1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Rammohan College, a leading name in women's education, started its journey as the women's department of City College way back in 1943 but exists today in its present independent form since it became a separate college in 1961, affiliated with the University of Calcutta. The college proudly bears the name of the 'Maker of Modern India', Raja Rammohan Roy, who was the pioneering spirit behind the Bengal Renaissance, and who was not afraid to question the social and religious anomalies of the time and most significantly, who fought the highly effective battle against Hindu orthodoxy and prejudices which were responsible for the suffering of women. Originally administered by the Brahma Samaj Education Society, and now a fully government-aided institution, the college has a rich tradition of nurturing young women from all sections of society, irrespective of class, caste, religious or economic backgrounds, and helping them develop into disciplined, socially aware, community-oriented, truly educated human beings who make important contributions in every sphere. Quite appropriate, therefore, is the motto of the college, "Shraddhavan labhate jnanam" meaning "Wisdom belongeth to the reverent." Opening up the frontiers of knowledge in the sciences, social sciences, humanities as well as exploring avenues to rediscover and rejuvenate our ancient treasures of wisdom is a way in which the institution bridges the gap between modern, technology-enabled skills and an approach shaped by respect towards our culture and tradition.

The institution understands the pressing need of the hour to foster a learning system which will not only create students adept in their specific fields of academic study, but which will develop future citizens endowed with persuasive communication and soft skills, a sympathetic outlook on society and environment and a desire to invent and innovate. Keeping in mind the dual aim to preserve the best of our own age-old value system along with the acquiring of even the most recent advances in knowledge, we believe in inculcating in students the spirit of 'continue, concentrate and conquer'.

Vision

The vision of Rammohan College is audacious as it is ambitious for our teachers dream of building a grand edifice that will serve as a model educational institution for not only the state but also the country to emulate. Following in the footsteps of the Raja who was the earliest proponent of an equitable and inclusive modern India, we will build an institution of the future where women will be trained to perform a leading role in shaping public policy and giving a new, humane direction to the life of the nation. In doing this, the college will contribute to the important task of nation-building by empowering its women in finding their voice. We believe in the innate strength of all women; the vision is based on the trust that this strength can be harnessed for the cause of what is right and just by giving the necessary all-round support. We understand that the road to achieving an egalitarian space where women will find acceptance as leaders is not easy but that is a challenge we are prepared to take as a forward-looking institution. We believe the vision is unique in that we propose a work ethic and course structure such that no student is left out of the ambit of an opportunity to grow.

While the vision of the college is to mould today's young, eager students into intellectually mature, dynamic, digitally-adept, technology-oriented, citizens of tomorrow, it also includes the wish to enable them to become

lifelong learners and adapt to the fast-changing circumstances of the world. We believe the success of our students nurtured in this way and the continued efforts of our teachers and administration will help the college become a leading centre of learning, research and extension activities in the state and the country.

The success of our mission would be tested when our students face every challenge headlong and turn it into an opportunity. The mission also includes the quest for creating an atmosphere of learning that will foster the thirst for knowledge and facilitate the desire to innovate; students would be guided to be able to take a proactive stand against injustice and be a beacon of hope to those suffering in any form. Since we believe in the adage, 'necessity is the mother of invention,' we envisage our students providing innovative solutions to problems, both small and big, that they encounter as responsible and aware participants in social life.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

Strength

1. Located on one of the main thoroughfares of central Kolkata, Rammohan College is extremely well-placed and widely connected by several means of communication. The closeness of the Howrah and Sealdah railway stations adds to the accessibility for this eminent women's college.

2. The timing of classes in the early hours allows for comfortable travelling, fresh atmosphere for academic learning leaving ample scope for extra-curricular activities, hobbies, sports, part-time work and leisure.

3. Outstation students are housed in impressive 180-seated-hostel nearby.
4. Rammohan College has a democratic working atmosphere. The Principal, teachers, non-teaching staff are always available to students.
5. The Governing Body and college administration are committed to the welfare of students and readily accept proposals and initiate beneficial steps.
6. The highly-qualified and experienced faculty is devoted to enhancing the teaching-learning process working tirelessly for all-round growth and well-being of students. The teachers act as mentors, guides and counsellors in academic, co-curricular and career-related matters.
7. The institution fosters an excellent research atmosphere. Students are guided and teachers engage in advanced research, participate in seminars and conferences at national and international level and contribute to journals and books.
8. The institution has adopted a learner-centric teaching approach. Courses under the NEP have been introduced; students' seminars, workshops are held covering aspects of the 4-year degree courses.
9. Online admission process is transparent.
10. The second campus at 85A, Raja Rammohan Sarani, Kolkata, includes Raja Rammohun Roy Memorial Museum which is a heritage building.
11. The new building has upgraded laboratories, seminar rooms, smart classrooms, IT labs and auditorium. A Geography-department-supervised weather-station under the Indian Meteorological Department operates here. The medicinal plant garden, nurtured by the Botany department, is an oasis offering produce to many colleges. The rare animal house, run by the Zoology department, and the sole SPM monitor in a North Kolkata college, set up by IISER, Mohanpur, facilitate research.

12. NSS and NCC units galvanise students towards social outreach and community service.
13. The 'green campus' manages waste, harvests rainwater and has solar panels.
14. UG, PG sections have separate, well-stacked central and seminar libraries.

Institutional Weakness

WEAKNESS

1. The college works primarily at a building which it shares with City College and Ananda Mohan College, and these results in a space crunch for classrooms as also limits the duration of use. Certain facilities like the students' common room and the NCC room cannot be utilised beyond a certain hour.
2. While the New Science Building can comfortably hold the science theory and practical classes, and additional floors constructed have helped them in this regard, the Social Science, Humanities and Commerce departments cannot be accommodated easily. The construction of another building in this new campus, plans for which have been made, needs to be hastened.
3. The central library is continuously engaged in augmenting and updating its collection of books, journals and online resources but is yet to be completely computerised and digitalised in terms of usage and accessibility of resources.
4. A sizeable number of students in this institution are first or second generation learners, hailing from a wide range of social, economic and cultural backgrounds. Hence, their language competencies, both in the mother tongue and English, are sometimes found to be unsound, and this is a hurdle in their academic and career growth pathways.
5. The college has not yet been able to provide a students' common room in the New Building which houses mainly the science and postgraduate departments. However, plans have been proposed to construct a space for rest and leisure for students on the roof-top terrace.
6. Several appointments of teaching and non-teaching staff have been made over the years, yet some departments like Commerce continue to lack the requisite number of permanent teachers and the office too is short-staffed. The scarcity of staff, especially in the Group C and Group D categories, is keenly felt and requires additional effort by the existing members and teachers to ensure optimum service to students.

Institutional Opportunity

OPPORTUNITIES

1. Rammohan College has a vibrant academic atmosphere based on a cordial teacher-student relationship. Students from the Major and Minor streams as well as the postgraduate disciplines will continue to receive guidance from the teachers to improve their learning outcomes, undertake research-based studies, and reach milestones.
2. The college aims to involve students and alumni in developing ideas to place the college in an

important position as a global centre of modern education.

3. The college fosters research and innovation by the faculty, paving the way for many scientific and humanities papers, projects and contributions to knowledge. With an excellent faculty, the college aims to further develop the research ecosystem by applying for financial assistance and collaborations. More institutional publications can be brought out.
4. A sense of institutional and social responsibilities is instilled in students through extension activities like the NSS and the NCC. The college aims to continue its commitment toward society by engaging its staff and students more towards service to society through enhancing extension activities.
5. The Students' Union maintains contact between students and teachers. It organises Freshers' Welcome and College Social every year to welcome newcomers and forge bonds of friendship and belonging. They also celebrate Saraswati Puja in a traditional way with enthusiastic student participation.
6. The campus will be made more inclusive by conducting gender (the college has already conducted a gender audit) and civic awareness programmes and psychology sessions.
7. Students participate in co-curricular activities and have won prizes in local, national and international events. More participation will be encouraged through motivation.
8. The college has MoUs with many institutions of higher learning, but aims to expand its collaboration with various institutes at the regional and national/ international levels.
9. The college aims to make a complete green campus addressing issues like waste, biodiversity, water and energy management, ban on plastic usage and adopting other environment friendly measures as reflected in the Green Audit Report.

Institutional Challenge

CHALLENGES

1. In view of the paucity of space, it is a major challenge to arrange for the optimum utilisation of available areas for teaching, research, administrative and extension activities without compromising on the quality of output.
2. Since the recruitment of both the teaching and non-teaching staff is the purview of the government, the college often has to function with a depleted workforce on retirement or transfer of incumbents. Under these circumstances, completing administrative work or meeting academic deadlines is a real challenge. The absence of suitable candidates for the reserved positions adds to the challenge of dealing with vacancies.
3. The college hostel requires a fresh infusion of funds to upgrade security and provide modern amenities. It is a challenge to maintain the girls' hostel keeping in mind safety and comfort issues without adequate financial support from outside agencies. We are awaiting the rest of the RUSA funds.
4. Adequate financial support is required for construction of College building for Arts and Commerce stream at 85 B,C,D Raja Rammohan Sarani.
5. Generating revenue for the proper upkeep of existing infrastructure and carrying out green initiatives is a stiff challenge though some avenues for earning through self-financed courses or selling produce generated on campus are being explored. Efforts have been made by the English department to raise

funds through the sale of its departmental magazine, 'Looking Glass' and the Bengali department organised a handicraft exhibition of their alumni association where items were sold.

6. We could explore opportunities of internships in various industries for our students. We have a fruitful collaboration with a software organisation headed by Mr. Sourish Dutta, Assistant Professor, Brainware University, a collaborator in research on AI with Rammohan College. He gave suggestions for 'Learn and Earn' and guided students to software jobs.
7. With an extremely rich pool of staff and students the college has got the potential to introduce various diploma and certificate courses. Though syllabus-framing is done by the affiliating University of Calcutta, the college can offer suggestions to them and include new aspects of value addition through more add-on courses like language teaching using the state-of-the-art language lab.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Curricular Aspects

- Rammohan College is affiliated to Calcutta University and follows their prescribed syllabus. Academic processes in RMC are streamlined, with routine, timetables, workloads of teachers and other administrative staff of the college to provide the holistic development for girls.
- The Academic sub-committee conducts meetings regularly for enrichment of teaching methods and evaluation system of students through internal, theoretical and practical examinations. The Academic sub-committee also conducts meetings to modify the master routine of college for additional classes. The task of preparation of routine (Hons and Gen: BA, BSc, BCom, PG - Bengali and Human Physiology, the syllabi of different subjects are distributed to the different departments and circulated among the students of respective semesters. Seminars and invited lectures are arranged to further increase the interest of the students in various facets of their selected subjects. The library is regularly upgraded so that students have access to books, journals and magazines. Students use the library for borrowing books and carrying out reference work. The Academic sub-committee also gives teaching methods with chalk and talk, Power Point presentations. The students prepare project-work, related to topics in their syllabi. The teachers supervise the projects by extensive brain-storming and discussion sessions.
- The teaching body of RMC is supported by relevant ICT. The college provides robust infrastructure including a well-stocked library, IT lab, well-equipped laboratory.
- Our teachers regularly update their disciplinary knowledge through involvement in faculty development programmes, curriculum reviews, evaluation, and participation in different decision-making bodies of the University.
- Experiential learning through internships, projects work and field trips is specifically facilitated. RMC offers a range of dedicated add-on certificate courses in Data Analysis and Artificial Intelligence, Camera and Photograph.
- Feedback is compiled in online and offline modes. The forms available on website, the data is compiled,

analysed and shared with each Department for proper action and remedy. The IQAC conducts annual internal audits and all Departments are encouraged to undertake self-assessment.

- All the different aspects of the college are treated with utmost care and steps are taken to best utilise the available infrastructure and resources to overcome any constraints.

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Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

- The academic system of Rammohan College is structured on appropriate teaching, intricate learning and measured evaluation processes—which has marked this age-old College as an Institution.
- The entry process in the college both in Undergraduate section and in the two Postgraduate Departments, Bengali and Physiology, is absolutely transparent and abides by the Calcutta University norms. The college website <http://college.ac.in> is regularly updated showing all the notifications displaying each subject's Curricula and Programme outcomes. In the admission process, the reservation norms are strictly followed. The students are provided with different Govt sanctioned scholarships along with the internal support grants.
- Each Department at present has proportionate number of experienced seniors and dynamic younger teachers to fulfil the requirements of the students in the best possible way.
- The College provides a central time table, based on which each department maintains a well-structured class routine. Every Department segregate advanced and slow learners of the class and modifies their teaching methodologies accordingly.
- The development of the students are preliminarily done on the basis of academic performances. They are assisted towards the e-resources available internally and are encouraged for advanced computer learning and exposure to different software as far as practicable.
- The Research laboratories of the Department of Physiology & the Department of Zoology consisting of a group of promising Research Scholars working under various project grants, inspire the students towards a greater academic opportunity.
- All the efforts result in substantial achievement score of students at national and international examinations and placements.
- The students are encouraged to participate in different intra and inter-college activities starting from scientific affairs to sports not only to increase their level of confidence but also to acquire greater perspective of the subject and widening the horizon of knowledge.

However, Students' feedback is granted as the most important criterion for the future progress and development of any academic institution and we also always try to follow that track and record with timely rectification, as far as possible, through individual subcommittee and administrative pathways to land up in a more potent, stronger and advanced future.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The IQAC and Research Advisory Board (Former Research Committee) of Rammohan College becomes an inseparable unit for last several years. The institution provides support whether administrative or academic in encouraging faculty members to participate in active research. Resources from UGC, BOOST and RUSA are utilized fully in this regard. One **central instrumentation facility** (with various sophisticated instruments of multidisciplinary use) along with **animal house facility** (the only one at any college in Kolkata) and **Institutional Animal Ethics Committee (approved by CPCSEA, Govt. of India)** have been developed for this purpose. Several students have been awarded the Doctoral degree after successful completion of their research under the proper supervision of our faculty members of different Departments.
- Books and/or book chapters and text books are published in various national and international publications by the faculty along with more than 60 original research articles in peer reviewed international journals. Multi disciplinary research articles have also been published jointly by the under graduate students and teachers of different Departments. Moreover several studies on college facilities, infrastructure and their impacts on incumbent have been published as model study.
- In an innovative approach, the college has established a modern **weather station**, a **SPM monitor** and initiated the project of **rain water harvesting**. This is also the only example in any college at Kolkata. Opportunities are created to support holistic development of students through community outreach programmes organised by NSS and NCC. There is active participation of students in these programmes that mainly contribute to environmental sustainability, awareness regarding health, habits and unscientific taboos, gender inequality, and human values.
- The academic and research expertise of Rammohan College contributes to creating an ecosystem for the sharing of knowledge through collaborations and innovations through motivation and by giving infrastructural support. The college has entered into MoU aiming faculty/student exchange and research collaborations with more than 20 colleges/institutions for sharing of knowledge, library, and research.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Rammohan College believes that “Infrastructure is the backbone of a college”. The vision of Infrastructure development is to create, a “360° ambiance for all stakeholders”. The missions of Infrastructure development are:

- Administrative & Academic Facility and Academic Environment
- Security and Safety
- Extracurricular Activity and mental health of students, teachers and staffs
- Skill Enhancement of Students
- Research and Development for Society

- Ecosystem services for society

Rammohan College has developed the following strategies for the development of infrastructure:

- Systematic feedback analysis by IQAC
- Determination of strategy for infrastructural development by the IQAC
- Recommendation of the proposals by the IQAC to the Finance Committee and Governing Body for approval.
- Implementation of the approved proposals by the college authority through the proper mechanism and official procedure (as per prevailing rules and regulations). Rammohan College has invested approximately 41% of the entire 5-year BUDGET in the development of INFRASTRUCTURE. Based on the “Recommendations” of NAAC 2nd Cycle, Rammohan College has invested in the systematic development of physical infrastructure, using the College Fund and funds from RUSA 2.0. Two New Floors have been constructed from the RUSA 2.0 fund. The entire electrical work, furniture, and flooring have been done by a college fund. Renovation of Rainwater Harvest, Animal House, CIL, differently abled toilet, barrier-free path, etc. has been sponsored by the college fund. All sophisticated instruments are procured from BOOST Grant, RUSA 2.0, and College fund, for skill development of students. The entire IT Facilities have been created, as well as existing facilities upgraded from College Fund. All recurring costs of maintenance have been borne by the College Fund. The Rammohan College Library is an essential resource center and fully UPGRADED and maintained by the College Fund. The library has an extensive collection of scholarly materials (28000+ books). Access to e-journals and e-books [through N-LIST] enhances the availability and accessibility of scholarly materials, ensuring students and faculty have access to the latest research and information. Apart from N-LIST, a huge number of Open Educational Resources (OER) are available on the Institute's webpage, which further assists and guarantees the patrons to access the updated scholarly content.

Student Support and Progression

- Our students are the most important stakeholders of Rammohan College. Many of the students come from middle and lower-middle-class families who need effective support like academic, financial, and many more from the college. Even during the pandemic period, the college authority decided to exempt most of the fees and it amounted to about Rs. 19 lakhs during 2020-21 and about Rs. 27 lakhs during 2021-22. Each year an effective number of students are provided with concessions from the college.
- Fresh students are made aware of the Govt. scholarships they can avail of, like Kanyashree Prakalpa which is meant for all female students. Academically good students are provided with a National scholarship, Swami Vivekananda Merit – cum – Means Scholarship. For all categories of minority students, the ‘Aikyashree’ Scholarship is provided by the state Govt. Rammohan College also refers SC, ST & OBC students for the ‘OASIS’ Scholarship provided by the Govt.
- Rammohan College also provides career concealing for the existing students and helps them with the entry-in-services training regularly.
- There are Internal Complaint Cell, Anti Grievance and Redressal Cell, Anti–Ragging Cell, Zero

Tolerance Policy Implementation committee, and Psychological Counseling Cell to help the students regularly. Psychological Counselling is done regularly as they belong to a very sensitive age group. Fresh students are sensitized to Gender Discrimination. Even the college undergoes Gender Audits both internally and externally regularly.

- Apart from the academic activities, the students are also encouraged to participate in co-curricular extension activities like Sports, NCC, NSS, and Yoga classes and they are allowed to use a modern Gym free of cost. They are also encouraged to take part in different cultural activities both intra and inter-institutions. There is effective participation of the students, both fresh and senior, in different decision-making processes of the college.
- Rammoahan College is proud to have a Registered Alumni Association for the pass-out students who are very much active in the welfare of the college. They meet regularly to participate in different programs organized by the College. Rammohan College always stands for its valuable students.

- Rammohan College, as an independent institution has been catering to Women's education, emancipation and empowerment since 1961. The various practices of the College are multifaceted and socially responsible.
- The annual Gender Audit ensures a safe and secure environment for all women – student and staff. Various Gender Equity programmes are conducted for the benefit of students and staff.
- In terms of Environmental Consciousness and alternative energy initiatives, a Solar Energy Harvesting set-up has been installed in the New Science Building of the college. All degradable and non-degradable wastes are disposed of with the help of the Kolkata Municipal Corporation. E-waste is handed over to the registered companies for recycling. Quality audits on energy and environment are regularly undertaken by the institution.
- As an eco-friendly campus, there is a ban on the use of plastic and the entry of automobiles. The institution provides a disabled-friendly, barrier-free environment with ramps, lifts for easy access to classrooms.
- The Institution celebrates and organizes national and international commemorative days, events and festivals. Institutional preparedness for NEP

<p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>While the NEP 2020 is a progressive step towards a decidedly scientific, need-specific, practical-oriented and holistic educational system, it requires substantial changes and intelligently devised upgrades in the already existing method of teaching-learning in our institution. Rammohan College is preparing itself with strong measures for a smooth implementation of this curriculum from the academic year 2023-2024. The plan of the college is to enable students from the streams of Commerce, Science and Humanities to take up at least one subject from a different stream other than their Major. The aim is to bring in a holistic and multidisciplinary education system into practice that will help to develop an integrated</p>
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	<p>personality of our students. This will also nurture academic, intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional and ethical abilities of students. The institution is geared towards offering a multidisciplinary form of education by allowing students to take up one major area of study along with two minors which can be chosen from a wide variety across 17 subjects. Students of Philosophy as a Major, for example, can now study the STEM subject of Botany or Zoology—an arrangement, that was earlier not possible. Several departments in our institution practice interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary teaching, for instance, the departments of English, Bengali and Education conducted a certificate course on ‘News Reading and Anchoring’, in collaboration with the organisation, Bratati Parampara. The college offers not only credit-based courses but also community engagement programmes through the NSS activities and NCC (which has received approval to start this semester) participation. Students can avail themselves of exit options at the end of 1st, 2nd or 3rd years with full access to all these activities. The Career Counseling Cell of the college organizes programmes to provide the students career opportunities and proper guidance to build up their abilities for the tough job market. The college has academic collaboration with other institutions through MOU and exchange programmes that will promote the multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach.</p>
<p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>Academic Bank of Credits (ABC): The college is guided by the affiliating university to fulfill the requirement of Academic Bank of Credits. Multiple entries and exits can be done by ABC. The college plans to register with the Government’s ABC system so that students’ credits can be placed in this digital storehouse and this will facilitate the entry and exit of students at every stage, without loss of academic learning time. The college intends to use traditional and online channels to promote Academic Bank of Credit for the benefit of students from other colleges and ours. Implementation of the ABC at the degree level will be possible only through intensive collaboration between institutions and regulatory organizations. It is a prospective idea to introduce the ABC that will allow students to transfer credits across universities and receive credits for non-</p>

	<p>traditional courses. The college has collaborated and signed MOUs with various academic and research institutes to offer a variety of certificate programmes. The University of Calcutta has issued its circular number C/42/Circular on 15 February, 2024, entitled 'Introduction of ABC Scheme for the students registering for undergraduate course from the session 2024-25' directing colleges to mandatorily register their students in accordance with this. Rammohan College will initiate all necessary steps in this regard. We believe that the fundamental goals of the NEP to facilitate an uninterrupted learning process for interested students will be met through the implementation of ABC.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>Skill Development: The college takes convergence efforts to build skill sets for students so that they answer the needs of the industries alongside their academic studies. The institution along with IQAC has already taken multiple initiatives for employability and skill development of students. Skill development courses include opportunities for entrepreneurship, internships and experiential learning through certificate/add-on/ value- added courses, field works etc. The college organizes career workshops, practice interviews and offers networking opportunities along with seminars, training camps and workshops for developing professionalism and skill. Add-on courses have been held on Accounting and on Anchoring and Media Presentation. Such courses may be integrated into mainstream education by making them part of our internal evaluation system. The institution promotes a sense of pride in our heritage by observing the anniversary of thinkers like Rammohan Roy, Swami Vivekananda, Rabindranath Tagore and arranges cultural and artistic programmes through the medium of Bengali, English and Hindi languages. The college observes important occasions like the National Science Day on 28 February, International Women's Day on 8 March, Librarians' Day on the birth anniversary of S.R. Ranganathan on 12 August, Hindi Diwas in September and Shakespeare Day in April. It organizes social outreach initiatives through NSS activities. Soft skills in communication are imparted through workshops held collaboratively, as done with Gurudas College and Victoria Institution (College). The college plans to invite industry veterans from</p>

	<p>different sectors to upgrade the vocational skills of students according to their aptitude. Willing students maybe offered credits within the University guidelines. Hub and spoke model of sharing infrastructure for vocational training with neighbouring institutions may also be explored. Environmental awareness is to be spread through green campus schemes and strict enforcement of No Plastic Zone.</p>
<p>4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>Appropriate Integration of Indian Knowledge System (teaching in Indian Language, Culture, using online course): All courses except English are taught simultaneously in English and the local language, Bengali. Material is shared in an online mode so that students can make the maximum use of the subject taught in class. Excursions and educational tours are undertaken to places of importance to link their learning with the resources of the region. Degree courses are taught in Indian languages like Bengali, Hindi and Sanskrit, as also Urdu in a neighbouring institution (following the guidelines of the University of Calcutta). Other courses are taught bilingually. A good practice of the college is that teachers cover the entire syllabus bilingually at the same time so that no student is left out. The values of Rammohan Roy regarding the rights and status of women are inculcated in the students during Orientation by the Principal and by Professors and invited guest speakers on other occasions. Sanskrit and Philosophy transmit the values of the Vedas, Upanishads, Bhagavat Gita and other philosophical literatures which serve as the foundation of the Indian Knowledge System (IKS). The college has adopted a holistic approach in bringing together various aspects of human life, across physical, mental, emotional and spiritual components. The Honours courses in Political Science, History and Geography impart the knowledge of diversity through philosophical viewpoints and principles of various schools of thought. The departments of Economics, Geography and Political Science encourage the intellectual development of students in the spirit of IKS, allowing students to understand the diverse economic and geo-political scenario. The subjects like Botany, Zoology, Physiology, Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics focus on advancement of science and technology. The archives developed out of RUSA fund reflect the</p>

	inclination of the college towards adaptation of the values of IKS.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	<p>Focus on Outcome Based Education (OBE): Outcome based education is of utmost importance with reference to the modern education system. OBE naturally shifts the attention from a teacher-centered education to a learner-centered one, primarily focusing on what is to be learned and its outcome. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and National Education Policy 2020 (NEP) focuses on the learners' interests, abilities and skill development making learning process interactive and innovative. The college has always followed an interactive teaching-learning method for education to have maximum outcome. As evident from the PO, CO, PSO available on the college website for each department, we believe in Outcome Based Education and design the teaching in a time-bound manner to achieve the goals. Initiatives include maintaining the academic calendar of the departments and lesson plans of individual teachers. Each student is assigned a mentor to guide them in all spheres, academic and non-academic, and to make them aware of existing opportunities and facilities in the institution so that they grow into well-rounded individuals capable of contributing to society, nation-building and environment. Another good practice is that every department is assigned two mentors (peers from other departments) to monitor the progress outcomes and oversee academic audit. The college organises ICT based teaching, extension-lectures, seminars, workshops as well as field trips, excursions, group discussions, quiz, oral and poster presentation by students that exhibit outcome-based education. This allows students to think freely, critically and with reasoning. This allows better assessment of students. The OBE also emphasises on feedback of both students and teachers on curriculum delivery and methods of teaching. Necessary action is taken to modify and upgrade the system wherever possible. This includes redesigning lesson plans, teaching methods etc. for a fruitful and effective Outcome Based Education in the institution.</p>
6. Distance education/online education:	<p>Distance Education/ Online Education: During the pandemic online education was largely promoted by the college. Departments have developed their technological tools according to requirements for a</p>

smooth flow of knowledge to students. Google forms are widely used for collection of data and setting of tests. Blended mode of teaching and evaluation is undertaken with webinars, online classes and matter upload. The goal is always to keep the channel of communication open between teacher and learner. Students have a choice of synchronous virtual classrooms and other online lectures through the college. The college provides an effective in-person and online learning system. The college has created virtual learning environment through Google Classroom and Zoom that replicates the in-person classroom experience allowing students to communicate with one another and their professors in real-time through group discussions and student seminar presentations in the virtual mode.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Rammohan College is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and follows the curriculum as mentioned in the guidelines, as designed by the University. However, the College takes several steps like:

- The Academic sub-committee conducts meetings regularly for enrichment of teaching methods and evaluation system of students through internal, theoretical and practical examinations. The Academic sub-committee also conducts meeting to modify the master routine of college for additional classes for the benefit of the students. The task of preparation of routine (Hons and Gen : BA, BSc, BCom, PG - Bengali and Human Physiology, the syllabi of different subjects (as followed by the University guidelines) are distributed to the different departments and circulated among the students of respective semesters. Seminars and invited lectures are arranged to further increase the interest of the students in various facets of their selected subjects. The library (both central and seminar) is regularly upgraded for the benefit of the students so that they have access to books, journals and magazines. Students use the library for borrowing books and carrying out reference work. The library sub-committee conducts meetings regularly for addition of new books for the benefit of the students. Fresh proposals for purchasing new books with latest editions are prepared and submitted to IQAC for approval. Continuous evaluation of students is carried out through class-tests and tutorials in order to enrich the learning experience of the students. The answer scripts are corrected and shared with them and their errors pointed out with suggestions for improvement.
- Year wise academic calendar is prepared by the Academic subcommittee stating the different events such as Admission, Examination i.e. class test, internal examination, University theoretical, Tutorial and practical examination, different national holidays and red-letter days.
- The Academic sub-committee also gives emphasis about the arrangement of teaching methods with chalk and talk, Power Point presentations etc. The students also prepare project- work, related to topics given in their syllabi. The teachers supervise the project by extensive brainstorming and discussion sessions.
- Excursions or field work or academic tours are undertaken so as to widen the knowledge base of the students. These excursions and visits to important places are not restricted to departments which have them in their syllabus, but also other departments. The college considers such tours an integral part of the students' education, which can bring alive their learning from the written text.
- Parent-teacher meetings are organized by the respective departments of the college, so that pertinent issues relating to the academic performance and overall development of the students can be communicated to their parents/guardians. Queries of the parents/guardians of the students are also addressed by the teachers of the department. Issues relating to regularity of attendance and

preparation for tests are thoroughly discussed.

The IQAC evaluates the steps taken and makes arrangements for improvement. All the different aspects of the college life of the students are treated with utmost care and steps are taken to best utilise the available infrastructure and resources to overcome any constraints.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

- Peace, human ethics, awareness about the social responsibility topics are covered within the curriculum of the subject Education.
- Different types of environmental issues such as wildlife management, conservation of biodiversity (flora and fauna), and environmental pollutions are included within the curriculum of the subjects of Zoology and Botany.
- Fundamental values have to be inculcated to make our students to be responsible citizens. it Covers an all-encompassing domain. To begin with, basic philosophy of Supreme Law of our land, i.e., Indian Constitution has to be taught. Secondly, a clear concept of citizenship must be there. Students must be aware of their effective role in the political process. They must be convinced of the importance of political participation. As a citizen, a clear perception has to be there in regard to Fundamental Rights and Fundamental Duties. It is necessary to have a basic understanding of global politics and various social movements with special emphasis on Human Rights Movements.
- Knowledge about physical and human elements of environment including climate change and vulnerability, disaster hazard, and disaster management, human development, social values, tribal groups, gender related development issues and political geography are covered within the curriculum of the subject - geography. The discipline also includes hydrology, forest and wild life management, biodiversity, soil geography and population Geography.
- The curriculum of Bengali (Honours and General) course covers Human Ethics and Values, Awareness about the social responsibility, Environmental issues, Philosophical Thought.
- The Curriculum of Economics covers the topics Issues of Sustainable Development and related

Environmental issues, Idea of inequality in the process of development of the society and related human values / gender inequality, Idea of distribution of National output leading to social equity.

- The multidisciplinary nature of environmental studies makes it possible to give an idea to students about the natural ecosystems as well as the importance of renewable and non-renewable resources. Students learn the concept of preserving water bodies, conservation of bio-diversity, and the pressing problem of air, water, soil and noise pollution. The subject of Environmental Studies addresses issues of climate danger and the role of the human community in not only becoming aware of them but also to take active measures to combat these perils.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

All the Departments essentially follow chalk & talk method of teaching along with the Overhead and Laptop projector for effective communication. In addition all the faculties adopted on-line & off-line method of teaching during the pandemic and post-pandemic period. This blended mode continues to be followed to cater to the needs of the students. Practical & Lab - based Courses provide hands-on training for their academic enrichment. Students of the Commerce Programme are trained in IT in the computer lab. Educational excursions and field study trips are conducted by almost all the departments, particularly department of Botany, Physiology, Zoology and Geography on a compulsory basis. During excursion and field trip students collect data of plant and animal diversity, plant association, soil type, rock type, human epidemiological study, climatic and environmental effects on different physiological parameters etc. Students of Botany collect plant specimens as voucher and prepare herbarium sheets as a reference to the plant diversity of the study locality and survey data of different physiological important sectors including nutritive status of the local people are collected and compared for the betterment of the society.

Students analyze the plant community structure by the quadrat method. Study of Plant Community Structure- include

1. Determination of the **minimal size of the quadrat**.

2. Determination of **frequency** of the components of the community. It is calculated by the formula:

$$\text{Frequency (\%)} = x \times 100$$

3. Determination of **density** of the components of the community. It is expressed in relation to a definite unit space.

4. Determination of **abundance** of the components of the community.

Students of the department of Zoology carry out different types of field-oriented studies, such as wild life management, conservation of biodiversity, study of habit and habitat of different group of organisms. In addition, study in relation to different behaviour, morphology of animals in zoological garden. Students of the department of Geography collect soil samples from separate places and after returning analyze the soil samples in the laboratory to record pH, constitution, texture etc. Students compare the soil samples collected from fertile and non-arable lands. The collected rock samples are identified and stored in the department of Geography. Leaves of the plants of the study area are collected and later identified to prepare an inventory of the plants of the study area. Students of the department of Physiology carry out Nutritional as well as epidemiological survey works, anthropometric and other parametric studies in different parts of India as required, under the choice-based credit system (CBCS) and New Education Policy, Students of Social Sciences like History and Political Science have to visit Museums and archives as part of their skill enhancement course.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Rammohan College is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and is guided by the regulations set by the University regarding all the assessment, evaluations and examinations.

To build up a graded academic development among students, a well-structured internal evaluating system works in the college. Basically this is a monitored transparent procedure consisting of different types of assay systems for different streams and different levels of students, slow and advanced learners.

Internal assessment methods include class tests, tutorial tests, MCQ tests, viva voce, project preparations, seminar presentations, group discussions and other innovative testing or methodologies implemented according to the class, subject and advancement of the students.

With the introduction of CBCS system in 2018 of 6 semesters undergraduate course, in each subject 20% marks are awarded through internal evaluation, 15% through project and rest 65% by the external examiners in the University conducted end semester examinations. In Practical based subjects 'the distribution of marks includes 20% for internal, 30% for practical and 50% for external evaluation. In the Postgraduate course of four semesters, one or two full papers of practical and project of 50 marks are there in each semester, along with theoretical papers where also 20% marks are allocated from internal assessment.

However all the internal assessment processes are absolutely transparent and maintain consistency with the Calcutta University set evaluation standard. Even during Pandemic the system worked as per the University guidance.

All types of internal marks of each student are kept in the Department record book to find out the

development of the student. Evaluated copies are shown to the students for their understanding and any confusion is taken care of in the best possible way.

Students' attendance is recorded for each class in the attendance register and calculated on a regular timeframe to keep them aware of the low percentages. Parent teachers meetings are called by each Department to make the parents /guardians aware of their wards' performances.

However, Rammohan College always considers any non-attendance of classes or internal examination by any student on proper medical grounds or for participating in any college or personal level extracurricular activities in a positive mode.

All the internal performance records are sent to the central Examination Committee as and when required. This Examination Committee not only centrally monitors internal assessments and conducts University Examinations but also ensures all the redressal of any examination related grievances, for internal or external evaluations. Any kind of University level end semester examination related grievances on the part of a student is forwarded through the College authority to the University for review, scrutiny, or other university redressal of grievance, for re-evaluation, permitted as per university law, against a fees paid to the University for the process.

The dissatisfied students also are provided with the photocopy of his/her evaluated answer sheet by the university, against Right to Information and takes adequate steps for redressal.

Outcomes are usually expressed in terms of knowledge, skills or attitudes. It is a measurable, observable and specific statement that clearly indicates what a student should know and be able to achieve as a consequence. Outcomes describe what students are able to demonstrate and accomplish upon completion of a course/a span of several courses. Clear articulation of course outcomes, POs and PSOs serve as the foundation for evaluating the effectiveness of the teaching-learning process.

Humanities stream, the language-based courses like English, Bengali, Hindi, Sanskrit aim to develop the students' reading, writing, comprehension and communication skills. Courses like Education, History, Political Science, Philosophy, Economics imbibe moral and humane values in the learners. All the above courses develop a critical aptitude in the students - they become aware of the political, economic, historical and cultural background and philosophical tradition of their country and of countries abroad. Apart from Higher studies in they are absorbed as teachers, in administrative services, translation work, editorial job, media journalism and computer work.

Courses like Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics enable students in identifying physical laws and principles to problems, developing conceptual understanding of basic science. All these are essential in understanding the role of technology in society and implementing policy issues. In the future all of them can have versatile job opportunities starting from Research Institutes, Technological sectors, Banks, Industry, insurance and investment sectors, and their logical and innovative thinking, programming capability help them in achieving their objective.

The courses like Geography, Botany, Physiology and Zoology create in the students a deep understanding of man-nature interaction. Geography has a vast sector of studying parameters of nature and high scale of job opportunity, whereas Botany and Zoology work on important sector of nature and biodiversity study.

Physiology helps to understand the human system and its cellular organization. Practical exposure to basic Physiological parameters' measurement, Nutritional Survey work, Haematological techniques gear up the students for career opportunities.

All the Biological sectors have wide open opportunities for students starting from higher academic research to industrial and technological developments.

The faculties are encouraged to apply for Government (UGC, ICSSR, DST) and non- Government projects, grants, fellowships, for research seed money and related works.

IPR: The institution's IPR policy has been drafted by Institutional Innovative Council (IIC) and approved by the GB. Members of GB suggested Institution to organize IPR seminars to generate awareness.

Incubation Centre: It is functional through IIC to provide a platform of discussions among incumbents of institute. Now we are going to strive for provision of industry interaction and access to support incubators with skills for commercialization of their products.

Relaxation and Study leaves for completion of Doctoral degree or Research projects: Faculties are encouraged to apply for various fellowships and sponsorships to complete their research (PhD).

Publications: Institution encourages publishing research works in UGC Care listed journals and indexed academic journals with ISSN as well as in books with ISBN.

College also conducts survey based analysis on academic/administrative infrastructure and published in the journals (https://www.rammohancollege.ac.in/index.php/index.php?option=com_content&view=article&id=451&Itemid=0). Post Graduate Section. Bengali Department published 'Prabaho' that contained the topics related to curriculum of the same.

Students are encouraged to publish their field works and dissertations in internationally recognized journals. Wall magazines and college magazine are enriched with students' writings.

Rammohan College is having four different campuses of 1.768 Acre in total, the heritage “**Old Building**” (G+4) is of 0.333 Acre, the “**New Science Building (G+4) & Museum**” is of 0.7613 Acre, **Sadhana Sarkar Memorial Hostel** is of 0.171 Acre and a land for future development is of 0.5024 Acre.

The built up area of “**Old Building**” is 7364 M2, “**New Science Building**” is 2514.65 M2, Museum is of 1246.78 M2 and Hostel is of 1481.92 M2. Two floors have been newly constructed with the help of RUSA Fund 2.0. The College provides a number of physical facilities for an effective ambience in curricular, co-curricular and administrative activities.

The College ensures basic facilities like clean drinking water, adequate number of toilet, uninterrupted electricity supply, sufficient light & fan (Air Conditioning System, where required) and well furnished class rooms with **ergonomically designed** sitting arrangement.

All science departments have adequate equipments, own computer laboratory and Research facilities. A **State of Art** “**Central Instrument Facility**” and an “**Animal House**” serve our students to conduct their “**Summer Training**” and “**Research**”.

All Arts departments are equipped with **Laptops** and a “**Linguistic Laboratory**” has been established.

The learning hub of the Institute's academic activity is the Central Library of Rammohan College, Kolkata. It occupies 1200 square feet on the first floor of the main Building. The sitting capacity of the reading room of the library is for 30 readers. Local Area Network (LAN) connection exists in the library. The Central Library of Rammohan College is well-stocked with books on all subjects as well as periodicals and publications with both general and specialised interest. The library is equally beneficial to teachers and students. The library currently contains an enormous collection of books, reference books, magazines, newspapers, and other materials to offer its patrons a wide range of information. The college library also considering to build up a special collection on "**Raja Rammohan Roy**" and "**Women Studies**" to enhance the students' knowledge on these particular topics. Additionally, the college library has a wide range of *coins of different countries, antique stamps etc.* The primary goal of the college library is to provide information to the teaching and non-teaching personnel, research scholars, students, and professors.

The various departments also maintain seminar libraries in addition to the central library. The departmental libraries were established to give students convenient access to books. A small number of reference books and mostly text materials make up the departmental libraries. With permission from the relevant Department HODs, students are able to check out books from the Departmental Library.

In 2016, college installed **KOHA [3.16.08], an open source integrated library management software** customized by Bengal Library Association [BLA] which was recently replaced by the latest stable version 21.05.12 that was released on March 10, 2022. This web enabled Integrated library software have SQL database and it follows MARC cataloguing format. KOHA's catching feature continues to amplify and expand to meet the needs of its sponsoring libraries. Also, RFID Technology has been implemented in Rammohan College Library by Stallion OneByte Private Limited with Anti-theft gate Reader [Qty-1] and Staff station Reader [Qty-2]. The entire library premise is under CCTV surveillance as library provides open access. Computers in the library area, CCTV system and other machines in the library are maintained by centralized agencies.

An E-learning space is established separately within the library for the student as well as staff for accessing of web resources.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The organogram of Rammohan College reflects the democratic character of governance. The organizational structure of the college consists of the Governing Body, the Principal, the Teaching

Staff, the Non-Teaching Staff and the students.

The Governing Body of the college under the leadership of the President discusses issues relating to finance, infrastructure, faculty recruitment and the matters related to the overall development of college.

The Principal, as the chief administrator of the college, supervises and manages the overall functioning of the college. The Principal is also the ex-officio chairperson of the Teachers' Council. The Principal is assisted by the Departmental-in-Charges, the IQAC, the Teachers' Council and the Non-Teaching Staff which comprises of the Head Clerk, Accountant and Office Assistants. The HOI monitors the campus through close circuit cameras and thus e-surveillance is active.

The Teachers' Council plays an active role in effective planning and implementation of academic activities like teaching-learning, academic administration, curricular and extra-curricular activities. The Departmental-in-Charges work in collaboration with the Principal and their respective departments in accomplishing the academic, financial and co-curricular requirements of the departments.

The IQAC works towards realization of the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance. The IQAC plays an important role for monitoring the internal quality of the institution. The IQAC conducts internal academic and administrative audit of departments and physical verification of laboratories to monitor and ensure quality in the college. Various skill-based and quality events are also conducted by the college under the aegis of IQAC.

The Bursar is appointed by the Governing Body on the recommendation of the Principal. The Bursar manages matters related to internal finances and financial audit of the college. The Bursar also ensures effective utilization of funds available for developmental purposes. Financial decisions are taken by the Bursar and the Principal in consultation with GB.

The Library is headed by two librarians who supervise the library assistants and attendants in maintaining the upkeep of the library. The Librarians also work with the Library Committee to upgrade academic resources and facilities in the library.

Rammohan College is government aided college. In last five years the college was having the following fund flow and followed the appropriate fund management policies:

Salary and College Fund:

1. Salary for full time teaching and non-teaching staff come from Government and has been managed through HRMS portal. College submit claims of salary, increment and arrear, within due time. After receiving sanction memo of the same, college disburse the amount through HRMS portal.

2. The main source of College development is “Fee collected from students”. College review fee, every year, **provide considerable amount of fee concession for Economically Backward (Free for BPL)**. The collection is completely maintained by E-Governance system through College portal linked with Nationalized Bank.

3. Finance Committee is formed by Governing Body and the execution is done by Purchase Committee following “Government of West Bengal Financial Rule and Purchase Policy” [No. 5400-F(Y), Dated: 25.06.2012].

4. The college is having some “Fixed Deposit”, used for development “as and when required”.

5. So far, all statutory audits are complete and reports submitted to Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal by Auditor. Regular internal Audit has been done by Auditor Firm of repute.

Hostel Management

1. Hostel is run by Hostel Managing Committee which manage all costs out of fees collected from the boarders.
2. Regular Audit has been done by “Audit Firm of repute”.

RUSA

1. From RUSA 2.0, Rupees 2 crore has been sanctioned to College. Initially College received 1.5 Crore rupees for college development
2. Audit has been done by Auditor of repute.
3. UC submitted to competent authority, and rest amount has been claimed, yet to be disbursed.

DST-BOOST

1. Rammohan College received Rs.25 lakh from Government of West Bengal for development of laboratories. A “BOOST COMMITTEE” has been formed and the amount has been executed successfully.
2. The expenditure has been audited and U/C submitted to “DST & Biotechnology”, Government of WB.

Fund from Private Body

1. College received Rs. 1,00,000/- from Radha Madhab Trust for installation of Cooler and drinking water system.

Gender audit of educational institutions is a process for organizational assessment and a tool of action planning from a gender perspective. It examines the capacity and willingness of the institution to ensure a 'safe and secure' environment for women and girl students, faculty and administrative staff. The participatory audit process helps to identify institutional strengths and challenges to integrating gender, as well as gender equity in the institution's systems and operations and in programmes and activities. Moreover, gender audit encourages a dialogue between all stake holders in an educational institution from a positive, gender oriented angle.

Rammohan College, Kolkata provides equal educational and co-curricular opportunities to girl students, regardless of their socio-economic status and religio-cultural roots. Moreover, the College conducts a series of programmes towards gender equity and sensitization each year and provides a number of facilities for the girl student.

Gender sensitization programmes – Curricular and Co-curricular

1. Gender sensitive topics are included in the curricula of the Departments of Education, Political Science and Philosophy and form an integral part of their respective courses of study. This helps in the gender sensitization of the students.
2. The NSS (National Service Scheme) conducts a series of programmes each year to inculcate discipline, collective activity, gender sensitization and awareness among students as responsible citizens. The NSS Special Camp every year encourages students to reach outside the campus and conduct sensitization and awareness campaigns in local slums.
3. RTI Cell, Women's Cell and Internal Complaints Committee, Grievance Redressal and Anti-Ragging Cell and NSS work together on gender equity and sensitization programmes to sustain a harmonious, fear-free ambience in College.
4. The NCC (National Cadet Corps) has been reintroduced in 2023 under the aegis of the 2nd Bengal Battalion to inculcate a sense of 'Unity and Discipline' among students.
5. Psychological Counselling Programmes and the Psychological Counselling Cell help in ensuring the mental well-being of the students, teaching and non-teaching staff of the College.
6. Observing the following Special days every year help students to internalize the themes and

ideologies of luminaries who have contributed significantly to female education.

7.2.1

Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

Response

1. Title of the Practice – Spread of Cultural Heritage – Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum [A continuous process that started in 2009-2010]
2. Objectives of the Practice: Raja Rammohan Roy (1772-1883), the great scholar, reformer and a leading figure in the 19th century Bengal Renaissance attempted to inspire and modernize contemporary Indian society through social and educational reforms, particularly directed to the emancipation and empowerment of women. His adoption of the basic tenets of Sanatan Dharma gave rise to the Brahmo religion and Brahmo educationists played a significant role in educating and reforming society.
3. The context: The Museum was inaugurated on 22nd May 2009. The Govt of West Bengal and the Ministry of Culture, Govt of India have rendered financial assistance for the promotion and development of the museum. The Museum has also received financial assistance from the M. P. Lad fund.
4. The practice: Rammohan College acquired, renovated and restored the family residence of Raja Rammohan Roy at 85A, Raja Rammohan Roy Sarani, Kolkata 700009 for the purpose of converting the building into the Raja Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum. The Kolkata Municipal Corporation declared it as a heritage building.
5. Evidence of success: The Museum is dedicated to the social reformer Raja Rammohan Roy. There are six segments in the Museum – commemorative items, books, paintings and sketches, period furniture, panels and dioramas and death mask of Rammohan. Folder, picture post card, DVD, CD produced and published by the Museum are on sale from the Museum Sales Counter. The West Bengal Tourism Department has included the Museum in their City Tour. The Museum is regularly visited by the students of Rammohan College as well as by students of other colleges. The Choice Based Education System (introduced by the University of Calcutta) and the New Education Policy has made Skill Enhanced Courses mandatory. The Social Science departments have to study about Museums and Archives exhaustively along with compulsory visits to these places. So Rammohan Roy Memorial Museum is visited almost regularly by College students in order to understand the construction and functioning of a Museum and the importance of Heritage Studies. MOUs with Victoria College, Vidyasagar College for Women, Baghbazar Women’s College, Bangabashi College, Umesh Chandra College and City College help to spread the need to visit the Museum and to study the life and deeds of the Raja, the first ‘Modern Man of India’.
6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required– Financial Assistance is needed for expansion works including the setting up of galleries. Staff shortage is required to be settled. To protect the exhibits the Museum requires a centrally air-conditioned set-up. Efforts must be made to introduce internships in

Museology, Curatorship, Preservation Studies and Public Programming. This would be remunerative for the museum and would also generate employment for the students. The concept of “learning to earning” has been exemplified by Ms Jhimli Saha, ex-student of Rammohan College and presently guided lecturer of the Museum. Regular audio-visual programmes must be arranged to build up public awareness about the need for Museums in society.

1. Title of the Practice: Medicinal Plant Garden

2. Objectives of the Practice: The Medicinal Plant Garden displays more than 80 medicinal plants of our country with their vernacular name, scientific name, parts used and major medicinal uses. The major objective is to expose the students to the medicinal plant wealth of our country, which is one of megadiversity centre of the world.

3. The context: Medicinal plants are mentioned in Rigveda, the oldest document (it was composed about 3500 years ago). The plants have been the chief source of drugs used in treatment of various ailments. India is a repository of innumerable medicinal plants of immense values.

4. The Practice: More than 80 Medicinal herbs and shrubs are grown in the Garden. Some of the important medicinal plants of the Medicinal Plant Garden are listed in the following table:

Periodically we arrange awareness programmes to motivate the students of different streams regarding the medicinal importance of plants, how to grow and propagate them, and how one can easily identify them.

5. Evidence of Success: The display of Medicinal plants encouraging the students to develop the skill of precious identification of medicinally important plants. Our students have developed the skill. Most of

the students grow a few medicinal plants in their kitchen garden or on the terrace.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The major problem is the non-availability of trained gardener. Lack of financial resources constitute a major constraint.

Response

Rammohan College is a women's college and naturally its vision is all-round development and upliftment of its students. The College aims to uphold the principles enshrined in the teachings of Raja Rammohan Roy, the first modernizer in the socio-cultural history of India. The College, therefore, prioritizes the empowerment of women by providing not only education to its students but also provides a wide range of extra-curricular activities that helps to lead to the intellectual, physical and mental well-being of the students. Apart from the educational courses offered, there are also various other programmes and events concerning sports, including gymnasium and yoga classes, NSS, NCC, gender and environmental awareness programmes. There are different fellowships and scholarships offered to meritorious and needy students. These financial grants enable the students to overcome their financial restraints and help them to complete their graduation. Career counselling programmes organized by the College help students to explore various career opportunities after completion of their graduation. Psychological counselling is provided to students to overcome their fears and anxieties, gender discrimination at home and in inter-personal relationships, and any other issue that causes them mental distress. The students in this College come from all strata in society. In spite of differences in their socio-cultural and economic profiles they enjoy a harmonious environment within the college campus, which ensures in the words of Jawaharlal Nehru 'Unity in Diversity'.

In the context of gender equity, a lot of programmes have been undertaken by the NSS Unit of the College, Women's Cell and Internal Complaints Cell (ICC) regarding Health and Hygiene, Cancer types

specific to women, Aids Awareness, Mother and Girl Child Care, Women's Education, Women's Rights, Domestic violence and overall gender awareness. The Internal Complaints Cell (ICC) patronizes such programmes either on its own, or in collaboration with the Women's Cell and NSS. Apart from this the College has an Anti-Ragging Cell. However, no complaints have been lodged in the Anti-Ragging Cell till date. There also exists an RTI (Right to Information) Cell and a Grievance Redressal Cell, where students can submit their complaints. Such complaints are redressed accordingly by the Grievance Redressal Cell and the College Authorities, at the earliest.

Another focus area of the college is in terms of generating environmental consciousness among its students. It also creates awareness about alternative sources of energy, such as, solar energy and rainwater harvesting, which are part of the anti-pollution drive of the College. As an eco-friendly campus, certain measures have been undertaken, such as, restricted entry of automobiles, pedestrian-friendly pathways and use of LED bulbs. The campus is plastic-free. Landscaping is done with trees and plants and there is a medicinal plant garden as well.

The institution provides a disabled-friendly, barrier-free environment with ramps and lifts for ensuring easy access to classrooms. There is also the provision for disabled-friendly washrooms, signage including tactile paths, lights, display boards and signposts.

The institution celebrates and organizes national and international commemorative days, events and festivals. The NSS Unit of the College makes arrangements to celebrate various national and international commemorative days, with the participation of students, teaching staff and non-teaching staff. These include – Swami Vivekananda's birth anniversary, Netaji's birth anniversary, Republic Day, RabindraJayanti, Raja Rammohan Roy's birth anniversary, Raja Rammohan Roy's death anniversary, Independence Day, Teacher's Day, NSS Day, World Environment Day, Yoga Day, among others. Librarians' Day was celebrated on 12th August 2023 to commemorate the birthday of Dr. S.R. Ranganathan, the father of Library Science.

Sensitization of students and employees of the Institution to the constitutional obligations is practised by inculcating values, rights including women's rights, duties and responsibilities of the citizens, among them. The College promotes education in the widest sense to make it a comprehensive training of the mind, heart and body, that is, conducive to the 'greatest good of the greatest number'. For instance, the Awareness Programme on Cancer – such as, breast cancer, cervical cancer and uterine cancer – which affect women mostly, helped to generate awareness about these cancer types and certain lifestyle changes were suggested to the girl students that would help reduce the risk of contracting this fatal disease. In the Awareness Programme on Mental Health, mental health issues were highlighted, as these need to be addressed with due seriousness. As women form the backbone of the family and consequently the Society, steps taken to nurture the mental health of the girl child would ultimately lead to gender equity in society. In fact, this is why counselling sessions are organized and encouraged in the College, so that students are in a better position to tackle their problems.

Fundamental values like honesty, integrity, sincerity and discipline are inculcated among the students to make them responsible citizens, aware of their Fundamental Rights and Duties. The Constitution of India, which contains the basic philosophy and supreme law of the land is also being taught in the College. The students are sensitized about their responsibility and role in the electoral process. This helps them to become aware and dutiful citizens. The HarGharTiranga campaign organized by the NSS was celebrated under the AzadikaAmritMahotsav on 8th August 2022. A cultural programme comprising song, dance, recital, recitation and drama was organised by the NSS volunteers. A procession

was held in the Amherst Street area to encourage people to bring the Tiranga home and to hoist it to mark the 75th year of India's independence on 15th August 2022. In this way, love for the nation is inculcated among the students.

By 2030, the College has a Mission to fulfil the following objectives:

- **Making 90% of the students self-reliant;**
- **Training the students to achieve economic independence in life;**
- **Mentally strengthening all the students so that they can overcome all forms of trauma and discrimination in life.**
