and needy students like stipends, freeships, etc. The demand ratio on an average is 1:2 (two applicants for one seat). The teachers are advised to prepare their own teaching plan at the beginning of the academic year. The syllabus needs to be unitised in terms of lectures. Departmental meetings are arranged regularly to monitor the progress made in the coverage of the syllabus and to identify the gaps which need special attention. Teachers monitor the progress of students through class tests, test examinations and annual examinations.

The prospectus and academic calendar are published and supplied to the students at the beginning of the session. The college works for 233 days in a year out of which 201 are teaching days. The teaching programme of the students is carried out in the form of classroom lectures followed by tutorials and seminars in some departments. Some departments use OHP and slide projectors. Teachers counsel the students and guide them



for their academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Though library use by students and teachers is satisfactory, efforts should be made for its optimal utilisation through automation and computerisation.

Permanent teachers are recruited by the Governing Body on the basis of the recommendations of the College Service Commission, West Bengal. The college has the freedom to appoint guest faculties and part-time teachers for which payments are made from the college fund. The faculty is well-qualified and dedicated for the academic growth of the students. The teachers update their knowledge by attending refresher courses, workshops and seminars. During last 2 years, teachers from Education, Zoology and philosophy have participated and presented research papers in International Seminars in Netherlands, the UK and Greece. The department of Education has been able to organise Communication Workshop and Gender Sensitivity Workshop for the students.

The college follows the self-appraisal method of teachers and evaluation by the students, but it needs to be streamlined and the appraisal and evaluation methods as per the UGC or affiliating university guidelines should be adopted. The college may even introduce the system of collecting students' feedback on teaching and the college experience in general at the end of every academic year.

Criterion - III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Many teachers possess Ph.D. degrees and are actively engaged in research. The research output of teachers of most of the departments and particularly of Zoology. Physiology, Botany, Bengali, Economics, etc. speaks for their dedication in research. There have been international and national research publications by the teachers and it is heartening to note that teachers of science departments as well as Economics, Mathematics and Bengali have undertaken UGC funded minor research projects. Even one teacher of Physiology has been awarded with Post-Doctoral Fellowship at Morehouse School of Medicine, Atlanta, USA and one teacher of Zoology was awarded with Post Doctoral Fellowship at Kansas University Medical Centre, USA and Fellow of Zoological Society, Kolkata for his research contributions.



The college has provision for study leave to teachers for their research. The very few teachers avail of the study leave to pursue their research. As the college is recognised by UGC, it can get funding for major and minor research projects from ICSSR, CSIR, ICHR and other funding agencies. The teachers from humanias and commerce may initiate efforts for projects and research publications. The collegeneeds to make a serious effort to utilise and consolidate the talent of its teachers and promote a research culture, specially in areas relevant to regional needs. Some teachers have been able to establish national and international linkages for research and academic collaborations.

The college has recently started NSS and NCC wings and the college has been able to organise some extension programmes and social awareness camps with the help of Rotary Club and local NGOs. These extension activities need to be systematical and organised regularly in collaboration with NGOs and other government agencies, saving the cause of the society.

Criterion - IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

administrative buildings. The classrooms, offices, and other support services existing the old building, whereas the new science building has provisions for 9 classooms, laboratories and few office rooms. The college has canteen, common room for stakents, staff rooms, auditorium, seminar room, etc. The college also has hostel facilities for 180 students. The college develops and maintains its infrastructure by utilising funds from the State Government, UGC, M.P. Lad funds and own resources. The extension of the 2nd floor of the new science building is under progress with a grant of Rs. 16 lake from the M.P. Lad fund. The college received Rs. 12.48 lakh for equipment, books, building, extension, etc. from UGC under 10th Plan. The maintenance of the college infrastructure is done by external agencies as and when needed, with the approval of the Governing Body.

The college has a Central Library with a collection of 21,753 books. The calege also subscribes for 8 popular and research journals. The library remains open for ady 4

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hours a day as the main building where the library is situated is shared by two other colleges – City College (day) and Anandamohan College (might). The library is partially computerised. Few departments also have small seminar libraries which are easily accessible to the students for longer duration. The development and purchase of books and journals for the library is done by the librarian and Teacher-in-Charge assisted by a library committee. Efforts should be made for automation and computerisation of the library. Internet and reprographic facilities should be provided to the students and staff. The computer facilities which are available in the departments of Mathematics, Physics, Commerce and Geography should be made available to all the departments to facilitate computer-aided teaching. For effective classroom teaching facility of OHP/Slide Projector/LCD Projector be extended to all the departments.

Criterion - V: Student Support and Progression

The students' profile of the college reveals that about 5 per cent of the students belong to backward classes and about 25 per cent of the students belong to low-income families of the nearby localities. The dropout rate is about 16 per cent and the percentage of students passing the university examinations is quite high, varying between 90 and 95 per cent. There is no system to monitor the progression of students to higher studies or employment, but few of the departments' profile states that about 50 per cent of the students of Zoology, Physiology etc. pursue post-graduate studies.

The college has reasonably adequate support services to ensure healthy growth of students. The college publishes its updated prospectus and academic calendar annually which contains information regarding the profile of the college, mission and goals, admission procedures and criteria, courses offered, subject combinations, brief outline of syllabi, fees structure, list of teaching and non-teaching staff, scholarships, awards and stipends, facilities available in the college, hostel, governing body, list of holidays, examination calendar, etc. The college admissions are based on the marks obtained in the qualifying examinations and the reservation policy of the government.

The grievance redressal cell needs to be established and made functional and effective. The college has recently formed an alumni association which is yet to function

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BPO training courses to the students in collaboration with Technable Solutions. Ltd. Teachers offers academic and personal counselling to the students formally asself as informally. The college should make efforts to offer career counselling and personal services to the students on a regular basis. The college encourages the stants to participate in sports, games, literary and quiz competitions at college, inter-case and university level. The college shall develop a mechanism to elicit more at more participation of students in extra and co-curricular activities to ensure holistic participal development.

Criterion - VI: Organisation and Management

As a grant-in-aid college, it functions as a unit of the Brahmo Samaj facation Society. The Governing Body constituted as per the West Bengal Government facts and the affiliating university's guidelines supervises, controls and regulates all ademic, administrative and financial affairs of the college. The Teacher-in-Charge fact the Secretary of the Governing Body is the executive head. The faculty membersheputy teacher-in-charge, bursar, superintendents, non-teaching staff and the students aist the Teacher-in-Charge in the smooth management of the college. There are everal committees like academic committee, finance committee, admission committee, examination committee, etc., which help the Teacher-in-Charge. Teachers' Committee, a statutory body which contributes to the overall management and growth of the carge.

The college has a marginal deficit budget. However, it has been ablustaise resources through M.P. LAD funds, UGC Plan allocations, matching grants the State Government and the receipts from tuition and development fees. The ellege maintains the records and accounts which are audited regularly. College has are utilised properly on a need-based approach. Computerisation of the office (admirative and finance) will ensure efficient bookkeeping and financial administration.

The college has been able to organise computer training programmes for nonteaching staff. Though self-appraisal of teachers and performance appraisal non-

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teaching staff and evaluation by students have been in practice, these need to be structured and more effectively implemented.

The Governing Body and the other stakeholders need to prepare a vision plan with a realistic assessment of the contemporary and future needs of higher education and focussing on resource mobilisation through introduction of job-oriented vocational self-financing courses thus enhancing the employability of the students.

Criterion - VII: Healthy Practices

The college is following some healthy practices which are noteworthy.

- Good interpersonal relationship between the governing body members, teacherin-charge, teachers, staff and students helps in establishing and developing the college into a reasonably good centre of higher learning.
- Academic audit through regular monitoring of students' progress by conducting
 class tests and students' presentations and the performance appraisal of teachers
 by the Teacher-in-charge by examining and analysing the self-appraisals by the
 teachers. Academic progress is also monitored by the departmental teachers and
 the Head at regular intervals.
- Management of the Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum by the college and the
 organisation of seminars on Human Rights, Women's Rights and observance of
 World Environment Day, Communal Harmony Day etc, help the students in
 building strong character and ensure humanitarian and value-based education for
 the students.
- The practice of having regular interaction of teachers with the parents regarding their wards' progress as well as the problems and prospects of the college is noteworthy.
- Decentralisation of college administration and involvement of teachers through membership of various committees for effective management.

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- Provision for short training on Cutting and Tailoring, Batik and Soft Toy making by 'Aparajita' a wing of Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum and also BPO training for the students in collaboration of Technable Solutions Pvt. Ltd.
- It is notable that the college has been able to provide hostel accommodation for 130 students and residential accommodation to few non-teaching staff at subsidised rate with reasonably good facilities.

SECTION - 3: OVERALL ANALYSIS

The Peer Team after going through the Self Study Report and assessing the college during its visit feels that Rammohan College has succeeded to a large extent in translating its vision and goals into academic practices. The college has carned a reputation for promoting the cause of higher education for girls, particularly from the economically and educationally backward communities. The Peer Team appreciates in particular the following features of the functioning of the college:

- Dedication of the faculty members to their academic and administrative commitment and their involvement in the process of growth and development of the college.
 - ii) The teachers' involvement and pursuance of research with national and international publications, participation in seminars, workshops and conferences needs special commendation.
 - Regular publication of the updated prospectus and academic calendar every year and providing those to the students at the beginning of the academic session.
 - iv) Contribution to community life and inculcation, of discipline and human values through the conduct of social awareness camps, health awareness camps and community development programmes.
 - Academic and personal counselling of the students by the teachers, both formally and informally.

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While appreciating the efforts of the college, the Peer Team takes to opportunity to make a few suggestions, in addition to the ones made under different criteria, which may help the college to formulate its road-map for future development.

- The college may introduce some skill-based job-oriented certificate/short-tem Diploma courses in consultation with business and industry sector. The course may be Computer Applications, Journalism and Mass Communication, Fashin Designing, Advertising, Public Relations, Videography, Secretarial Practice, Food Processing, etc. Some of these could be pursued under the vocation subject grid of the UGC or as fees-paying 'add-on' courses to be pursued simultaneously with conventional degree courses.
- The college should make serious efforts for mobilisation of financial resources for the construction of the new buildings for humanities and commerce faculties in the new campus to facilitate the introduction of new courses and to implement the future expansion plans. The college may approach the UGC, the State Government, the elected representatives and other philanthropic organisations funding.
- The college should approach UGC for establishing a Computer Centre will Internet connectivity for the staff and students.
- Modernisation and computerisation of the library and office should be given priority by the college authorities. The range of books outside the orbit of textbooks should be enlarged in the library and more books should be issued to the students.
- The self-appraisal and other appraisal mechanisms of teachers and non-teachers staff need to be streamlined in the light of UGC and affiliating university guidelines.

- The Science laboratories should be strengthened by acquiring more equipments
 as per the curricular requirements and the maintenance of existing equipments
 should be given priority.
- The college should take necessary steps for immediate filling-up of the vacant teaching and non-teaching posts. The governing body should take immediate steps to fill up the vacant teaching post in Hindi and to create more full time permanent posts in Commerce on a priority basis, keeping in view the increasing demand for Commerce education and the future plans of the department for the introduction of Honours in Marketing and courses like BBA etc.
- The college should also initiate steps to introduce Masters' Course in few of the Science and Commerce departments.
- The college should make provisions for computer-aided teaching-learning process by acquiring LCD projectors and other audio-visual aids. Teachers should be encouraged to facilitate teaching-learning with the use of the computer and audio-visual aids.
- Steps should be taken to provide reasonable training in games and sports to the students. A Physical Education Teacher may be appointed and the Gymnasium should be established without further delay. Arrangements should be made for the use of a nearby playground for regular conduct and practice of sports and games. A basketball court may be constructed in the new campus.
- Seminars and Workshops may be organised regularly by the college thus bringing
 in more academic peers for evaluation of the curricula and teaching-learning
 process. Arrangement for UGC funds may be initiated through the College
 Development Council of the affiliating university.
- NSS and NCC units established recently should be strengthened by organising socially relevant and community oriented programmes.
- The Alumni Association established recently needs to be streamlined and strengthened.

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The college should consider seriously for establishing a Grievance Redressal Cell.

Provision should be made for a spacious canteen with multiple food options at affordable price.

The college being situated on the busy streets of Kolkata face lot of noise pollution and traffic congestion. The college should approach the appropriate authorities for creation of a "No Horn Zone" and suitable traffic control for the safety of the students.

The Peer Team takes this opportunity to laud the efforts of various stakeholders of the college in making it a premier institution serving the cause of female education in West Bengal.

The Peer Team places on record its appreciation for the Teacher-in-Charge, Coordinator of the Steering Committee, all teachers and non-teaching staff, students, alumni, parents and members of the Governing Body for their cooperation in making the Peer Team's work feasible. The Peer Team expresses its gratitude to the college community for their gracious hospitality and all other facilities readily made available to it during the visit.

The Peer Team wishes the college all success in its efforts to offer quality higher education and achieve excellence.

INTRODUCTION

Starting its journey in 1961, Rammohan College completed 50 years in June, 2011. We celebrated the Golden Jubilee of the college which has established itself as one of the first grade colleges in West Bengal.

HISTORY

Rammohan College owes its origin to City College, Calcutta, which is one of the oldest first grade Colleges in West Bengal. It was founded in 1881 by a band of patriotic and self-less Brahmo leaders like Ananda Mohan Bose, Pandit Sivnath Sastri and Umesh Chandra Dutta. Rastraguru Surendranath Banerjee later joined the College as a teacher. City College had a Women's Department in the morning which was separately affiliated to the Calcutta University in 1961, and was named after Raja Rammohan Roy, the chief architect of 19th Century Bengal Renaissance.

LOCATION

Located at 102/1, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata-700 009, Rammohan College is one of the City Group of Colleges administered by the Brahmo Samaj Education Society, a registered society, constituted by the Sadharan Brahmo Samaj, Calcutta. A new Science Building at 85A, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata 700 009 has started functioning since 2003.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The founding fathers of the college had a clear aim before them which 'is to promote' the cause of education in its highest and widest sense. DEPT. OF PHYSIOLOGY (P. G. SECTION) 85A, RAJA RAMMOHAN SARANI, KOLKATA 700 009

The post graduate course in Human Physiology was started from the session 2006 - 2007 by the affiliation of C.U. Admission to this course becomes open after publication of final result of B. Sc. examination and it is on merit basis. It is a day time course and is co-educational.

The P.G. Course is guided by faculty of Physiology department and guest lecturers of this institution.

The semester system in P. G. course has been introduced in the session 2013-14. According to the C.U. norms, from the session 2014-15 the P. G. course in "Human Physiology" has been fully converted to semester system which constitutes four semesters in two years. The fees for each semester is Rs. 19,350/- to be paid during admission and also to be paid during enrollment for the next semester accordingly.

A research unit has also been opened in the department. Two research scholars under Dr. Gouri Prosad Dutta, one scholar under Dr. Sahana Mazumdar, one scholar jointly under Dr. Sahana Mazumdar and Dr. Amalendu Samanta and two scholars are doing their research work under Dr. Samarendra Nath Banerjee.

The College has Humanities, Science and Commerce faculties with a total number of 17 departments. The college offers UG Courses — B.A. (Hons. & General), B. Sc. — (Hons. & General), B. Com. — (Hons. & General) & Honours Courses in all subjects except Hindi. The College has started offering a post-graduate course in Physiology (M. Sc. in Human Physiology) from 2006-07 session and Bengali (M. A.) from 2014.

RULES & REGULATIONS

Applicants for admission are advised to appear personally along with their guardians: no seat can be reserved without payment of necessary fees.

□ DOCUMENTS NECESSARY FOR ADMISSION □

The application form must be accompanied by the following documents.

- Admit Card of the Class X School Leaving Examination or Age Proof.

- SC/ST/OBC Certificate.
- B.P.L. Card Holder Certificate.
- Physically Challenged Certificate.
- Transfer Certificate showing the percentage of attendance and the progress report from the institution last attended in case of students from another college.
- Letter from the natural guardian appointing a local guardian when the student will not live with parents.
- Migration Certificate is required in the case of a student passing from other State Boards.
- N. B. : Originals must be produced at the time of Admission.
 - Students of CBSC, ISC and National Institute of Open Schooling need not to submit the migration certificate.

☐ PROVISIONAL ADMISSION ☐

 Students are admitted provisionally pending post admission scrutiny of application forms. If any admission is obtained in violation of standing Rules and/or Procedures of admission of the Calcutta University and/or of the College for reasons whatsoever, admission is liable to be cancelled. • Students who join the college on migration from other state boards get themselves admitted after the last date of admission fixed by the University are reminded that their admission to this college is purely provisional. They are required to fill up necessay forms, submit requisite documents in support of their application, and pay the required fees immediately after admission, for transmission to the University.

Under no circumstances will the college authorities take any responsibility if permission for the sanction of provisional admission is refused. If such students fail to secure permission within six months from the date of admission, their admission to the college will be cancelled, however fees already paid will not be refunded.

☐ TRANSFER ☐

Students once admitted will not be permitted to take transfer within the academic year provided:

She has paid all college dues till date and Transfer Fee of Rs. 400/- only. Transfer Certificates may, however, be granted in special cases within the academic year under the following circumstances:

- Free studentship are granted to B.A/B.Sc./B.Com. students exclusively on the basis of merit, good conduct, attendance in class and satisfactory progress in studies.
- Partial fee concession is granted on application in special circumstances. Students eligible for S.C., S.T. stipend or National Scholarships will not get fee concession.
- Students seeking concession must furnish reliable certificate in support of their application.
- Students availing of the student's concession from the Railways will be liable to a fine unless they present their Concession tickets to the College Office within 7 days from the date of issue.

□ REFUND □

- Science fees and Laboratory Maintenance fees are non-refundable.
- Only Migration fee and University fees where applicable, are refundable (Subject to some restrictions).
- Deposit slip/Credit memo/Fee book/Identity card in original must be deposited with the application (in duplicate) for any refund. Applications will be received by the Accounts Section between 2nd and 7th day of every month from 8 A.M. to 10 A.M. if not otherwise directed. The time and day scheduled are to be strictly followed.
- Refund of Tuition fees against concession has to be claimed within the notified period on production of the fee book / Identity Card.

THE RAJA RAMMOHUN ROY MEMORIAL MUSEUM

(A project being undertaken and developed by Rammohan College)

Raja Rammohun Roy (1772-1833), the great scholar, thinker, reformer, and a man with immense depth and breadth of vision, attempted to inspire contemporary Indian society to adopt the path of modernism through mental and moral uplift of mankind. Rabindranath Tagore has said "Rammohun Roy inaugurated the Modern Age in India. Rammohun belongs to the lineage of India's great seers." In Tagore's opinion Rammohun was the only person in his time to realise completely the significance of the Modern Age.

The museum, the first ever and only one on Rammohun is located at the family residence of Rammohun at 85A, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata-9. The residence, a majestic building about 200 years old with attractive architecture of early 19th century has been declared a 'Heritage Building' by the Kolkata Municipal Corporation.

Rammohan College, acquired, renovated and restored the house from its ruins for the purpose of converting the building into Raja Rammohun Roy Memorial Museum with active support from the Govt. of West Bengal.

The repair and renovation work has been done by the Department of PWD, Government of West Bengal.

A permanent exhibition on the eventful life, revolutionary ideas and pioneering works of Rammohun against the background of Western enlightenment was opened in 2000. The project was financed entirely out of donations received from generous people.

Govt. of West Bengal and Ministry of Culture, Govt. of India, have rendered financial assistance for the promotion and development of the museum.

The museum in the developed form was inaugurated on May 22, 2009. It is opened to public from 10 am to 4-45 pm except Monday. Nearly 2000 visitors within and outside the state visited the museum last year.

A vocational training course for college students and local ladies on Art and Craft is run in the museum under the name "Aparajita". It runs a handicraft section for Batik, Embroidery, Fabric & Glass Painting.

A Pre-primary Training Programme has been started in September 2012. Certificates have been issued to successful students for the last three years.

Folder, picture post card, DVD, CD produced and published by the museum are on sale from Museum Sales Counter. W.B. Tourism Department has included this museum in their city tour.



- Attendance of parents in Guardian Teacher Meeting is obligatory.


